National research shows that 80 percent of residents practice near where they train, and we know this program will help ease the physician shortage in our county and in rural areas across the state.

The Hawai'i Heath Systems Corporation primary care training program will produce interdisciplinary teams that can care for four times as many patients as independent practitioners, and will expand to serve rural communities on each of the islands. We believe this is an innovative and effective strategy for improving access to primary care services.

The program is designed to allow second- and third-years residents to choose elective studies and work in a variety of communities on different islands, which help provide improved access to care in each of those areas.

Investing in training family practice residents on the neighbor islands is also expected to help decrease the number and rate of potentially avoidable hospitalizations. WHEREAS, Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation East Hawai'i Regional CEO Howard Ainsley has called the residency program "the top priority for us for bringing needed programs to the community"; and

WHEREAS, the success of this program's training model will lead to the creation of interdisciplinary teams capable of caring for many more patients, helping to alleviate the physician shortage; and

WHEREAS, the health care needs of Hawai'i County will suffer without assistance from the State Legislature; now, therefore,
