TO THE HONORABLE ANGUS L.K. MCKELVEY, CHAIR,
AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

My name is Carol Nowak, Ph.D., and I am the Chairperson of the Board of Psychology ("Board"). The Board had an opportunity to review House Concurrent Resolution No. 201 and House Resolution No. 162 at its meeting on March 15, 2013, and thanks you for the opportunity to testify on these measures.

The Board supports the efforts of the Legislature to allow the two (2) agencies to work collaboratively on this issue. However, as discussed with the Hawaii Psychological Association ("HPA") at its meeting on March 15, 2013, the Board, while supportive of this matter, urges the HPA to complete the Professional and Vocational Licensing Division's ("Division") Continuing Professional Education Guidelines Checklist ("Checklist"). The Checklist will assist, among other things, the Division in determining whether this extra requirement will place any undue burden on its licensees and/or its staff.

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Again, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of House
Concurrent Resolution No. 201 and House Resolution 162, with the provision that the
HPA complete the Division's Checklist.

Honorable Chair Angus L.K. McKelvey, Vice Chair Derek S.K. Kawakami and members of the committee, my name is Dr. Darryl Salvador. I am a Clinical Psychologist and the current President of the Hawai'i Psychological Association (HPA). I would like to provide testimony in support of HCR 201 / HR 162.

The mission of the HPA is to enhance the quality of life for the people of Hawai'i by encouraging, integrating, applying, and communicating the contributions of Psychology in all areas of the profession. The HPA seeks to strengthen public relations, advocate for psychologically healthy communities, develop solutions for mental health care, be responsive to the multiple cultures in Hawai'i, promote the highest standards of professional ethics, and to diffuse psychological knowledge through meetings, conventions and publications. As part of this mission, we are committed to promoting lifelong learning to account for the changing world in which we live. We support this resolution with the shared goal to promote client/patient safety and support the valuable role that psychologists contribute to our health care system.

It is estimated that the rate of human information is doubling every two years. Additionally, multicultural experts have pointed to changing demographics in the United States, particularly Hawai'i, and suggest that professionals must make substantive revisions to their curriculum, training, research and practice to update current knowledge and be better able to address issues of race and ethnicity, culture, gender and sexual orientation. To maintain minimal competency in working with these diverse populations, we must understand the cultural context of these populations, be aware of potential bias in our practices and be familiar with culturally adapted treatments.

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We all must maintain the ability to learn how to learn, be able to adapt to change and access new knowledge to improve our competencies and performance in treatment. An important goal is to constantly recharge our batteries to motivate self-renewal and keep abreast of new, ever-changing knowledge, skills and relevant information that both improves and informs our current treatment and practices. We feel that HCR 201 / HR 162 is an important step in that direction.

Honorable Chair Angus L.K. McKelvey, Vice Chair Derek S.K. Kawakami and members of the committee, my name is Dr. Nancy Sidun. I am a Licensed Clinical Psychologist, former Chair of Hawaii's Clinical Psychology Doctoral Program at Argosy University and currently the Supervising Clinical Psychologist at Kaiser Permanente-Hawaii and President-Elect of the Hawaii Psychological Association (HPA). I would like to provide testimony in support of HCR 201 / HR 162.

Education does not end for psychologists when they graduate with their doctorate degree. Given that psychology is a science, it is constantly transforming and developing. Psychologists *must* be life long learners to stay current with the emergent practices and knowledge in our field.

The majority of states require continuing education as part of the license renewal process. In fact, in 2006 American Psychological Association (APA) State Provincial Continuing Education in Psychology Requirements did a survey and found that 43 states plus the District of Columbia have continuing education requirements for psychologists. Unfortunately Hawaii is one of few remaining states that do not require continuing education for our licensed psychologists. It is imperative that this be changed. We need to ensure that competent psychologists are serving the citizens in the state of Hawaii. HCR 201 / HR 162 is a valiant and necessary movement to make that a reality.

I thank you in advance for considering my testimony in support of HCR 201 / HR 162.

Honorable Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Kawakami, and esteemed members of the House Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, in regards to **HCR 201/HR162** that urges the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) and the Hawaii Psychological Association (HPA) to develop draft legislation establishing, implementing, and monitoring continuing education requirements for all licensed psychologists in Hawaii,

I am **STRONGLY** in favor of the resolution.

My name is Dr. Jeffrey Stern and I am a psychologist who was raised here in Honolulu. I am the Past President of the HPA and have been a member for more than 25 years, though I am submitting this testimony as an individual (not representing HPA). I am also the internship director at HPU's master's program in clinical mental health counseling and I have been teaching research methodology to graduate and undergraduate students at University of Hawaii and Hawaii Pacific University for more than 15 years. I attended a meeting over a year ago with the DCCA in which the issue of mandatory continuing education (heretofore referred to as "MCE") was addressed and the idea was embraced.

In preparation for that meeting, I conducted a literature review on MCE and identified two consistent findings; first, the criticism that continuing education fails to impact treatment outcome is not because of a lack of effect. Rather, it is because research methods are not well suited to measuring this effect. Simply put, absence of evidence is not evidence of absence. Second, licensed psychologists and allied health professionals from states requiring continuing education reported strong satisfaction with their CE experiences.

Key concerns voiced by DCCA in that meeting included access to CE opportunities and cost/expense. I pledge as the Chair of the HPA subcommittee on MCE to make every effort to engage all licensed psychologists in a healthy discussion of the issue. I also pledge that HPA will work closely with DCCA to assure ample affordable and accessible CE opportunities for all licensed psychologists on all islands.

Psychologists' ethical guidelines implicitly mandate a commitment to continuing development of its knowledge base and the practice of clinical psychology should be guided not only by previously established facts and treatments, but also by relevant and more recent additions to our knowledge base. In an age of ever-growing accountability, we have an obligation to consumers and our colleagues to be current with our knowledge in our field (broadly) and our specialties (if applicable).

In a 1990 article by VendeCreek, Knapp, and Brace in *Professional Psychology Research and Practice*, the authors reviewed the literature on effectiveness of CE *across allied health professions* in enhancing quality of services in health professions and concluded that if properly implemented, CE can positively impact health care. In the face of ever- and rapidly-increasing knowledge base and technology. Note, this article is nearly 25 years old, covering research

conducted up to 50 years ago. Since then, CE programs have improved and are implemented in a manner that is accessible (including to those living in rural communities) and directly addresses accountability. I emphasize the age of the article as evidence that the time has come for Hawai'i to move forward and mandate continuing education for psychologists.
