Purpose of Bill:	Appropriates funds to be expended by the department of human services for non-school hour positive youth programs, an UPLINK administrator in the department of education, and other UPLINK staffing needs. (SD1)

Department's Position:

The Department of Education (Department) supports SB 390,SD 1. This bill appropriates funds to support non-school hour positive youth programs, an UPLINK administrator in the Department, and other UPLINK staffing needs. Approximately 14,846 students at 27 of 52 public intermediate/middle schools are receiving services via the UPLINK program. Currently, participating intermediate/middle schools submit a budget proposal to request funds for casual hires needed to implement program activities. Additional funding would allow for program expansion to the remaining 26 intermediate/middle schools and give another 13,000 students the option to participate in the program.
