**PURPOSE:** The purpose of S.B. 390, S.D. 2, is to appropriate funds to be expended by the Department of Human Services for after school hours positive youth programs, an UPLINK administrator in the Department of Education, and other UPLINK staffing needs.

**DEPARTMENT'S POSITION:** The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports the intent of this bill, provided it does not adversely impact nor replace the priorities in the Executive Biennium Budget. We would like to provide the following additional comments.

The UPLINK program is a non-school hour positive youth program where the school's develop their program for middle school students based on the community's and student's interests and needs. Though some programs offer services to assist students who are struggling with their grades through credit recovery activities, not all schools select this option or are required to do so. All schools, however, are required to commit a portion of their program schedule towards daily homework tutoring.

The DHS currently funds the Department of Education for the UPLINK program through a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to ensure funding is used for the program's specific purpose. We would recommend the same funding mechanism be used, rather than through a transfer of funds.

Purpose of Bill:

Appropriates funds to be expended by the department of human services for after school hour positive youth programs, an UPLINK administrator in the department of education, and other UPLINK

staffing needs. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD2)

#### **Department's Position:**

The Department of Education (Department) supports SB 390 SD2. The Department's UPLINK program benefits from the funding provided by the Department of Human Services (DHS). The Department defers to DHS as to the mechanism and amount of funding provided that the passage of this bill does not replace or adversely impact either DHS or Department priorities included in the Executive Budget.

This bill appropriates funds to support non-school hour positive youth programs, an UPLINK administrator in the Department, and other UPLINK staffing needs. Approximately 14,846 students at 27 of 53 public intermediate/middle schools are offered services via the UPLINK program. Currently, participating intermediate/middle schools submit a budget proposal to request funds for casual hires needed to implement program activities. Additional funding would allow for program expansion to the remaining 26 intermediate/middle schools and give another 13,000 students the option to participate in the program.
