TESTIMONY ONSENATE BILL NO. 490, S.D. 1, RELATING TO NURSING.

TO THE HONORABLE ROSALYN H. BAKER, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

My name is Celia Suzuki, Licensing Administrator for the Professional and Vocational Licensing Division of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. The Division appreciates the opportunity to provide comments on Senate Bill No. 490, S.D. 1, Relating to Nursing, that would require the Hawaii State Board of Nursing ("Board") and the Professional and Vocational Licensing Division ("PVL"), Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs ("Department"), to provide nurse license contact information to the Hawaii State Center for Nursing ("Center") so that the Center may use this information to contact the nurse licensee to obtain workforce data to be used to

determine the current and future trends of the nursing workforce. This bill would also require that nurse licensees complete the Center's workforce survey in order to renew their licenses, making this a renewal requirement.

I would like to inform the Committee that the PVL has been working with the Center and that we are continuing to dialogue with the Center to provide them with as much licensee information as legally possible.

The Board has submitted its own testimony so I will be addressing the impacts that the bill may have on PVL.

SECTION 2, on pages 2-4, lines 21-22, 1-20, and 1-15 respectively:

- This measure requires PVL to provide the Center with "nursing-related data." We strongly believe that this term is too broad and should be more narrowly defined, as it is will create confusion on what kind of information must be provided.
- There appears to be no necessity for a memorandum of understanding between PVL and the Center, as the various tasks that must be performed are clearly listed in the bill.
- The measure requires PVL to provide email addresses. Currently, we do not
 require nurses, or any other professional or vocational licensee, to provide an
 email address as part of the licensing requirements; therefore, email addresses
 are not maintained in the PVL database.
- When a licensee renews a license via our online renewal process, the email address is used to "confirm" payment of the renewal fees, and for no other

- purpose. This purpose is disclosed to the licensee; therefore, licensees currently have an expectation of privacy regarding their email address.
- If the Center wants access to contact information from PVL, the statute should
 clearly specify the type of information, as HRS section 92F-12(b)(2) requires
 agencies to disclose government records which, pursuant to federal or state law,
 are expressly authorized to be disclosed to the person requesting access. This
 would allow PVL clear authority to disclose the information.
- It should be clarified that any information will be provided "upon request", so that
 the bill is not misinterpreted to mandate the reporting of unsolicited information.
- The measure requires PVL to perform research, analysis, and report functions which it is not equipped to provide. Our primary duty is to protect the public by determining if applicants are qualified for licensure. PVL does not have the manpower or resources to comply with this mandate, nor do we believe that it is within our realm of responsibility.

SECTION 3, on pages 4-5, lines 16-22 and 1-20 respectively:

• We oppose the requirement that completion of the survey is necessary for renewal of the license, as it does not enhance the licensee's competency or quality of care. Furthermore, the possibility of nurses failing or refusing to complete the workforce survey would result in the non-renewal of the license. PVL, DCCA, and the Board are aware of the Center's "mission" to collect the workforce data for nurses and have been working on solutions to provide the Center with as much information as possible in compliance with the Hawaii Revised Statutes Chapter 92F, the Uniform Information Practices Act. We are attempting to modify our renewal and initial license nurse applications to include questions for the applicant/licensee asking permission to release their information to the Center. We have also agreed to include the Center's workforce survey at the beginning and the end of the online renewal and to also include a link to the Center's survey on the Board's web page.

TO THE HONORABLE ROSALYN H. BAKER, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

My name is Cecilia Mukai, Vice Chair of the Board of Nursing ("Board").

I appreciate the opportunity to provide comments on Senate Bill No. 490, S. D. 1, Relating to Nursing, that would require the Hawaii State Board of Nursing and the Professional and Vocational Licensing Division of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to provide nurse license contact information to the Hawaii State Center for Nursing ("Center") so that the Center may use this information to contact the nurse licensee to obtain workforce data to be used to determine the current and future trends of the nursing workforce. This bill would also require that a nurse licensee complete the Center's workforce survey in order to renew their license, making this a renewal requirement.

The Board supports the intent of this bill with the following amendments:

Section 1, page 2, line 17, replace the word "required" with "requested". The Board opposes requiring the completion of a survey in order to renew a nursing license due to the possible implications should a nurse fail or refuse to complete the survey.
 According to the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, no other state requires the completion of a survey in order to renew a nurse license.

• Section 3, page 5, lines 11 through 14, the Board recommends that this language be deleted as we oppose requiring the completion of a survey to renew a license. The Board has agreed to include the link for the Center's workforce survey before and after the online renewal process. The Board is also collaborating with the Center to provide the link to the survey on the Board's webpage with a joint statement from the Board and the Center encouraging nurse licensees to complete the survey.

Furthermore, the Board also concurs with the testimony of the Professional and Vocational Licensing Division.

Chair Baker, Vice Chair Galuteria, and members of the Senate Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection, thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony in support of this bill, SB 490 SD1.

The current language <u>requires</u> nurse licensees to complete the Hawai'i State Center for Nursing ("Center for Nursing") survey for biennial nurse license renewal. Ideally, this would have resulted in 100% participation¹. The Center for Nursing and Hawai'i State Board of Nursing (HBON)/Professional & Vocational Licensing Division (PVLD) met recently to discuss potential concerns about the interpretation of this requirement and the impact it could have on re-licensure and compliance. The UH Mānoa Nursing supports the collaboration between the Center for Nursing and the HBON/PVLD to remove any concern with nonparticipation, including the Center's agreement that the survey should be <u>requested</u> rather than required for now as part of the license renewal process.

The UH Mānoa Nursing supports the HBON/PVLD agreement to write a joint statement with the Center for Nursing in support of the request to complete the workforce survey with the biennial nurse license renewal on the PVLD web site, noting the importance and benefits of participation by nursing professionals. The UH Mānoa Nursing further

UH Mānoa Nursing recommends that the following sections of the new language be amended:

- Section 2(b) replacing "required" with "requested" to read: "A survey developed by the center for nursing shall be <u>requested</u> as part of the license renewal requirements under section 457-9(a)."
- Section 2, deleting the last sentence, "For the purposes of compliance with this section, the Center for Nursing shall abide by the requirements of Chapter 92F."
 The Center for Nursing is already governed by chapter 92F, the Uniform Information Practices Act (UIPA) and seems to imply otherwise.
- Section 3(a), replacing "required" with "requested" to read: "As part of the license renewal process, each applicant shall be <u>requested</u> to complete a survey developed by the center for nursing as deemed necessary by the center for nursing pursuant to section 304A-1407(b)."

We note that SB 490 SD1 will address Hawai'i's lack of a central source of communication through which all nurses licensed in the State can contribute to and receive information on practice/regulatory changes, state/federal initiatives and nursing research to assure quality nursing care. Hawai'i has not consistently participated in national workforce data surveys or responded to requests in a timely manner. As the Nation moves forward with health care reform, the lack of participation by the state of Hawai'i will have consequences for policy formation and resource allocation.

Nurses need to contribute to and be apprised of changes before they can embrace them; whether they are amendments to their nurse practice laws; effects of national/state initiatives on nursing such as the Affordable Care Act; establishment of a continuing education program for continuing competency and lifelong learning; or other issues. Before change can occur, nurses must be informed of changes to their laws, current research data and government directives in a timely, cost-effective manner. The Hawaii State Center for Nursing (HSCN) conducts a survey of nurses as a means of collecting information about the nurse workforce. The survey helps fulfill the statutory functions of HSCN, which include collecting and analyzing data about the nursing workforce, analyzing data related to the retention of the nursing workforce, and developing a plan for recruiting and retaining nurses. These functions are consistent with the recommendation of the Institute of Medicine that states establish an infrastructure for the collection and analysis of interprofessional health care workforce data.

The HSCN survey is the most valuable source of nursing data in the state, despite its low response rate. The survey is sent out by email, but due to the lack of access to nurse licensees' email addresses, it is also sent out in a hard copy format. Unfortunately, the response rate is only 35%. By comparison, other states have response rates that range from 80% to 90%.

This bill will ensure that a high proportion of nurses in Hawaii complete the survey. The results of the survey will be used to ensure a sufficient supply of nurses to provide care to the people of Hawaii.


