Chairs Espero and Hee, Vice Chairs Baker and Shimabukuro, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety **supports** Senate Bill 75, Relating to Corrections, which establishes a pilot program for no more than twenty paroled prisoners to be subject to high intensity supervision.
