AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATIONS BONDS AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT OF LOW- AND MODERATE-INCOME HOUSING

Senate Bill No. 809 authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds and makes an appropriation for the construction and improvement of low- and moderate-income housing in the State.

The Depa rtment has technical comments on this bill. Federal tax law requires, among other things, that tax-exempt general obligation bond proceeds be used to finance projects that serve public purposes. As it appears that private entities will derive the benefit from this legislation, tax-exempt general obligation bond proceeds cannot be used for this purpose. The State would need to issue taxable general obligation bonds at a higher cost in order to allow the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation to provide financing assistance to private entities.

In addition, as public funding for these projects are not in the proposed Executive Budget, the annual debt service of approximately \$21,000,000 should also be proposed in the Legislature's budget.

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT OF LOW-AND MODERATE-INCOME HOUSING.

The HHFDC <u>appreciates the intent</u> of S.B. 809, to the extent that it does not replace or adversely affect priorities identified in the Executive Biennium Budget.

S.B. 809 appropriates \$251,700,000 in General Obligation Bond funds for the following affordable housing projects: Leihano at Kapolei; Hale Mohalu in Pearl City; and Meheula Vista in Mililani, all on Oahu; and Kamakana Vista in Kailua-Kona, on the island of Hawaii.

While HHFDC generally supports affordable housing development, we do have concerns that some of these identified projects are to be built on private land. We do not believe it is wise to appropriate limited State General Obligation Bond funds for a project unless it is located on State land.
