I was honored to attend Kapolei Middle School's Po'okela Awards and commencement ceremony. Congratulations to all the recipients!



The State Budget responds to the pressing needs of Hawaii's people while carefully scrutinizing expenses and crafting an appropriate budget to ensure that the most significant priorities are met and to lend structural stability to the State's financial plan by, among other things:

Providing \$980,506,000 for much-needed capital improvement projects across Hawaii, including:

- \$454,009,000 for DOE school improvements, upgrades, and renovations;
- \$233,094,000 for UH to address facility improvements, upgrades, and renovations; and
- o \$1,275,747,000 for DOT to address airport, highway, and harbor capital-improvement needs

#### **Investing in our future**

District 39 was awarded several CIP projects this session including;

\$880,000 to **Honowai Elementary School**- plans and design of a new eight classroom building \$1,000,000 to **Campbell High School**- plans and design for electrical upgrades to existing facilities \$3,000,000 to **East Kapolei Middle School**- plans, design, construction and equipment for a new middle school \$700,000 to **Mauka Lani Elementary School**- design and construction for campus wide electrical upgrades

The Governor also released the following money to our schools;


\$625,000 to **Kaleiopuu Elementary School** – Design and construction of a second emergency evacuation ramp through the back of the campus

\$550,000 to **Kaleiopuu Elementary School** – Construction to upgrade the electrical system to provide adequate power infrastructure to support technology-based curriculum
