Legislative Issues

You Owe The State Government \$25,000

Reps. Ward & Marumoto sponsored a briefing on the extent of Hawaii debt. A speaker from Truth in Accounting, economist Paul Brewbaker, the Director of Budget & Finance and the Executive Director of the Maui Chamber of Commerce drew frightening and enlightening pictures for legislators. Our IOU includes the unfunded liability of the employees' retirement system and employees' health fund, plus the bonds we have sold. The briefing revealed that we the State is not reporting all expenses due to an antiquated budgeting and accounting rules, so legislators don't get a full picture of the financial situation. For instance, the 2009 audit report (CAFR) lists a \$924 million liability for "unrelated compensation" the ERS when the actual figure is close to \$9 billion! The state employee health system lists no liabilities, but the debt could be as high as \$5 billion!

The total state debt is \$22 billion so each man, woman and child owes \$25,000. B & F Director Kalbert Young stated that, while he sets the financial policy for the State, he does not know how much is on hand because revenues are collected by one department – Taxation. Another department, Accounting and Government Services, writes the contracts and the checks. Antiquated software does not allow sharing of information, but he is working on a new system that will take a few years to put into place. Because the June 30, 2010 CAFR just came out this November he has not been able to issue construction bonds.

MARUMOTO WILL CONTINUE OF FIGHT A STATE TAX ON PENSION INCOME

Honolulu - Last session Representative Barbara Marumoto opposed Governor Abercrombie's proposal to tax pension income, and she will continue to fight it next session too despite the dire financial straits of the State. The Governor proposed a tax on adjusted gross income of over \$37,500 that included pensions. Although it did not pass in the 2011 session, the House strongly supported a pension tax on individual income over \$100,000 AGI. The Senate opposed this tax as did the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP). Rep. Marumoto said that those in opposition feared that, if the bill passed, the income figure could drop down in future years – to \$50,000 or \$37,500.



Rep. Marumoto was among panelists that spoke to the Kokua Council regarding possible legislation that will affect senior citizens in the 2012 legislative Session and pledged that she will continue to oppose taxes on pension income.

Rep. Marumoto, Rep. Gene Ward and others in the Republican Caucus recently sponsored a briefing on Hawaii's Debt Crisis. The news turned out to be much worse than expected. That's because many figures are not reported. So Legislators do not get a true picture of Hawaii's financial situation.

For instance, the annual audit report (CAFR) lists a liability of almost \$1 billion for the State retirement system (ERS) when the actual liability counting "unrelated compensation" is closer to \$9 billion. The state employee health system lists no liabilities, but the Institute for Truth in Accounting estimates the debt at \$5.1 billion. The total unfunded pension liability plus the EUTF cost amount to a staggering \$22 billion or \$25,000 for each man, woman and child in Hawaii.

In an op-ed in yesterday's Star-Advertiser, Colbert Matsumoto reported that the ERS unfunded liability is \$7.1 billion and the EUTF was underfunded by \$14.7 billion in 2009. Whatever the differences, it spells a big headache for Hawaii's taxpayers.

The Director of Budget & Finance Kalbert Young said that the State hopes to issue bonds for construction projects, but has been unable to do so because the CAFR for 2010 has not yet been issued. I hope it's come out since then.

In addition to Hawaii's debt crisis that burdens each person in the State with \$25,000 of debt, the State budget is facing a \$1 billion shortfall in 2013. Despite the massive financial problems, Rep. Marumoto has pledged to fight the pension tax as well as several other taxes that would heavily impact senior citizens.
