Through advancements in technology, people are able to connect with one another instantly, despite being thousands of miles apart. The internet has become a conduit for social, economic and recreational interchange between people of various cultures around the globe. It enables families to stay in touch with those serving in Afghanistan and Iraq and with children attending schools in other states and also provides a wealth of information for research and study.

However, this modern technology has also become a tool for those who use it to prey on the innocent, especially children and the elderly. Cyber bullying and cyber threats (see below) have become so prevalent that the State Attorney General established the Hawaii Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force, which is part of a nationwide network dedicated to protecting children in the cyberspace environment.

On February 20, the Aiea/Pearl City legislators held an informational town meeting to help parents learn more about this growing concern. Robert Jahier of the Hawaii ICAC provided many thought-provoking examples of how children are enticed into cyber-relationships by persons who disguise their identities and intentions. Those in attendance learned not only of the dangers that exist in cyberspace, but also were given valuable hints of how to help their children learn to use the internet safely, as listed below.

• Cyber bullying consists of sending or posting cruel messages, photos, or videos on the Internet or other electronic media with the intent of damaging the reputation of the target.
