Aha Hui E Kala **dba Lawai International Center** is a volunteer non-profit organization expressly formed to protect and preserve the 32 acres parcel in the Lawai Valley on Kauai. To date the organization has been able to purchase the land which is the site of cultural treasures for the early Hawaiians and others who followed in subsequent years to make Kaua'i their home. The organization has taken the first step in accomplishing its goal of becoming a cultural center and restoring the valley's ancient heritage.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of this request is to further develop the infrastructure of the Lawai International Center. The First Phase is complete with the development of the hillside shrines, the construction of the Hall of Compassion, and the clearing of the property for improved access and parking. The Second Phase which will begin in 2014 includes the building of an Education Center to replace the tent that is in use now, the continuing rehab of the hillside shrines as well as the upgrading of access to the property and the parking area. A permanent Education Center will enhance the opportunities for the community to benefit from the preservation of its cultural and spiritual history. The foundations of the world, as we know it, are built on our collective histories. All these activities which provide opportunities to share, learn and develop are open to the public, residents and visitors alike.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The cultural heritage of our immigrant population is being lost. The Center will offer and foster educational and public awareness programs dealing with cultural traditions embodied in ancient Hawaiian, Japanese, Chinese, and other cultures including but not limited to music, art, literature, drama, dances and cultural and humanitarian teachings and activities of said cultures. Programs to spread the true meaning of Aloha will also be developed and nurtured internationally. The Lawai International Center will be a place of rest, recuperation, and healing for those who live on Kauai as well as all mankind.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The target population to be served are individuals from all walks of life in Hawaii, including youth and kupuna and, of course, our visitors.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The Lawai International Center is located on 32 acres in the Lawai Valley on Kauai. It will immediately serve the island of Kauai as well as its neighboring islands. It is, however, the intention of Aha Hui E Kala dba Lawai International Center to bring international and national leaders in their fields to share their expertise with residents and visitors alike.

During these work sessions, artifacts have been discovered and removed to another location for their preservation and safekeeping. Once the final phase has been completed, they will be returned to the Lawai International Center.

The Board has developed a strategic plan. The immediate goal was to purchase the land which has been accomplished. The second is to develop the infrastructure and the upper portion of the property. The restoration of the upper portion has begun and the wall that surrounds the lower portion of the hillside is being re-engineered.

A fund raising plan has been developed to raise \$5,000,000. To date over \$3,000,000 in cash and in-kind gifts have been raised.

Besides the Board of Directors (see attached), the Lawai International Center is fortunate to have Marion Penhallow, Professional Fund Raiser (see attached resume), The organization also has the services of Steve Long, architect; Ian Kagimoto, engineer; Dennis Esaki, engineer/surveyor; Steve Shinn, attorney; Duane Kurisu, publisher; Julie Burton, public relations; Jocelyn Fujii, writer; Joan Selix Berman, graphic designer; Heather Guigni, media producer; Ben Matsuda, printer who have donated countless hours to the project. In addition, Lawai International Center has a group of supporters/advisors headed by Dusty Baker, serving as honorary chair.

It does not have electricity or running water which are included in the plans for Phase Two.

Dear Applicant:

This modifies our letter of the above date in which we stated that you would be treated as an organization that is not a private foundation until the expiration of your advance ruling period.





This year, more than 1,600 volunteers and supporters heard the call and gave of their hearts and hands. They knew that the love, time and effort they devoted to Lawai would expand exponentially, beyond all boundaries, sending light and grace to the universe.

And they built tangibly, too. The Hall of Compassion stands firmly on these sacred grounds, an anthem of generosity and hope. With its 13th century Japanese architecture, it will remain standing for more than 1,000 years. Together, we have proven that miracles are real.
