A brief description of the applicant's background;

Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike is a construction skills training program for high school youth in Hana, Maui; an isolated community on the island's east coast with over two-thirds its population of Native Hawaiian ancestry. The mission of our award-winning program is to provide Hana's youth, particularly at-risk students, with a way to learn that makes sense to them, that builds their self-esteem and shows them they have the power to change their future. Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike has been working with Hana School and the community of partnerships since 2000.

The Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike building program staff works with the Hana School Career Technical Education staff and students to apply academics such as math and science to real-life situations. The program provides the students with hands on vocational training and job experiences so they can graduate being college and career ready. Students take pride in their abilities and accomplishments through building projects. The Grant in Aid Proposal is to provide funds for the construction of an Infant and Toddler Program Facility which will allow students to take part in the creation of a structure to house a long needed program in Hana.

The goals and objectives related to the request;

The greater Hana Community (Keanae to Kaupo) does not have a licensed child care facility (infant to 3 years old). The lack of a licensed child care facility for this community is problematic for a number of reasons. The main two reasons are safety and financial. With regards to safety, the main purpose of a licensed child care facility is to ensure that basic safety services are provide to our Hana keiki. With regards to the financial aspect, child care is prohibitively expensive. If the Hana community has a licensed child care facility, the high cost of child care would become less because many of our families could now qualify for a subsidy. Subsidies can only be paid to families if their children are in licensed child care facilities. Child care often costs more than a parent can make if they were employed. This is especially true if the parent has more than one child. It is better if our parents are contributing to society by having a job and paying taxes than being on public assistance. As stated above, there are no licensed child care facilities in the Hana community. This puts our Hana families at a financial disadvantage and our keiki in a potentially less safe situation if they attend un-licensed child care facilities.

Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike provides our High School youth a hands-on training program that meets their learning needs and shows them pathways to success, with an emphasis on sustainable techniques the program addresses the global environmental crisis and instills the value of responsible and innovative resource use. The project done by Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike meet real community needs, and teaches the greatest lesson of all—how to malama [caretake] our people and create a vibrant local community.

The public purpose and need to be served;

As stated previously, the community of Hana does not have a licensed child care facility. In 2006 a survey was conducted in the Hana Community by Hana School. Each and every role group had "early childhood education" as one of their top three need areas. In response to this need, Hana School created their own preschool program. Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike has assisted the school in their renovation process to make regular classrooms into preschool rooms. The Hana School Preschool Program meets the needs for those students who were unable to have a preschool experience due to the Kamehameha Preschool reaching the capacity because of space constrictions. The Hana School Preschool was implemented in 2007 to absorb the overflow from Kamehameha Preschool. Because of this action, every preschool-age child in the Hana Community is offered a preschool experience. Currently Hana has 26 registered preschool students. With regards to this aspect of early childhood education, Hana is on the forefront. Hana School would like to take the early childhood program to the next level, this would be a licensed Infant and Toddler Program.

Having previously built 14 structures on the Hana School campus we would like to extend this partnership and have the next project be the Infant and Toddler Facility.

Describe the target population to be served; and the geographic coverage.

The Hana Community extends 50 miles of rugged East Maui coastline from Keanae to Kipahulu. The town of Hana is an agricultural community with three main employers; The Travaasa Hotel, the County of Maui and Hana High and Elementary School. The community has a population of about 1300, Hana School Complex serves a population of 363 students preschool-12th grade. The 2010 census shows a population of 103 persons 0 - 4 years. The Hana School Complex is the center of many community events. The majority of the student population is of Hawaiian or Part-Hawaiian ancestry. The next largest ethnic group is Caucasian. Approximately 80% of the students are on free or reduced lunch status. The School community believes strongly in the need for early childhood education. Between Hana School and Kamehameha School preschools, education is being provided to all 3 and 4 year old students. A pre-school education, if their parents choose to enroll them, is being offered.

Because there is no licensed child care in Hana, we are partnering with other organizations such as Maui Family Support Services, Kamehameha Schools, Maui Economic Opportunity, Ohana Makamae and Maui County to provide employees to run an infant and toddler program for the students, teachers and other Hana residents. There is very strong community support for the Hana School Complex. Non-profit organizations are located on the campus and contribute

greatly to education and support of the students and involving them in community service activities. Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike runs the building program, Ohana Makamae provides counseling and academic support services and will be providing parenting classes in conjunction with the infant toddler program for pregnant and parenting teens. Hana Arts provides a music, art and dance program for grades K-8. In exchange for their services the school has allowed these programs use of the facilities.

From 2010-12, Hana High School had four students fail to graduate because they did not have child care. Their parents worked, so the students had to stay home with their infants. In 2010, Hana school had one teacher on leave due to the lack of child care. Four of our eleven elementary teachers were out on extended maternity leave during the 2011-12 school year due to the lack of childcare. These teachers being out resulted in classes being taught by a substitute teacher. Hana is a hard-to-fill area with regards to teacher positions, the lack of child care in Hana is radically affecting education in Hana. Currently 3 students in the High School are pregnant, two graduates from last year are pregnant and one teacher just came back from maternity leave and another teacher is due next month. We are attempting to convert an existing classroom into a temporary facility, but facility requirements are stringent and we really do not have the room under our current school population.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

The scope of the project is to construct a 1900 sf facility powered by a photovoltaic system on the Hana High and Elementary School campus to be utilized as an infant toddler facility for ages 0 - 3 year olds. The facility will be fully accessible per ADA standards and undergo County Permitting and DCAB Review as required by the State Department of Education Facilities and Maui DAGS.

Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike will be the general contractor on the site and work with architects, engineers, sub contractors and Hana High and Elementary School / DAGS / State Facilities Development Branch to project completion. Completion will be approximately 12 months from the time of ground breaking. State Permits and review will have to occur prior to start of construction and is dependent on county agency timelines. Quarterly progress reports will be sent to the Legislature to document building progress. Measure of effectiveness will include a quality satisfaction survey, end user satisfaction survey and a well constructed building free from defects for a time of 2 years from date of completion.

Through the course of the project Ma Ka Hana Ka Tke plans to achieve the following: 1) transform the behavioral patterns of at-risk youth, 2) create an appreciation of learning, 3) build community relationships, 4) respond to real school and community needs, 5) offer skills of self-sustenance to the remote Hana region, and 6) prove to youth that goals can be reached.

We aim to meet the above goals with the following objectives: 1) offering a new way to "feel good" without turning to drugs, alcohol, or negative forms of expression; and renewing self-esteem by experiencing pride in accomplishment; 2) showing immediate and tangible results of learning, and introducing learning by choice; 3) instilling the respect of other people and property, and promoting teamwork; 4) improving the school, and providing a new infant and toddler facility for the Hana community; 5) preparing youth for employment in construction trades, inspiring further training, or providing skills for use at home; and raising the skill capacity of our community; and 6) providing a formula for success, instilling youth with the confidence to believe they can succeed.

We teach academic subjects through real-life, hands-on application, where students can understand the concepts they're learning through tangible examples. But these aren't just examples for learning's sake. Our projects meet real school and community needs, so our students' education immediately serves those whose lives it touches. Now in our 14th successful year (established Fall 2000), we're proud to review the students' main accomplishments: the building of 27 cottages for local elders, 33 collaborative building projects with other area nonprofits, 14 on-campus facilities at Hana High and Elementary School, 6 solar photovoltaic systems and 17 solar hot water systems, a new community farm for Hana, and nearly 50 ramps and handicap-access improvements for elders and community members in need. As shown above and on the attached website (www.hanabuild.org) Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike has built many projects on the Hana High and Elementary School Campus. We are currently working with Nick Nichols from the Facilities Development Branch of the Department of Education. We will submit plans to the Disability and Communication Access Board for review prior to construction to make sure the new facility meets ADA requirements.

Executive director and licensed contractor Rick Rutiz is aided by a full-time program assistant, a part-time program specialist, and a rotating crew of building experts, who give of their time, materials, and services to help further our students' training. Since our inception, Rick and the program have received a humbling series of awards, including the Council for Native Hawaiian

Advancement's Nonprofit of the Year Award (2004); the prestigious Tiny Malaikini Mea Kokua Award (2009), honoring Rick as one who has given most selflessly for the good of the community; several Maui County Council resolutions for bringing exposure to our youth's achievements on national TV (we've been featured on the Discovery Channel's Planet Green network [2009] & Emmy-award winning Profiles in Caring [2010]); the Maui News' 1 of 10 People Who Make a Difference Award (2001); Hawai'i State Governor Linda Lingle's Innovation Award (2010); Mayor Alan Arakawa's Laulima Award for Environmental Leadership (2011); and most recently, the Maui No Ka Oi "Environmental Hero" Award (2012). We believe the greatest measure of our qualifications, however, is not just in awards or even buildings constructed, but the changes we see taking place in our students every day. In their words: "As the year goes by, I'm always learning something new ... I've made many mistakes, but then I learn from it and I prevent it from happening again." "I love to be empowered by my 'aina [land] and kupuna [elders] ... Ma Ka Hana Ka 'Ike keeps me away from bad habits and encourages me to stay on the right path."
