1. A brief description of the applicant's background

Voyager School Foundation was established in 2002 with the sole purpose of supporting Voyager Public Charter School. In 2008 the Foundation purchased a building on Halekauwila Street in Honolulu to provide a new site for the School and to generate income to support its operations. In 2013, Voyager had the unique opportunity of moving to a private school location, specifically designed with learning and children in mind. The Foundation continues to manage the downtown Halekauwila property, renting spaces to businesses and organizations.

Voyager Public Charter School was established in 2001, as one of the first charter schools in Hawaii. The school embraces 3 research-based learning methodologies in a small nurturing environment that integrates art and foreign languages. With a heavy emphasis on rigorous professional development, teacher leadership, and collaborative decision making, Voyager's teachers are highly skilled professionals who are committed to, not just the learning of their students, but to their own continuous learning and growth. Voyager's teacher leaders were chosen out of all the charter schools to attend the Teacher Leadership Academy.

Learning data demonstrates that Voyager's methodologies provide students with skills and behaviors that lead to success. Voyager met all NCLB requirements for eight years in a row receiving the status of "met unconditionally". In the 2013 new Strive HI state accountability system, Voyager placed in the second highest rating of 5 categories. Known for its unique approach to learning, family involvement, and arts integration focus, Voyager has had a waiting list for the last 7 year. Additionally, Voyager's graduating eighth have gone on to excel in some of the state's most competitive private schools.

In 2013, after twelve years in temporary industrial type locations, Voyager School moved to its present site on Wilder Avenue. The new campus, previously occupied by Our Redeemer School, is a dramatic improvement from either of Voyager's previous locations. Facility costs are 25% lower than at Halekauwila, the campus was designed with learning in mind, classrooms are large and spacious, and the availability of private play areas avoids the necessity to walk to nearby city parks for recreation and play. There are however some facility challenges that have prevented the full use of the new campus. Although there are 3 play areas, only one small area is usable at this time due to outdated, unsafe, damaged equipment and hazardous flooring conditions. Faced with the current level of funding, high downtown facility costs, and the fact that Voyager

is one of a small handful of start-up charter schools that are not on state land and are not supported by Kamehameha Schools, the school does not have sufficient funds to improve the area and meet the requirements that would ensure the safety of Voyager students.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request

The goal of this request is to receive \$250,000 in order to create safe, engaging, aesthetically pleasing outside areas for the students of Voyager to play and learn.

Objectives:

These improvements will:

- Enhance learning for Voyager students by providing opportunities for safe and joyful outdoor play, physical activities, and learning explorations
- Increase physical activity of students by providing a variety of active outdoor options
- Enhance the school's physical appearance
- Attract interested families, partners, and funders
- Provide an optimal campus for school and community use

3. The public purpose and need to be served

Voyager School provides a high quality, no-cost education option for Hawaii's families. As part of a comprehensive learning program, students need physical activity and time to be outside in nature. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, "children in the US spend an average of 7 hours a day on entertainment media, including televisions, computers, phones and other electronic devices". Unless they are involved in an

organized sport, it is unlikely that our children get physical activity during their non-school hours. Committed to providing a well-rounded education and emphasizing a whole child approach, Voyager strives to weave meaningful physical activity and outdoor learning into its curriculum. Safe outdoor areas will provide the venue to make that possible.

4. Describe the target population to be served

Voyager serves 300 students, kindergarten through eighth grade. Additionally, the school periodically rents the facility to outside community groups.

5. Describe the geographic coverage

Because charter schools are not geographic-specific, Voyager serves students from all over Oahu.

Scope of Work. Work would include the demolition and upgrade of Voyager's play areas so that they are safe for play, physical activities and outdoor learning

Tasks.

- Seeking and incorporating input from Voyager School staff in the priorities, function, and design of the selected play areas.
- Working with contractor(s) to finalize design and facilitate the demolition and upgrade of the play areas.
- Serving as liaison between contractor, Voyager School, Voyager Governing Board, and Voyager School Foundation.
- Coordinating inspections and any other needed assessments to ensure that play areas meet all safety requirements, including ADA compliance.
- Conducting a pre and post teacher survey to determine the increased benefits and utilization of the outdoor play areas.
- Planning and coordinating the help of family, student, staff, and community volunteers in the project, as needed.
- Holding a family/community event to perform a blessing and Grand Opening of the finished areas.
- Completing any required paperwork or reporting as required by this grant.

Responsibilities. The project team will assume the following responsibilities:

- Planning and facilitating the project with minimal disruption of school operations.
- Soliciting and incorporating feedback from Voyager School staff, Voyager Governing Board, and the Voyager School Foundation Board in planning and providing progress reports.
- Utilizing grant money within the terms of this grant and also in the safest, smartest, and most efficient way possible to maximize gain from this funding.
- Ensuring the bid process complies with the Foundation's procurement policy.
- Providing access to plans, budget, and follow-up reports to all related parties and making all project documents available to the public.
- Ensuring that the final project is safe, of high quality, and facilitates the play and learning of Voyager students.

The Project Team will consist of 3 people:

- Laura Colbert: Project Manager. Laura has been involved with Voyager School since 2007, having served on both the School and Foundation boards. She is currently a Foundation Board Member. Laura is a Certified Project Management Professional who has served as manager of several construction projects including the development of the St. Francis skilled nursing facility, multiple Liberty Dialysis clinics, and the expansion of the St. Francis emergency room. She served on the property management committee during the Voyager Foundation's renovation of the Halekauwila site.
- George Moyer: Project Coordinator. George is a retired military man with many
 years of executive experience. He also served on the Hawaii Baptist Academy
 School Board where he headed up many different kinds of projects. He currently
 serves on the Voyager Governing Board and is Chair of the Facilities Committee. He
 has developed a Facilities Plan and has already been in contact with various vendors
 regarding playground and other site improvements.
- **Sue Deuber**: Project Staff. Sue is an independent educational consultant who served as Principal of Voyager School for nine years. Sue also served on the

Voyager property management committee during the Halekauwila remodeling project. Sue is currently on the School Board and maintains close relationships with school leadership, teachers, and staff.

 The team will recruit a Voyager parent and a staff member to help guide this project.

Related Projects or Contracts for Recent Three Years.

There are no related projects or contracts in the recent three years.

B. Facilities

Voyager School is located at 2428 Wilder Avenue in Honolulu. It is an older 3-story, 27,336 sq. ft. structure with 3 play areas. There are 15 classrooms, a teachers' lounge, an administration office, and a cafeteria. The 3 play areas consist of:

- A 1,975 square foot enclosed play area that is unusable at this time due to broken, unsafe equipment and hazardous flooring
- A 1,606 square foot area that has substandard flooring and a small outdated basketball hoop
- A large rooftop basketball area with substandard flooring and no structure or equipment. The glare and heat from the roof prevent comfortable use for students.

The facility has been approved by the Charter School Commission. The School is working with Architects Hawaii and has developed a plan to bring the entire facility to ADA compliance.

V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

- Project Staff: assist Manager and Coordinator as needed, work with teachers and staff to provide input on design, work with school leadership to plan Grand Opening and Blessing, conduct surveys, and complete any reports required by grant.
