
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 PAUKŪ 1. Ke hō'ōia nei ka 'aha'ōlelo kau kânāwai o ka
2 Moku'āina o Hawai'i nei ua 'ae 'ia ma ke Kumukānāwai o ka Moku'āina
3 o Hawai'i ka mālama 'ana mai a me ka paipai 'ana ho'i i ka 'ike a
4 me ka nohona Kanaka, ka mo'olelo, a me ka 'ōlelo 'ōiwi o Hawai'i.
5 Ma loko o ka ha'awina X, paukū 4, 'ōlelo 'ia penei, "e paipai ka
6 Moku'āina i ke a'o 'ana i ka 'ike a me ka nohona Kanaka, ka
7 mo'olelo a me ka 'ōlelo 'ōiwi o Hawai'i." A ma loko o ka ha'awina
8 XII, paukū 7, 'ōlelo 'ia penei, "ke hō'ōia hou nei ka Moku'āina e
9 mālama a ho'omalua 'ia nā kuleana a me nā pono a pau, i hana
10 kuluma 'ia no ke ola pono o ka noho 'ana, nā 'ano o ka nohona a me
11 ka ho'omana i pa'a mau i nā Kanaka ke ahupua'a, 'o lākou he mamo
12 na nā Kanaka maoli i noho ma ka pae 'āina o Hawai'i nei ma mua o
13 ka makahiki 1778, a koe kekahi kuleana o ka Moku'āina e
14 ho'oponopono i ia mau kuleana a me nā pono." 'Oiai ua 'ike 'ia he
15 pili pono ka 'ōlelo e ola ana i ka ho'omau 'ia ana o ke 'ano o ka
16 nohona o ka po'e kânaka, ma ka ha'awina XV, paukū 4 ke ho'āmana



1 'ia nei 'elua mau 'olelo kūhelu o ka moku'āina o Hawai'i, 'oia ho'i
2 ka 'olelo Hawai'i a me ka 'olelo Pelekania.

3 Ma hope mai o ka makahiki 1978, ua hō'ōia hou 'ia e ka
4 Moku'āina 'o ka 'olelo Hawai'i kekahi o nā 'olelo kūhelu, a ua
5 kāko'o ka 'aha'olelo i nā hana e ho'okomo i ka 'olelo Hawai'i ma nā
6 palapala 'oihana o ka moku'āina, nā kuni, a me nā hō'ailona. Ua
7 mālama ka Moku'āina i ke koi 'ia a me ka pela pololei 'ia i ia mau
8 kākau 'ana no ka lehulehu. I kēia mau lā 'o ka ho'ohana pono 'ana
9 i ke kahakō a me ka 'okina he mea ia e hō'ike i ka mālama maika'i
10 'ia o ka 'olelo 'ōiwi o kēia mau mokupuni, a he mea nō ho'i ia e
11 ho'okō pono ai i ka mana'o a me ke kumu o ke kumukānāwai o ka
12 moku'āina.

13 'O ke kumu o kēia Kānāwai 'oia ho'i ka mālama 'ana ma lalo o
14 ka mana o ke kumukānāwai ka 'olelo Hawai'i, a me ka 'ike a me ka
15 nohona Kanaka ma o ke koi 'ana e ho'ohana 'ia nā inoa Hawai'i a me
16 ka 'olelo Hawai'i 'ano pololei loa a kūpono ma nā palapala, nā
17 po'oinoaleka, nā hō'ailona, a me nā kuni, i ka wā e hana mua 'ia,
18 ka hana hou 'ia, a i 'ole ka pa'i hou 'ana.

20 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Constitution of
21 the State of Hawai'i provides for the preservation and promotion



1 of native Hawaiian culture, history, and language. Article X,
2 section 4, of the Hawaii State Constitution provides that "[t]he
3 State shall promote the study of Hawaiian culture, history and
4 language." Article XII, section 7, of the Hawaii State
5 Constitution provides that "[t]he State reaffirms and shall
6 protect all rights, customarily and traditionally exercised for
7 subsistence, cultural and religious purposes and possessed by
8 ahupua'a tenants who are descendants of native Hawaiians who
9 inhabited the Hawaiian Islands prior to 1778, subject to the
10 right of the State to regulate such rights." Because
11 maintaining a living language is an integral component of
12 preserving a culture, article XV, section 4, of the Hawaii State
13 Constitution establishes that English and Hawaiian are the
14 official languages of Hawai'i.

15 Since 1978, the State has reaffirmed Hawaiian as one of its
16 official languages, and the legislature has supported efforts to
17 incorporate the Hawaiian language into official state writings,
18 emblems, and signs. The State has ensured that these public
19 inscriptions are mandatory, accurate, and spelled correctly.
20 The use of proper Hawaiian macrons and glottal stops not only
21 shows the deserved respect for the native language of these



1 islands, but also fully comports with the intent and purpose of
2 the state constitution.

3 Section 1-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, provides that
4 English and Hawaiian are the official languages of Hawai'i.
5 Despite the statutory recognition of the Hawaiian language as an
6 official language of this State, the governor vetoed H.B. No.
7 1984, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, Regular Session of 2012, relating to
8 Hawaiian language, which would have strengthened the recognition
9 and furthered the usage of the Hawaiian language in official
10 documents. The governor's veto message indicates concerns about
11 possible misspellings and misinterpretation of Hawaiian words
12 and their effect on official documents.

13 The governor also indicated separately that the state
14 departments and agencies would administratively implement the
15 usage of Hawaiian words in official documents without the
16 necessity of a statutory mandate. However, the legislature is
17 concerned that this administrative initiative has not occurred.

18 The intent of this Act is not to require that bills and
19 other official documents be written in Hawaiian as well as
20 English; rather, if documents and letterheads prepared by or for
21 state or county agencies or officials contain Hawaiian names and



1 words, this Act requires that the Hawaiian names and words be
2 written in accurate, appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian.

3 The purpose of this Act is to ensure the constitutionally
4 and ethically mandated preservation of the Hawaiian language and
5 culture by requiring all newly created, replaced, or reprinted
6 state and county documents, letterheads, symbols, and emblems to
7 contain accurate, appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian names and
8 language only if Hawaiian words are included.

9 SECTION 2. Section 1-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10 amended to read as follows:

11 "**§1-13 Official languages[-]; and punctuation.** English
12 and Hawaiian are the official languages of Hawaii. Whenever
13 there is found to exist any radical and irreconcilable
14 difference between the English and Hawaiian version of any of
15 the laws of the State, the English version shall be held
16 binding. Hawaiian shall not be required for public acts and
17 transactions[-]; provided that if Hawaiian words or names are
18 included in such documents, then section 1-13.5 shall apply."

19 SECTION 3. Section 1-13.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20 amended to read as follows:

21 "~~[+]~~**§1-13.5[+]** **Hawaiian language; spelling.** ~~[Macrons and~~
22 ~~glottal stops may be used in the spelling of words or terms in~~



1 ~~the Hawaiian language in]~~ (a) Effective January 1, 2014, all
2 documents and letterheads prepared by or for state or county
3 agencies or officials[-], to the extent that the documents and
4 letterheads contain Hawaiian language words or names, shall
5 include accurate, appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian names and
6 words, including proper Hawaiian spelling and punctuation,
7 including but not limited to macrons and glottal stops that
8 punctuate the English word to which they relate; provided that
9 any revision to conform any document or letterhead existing on
10 or before January 1, 2014, to the requirements of this section,
11 may be implemented when the document or letterhead requires
12 replacement or reprinting, or otherwise requires revision. Any
13 rule, order, policy, or other act, official or otherwise, that
14 prohibits or discourages the use of [~~these symbols~~] accurate,
15 appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian names and words, as required
16 by this section, shall be void.

17 (b) Hawaiian names and words shall be deemed accurate,
18 appropriate, and authentic when printed in conformance with:

19 (1) "Hawaiian Dictionary: Hawaiian-English, English-
20 Hawaiian", by Mary Kawena Pukui and Samuel H. Elbert,
21 University of Hawai'i Press, copyright 1986;



1 (2) "Māmaka Kaiāo: A Modern Hawaiian Vocabulary",
2 developed by the Kōmike Hua'ōlelo, the Hawaiian Lexicon
3 Committee; or

4 (3) "Place Names of Hawaii", by Mary Kawena Pukui, Samuel
5 H. Elbert, and Esther T. Mookini, University of Hawai'i
6 Press, copyright 1974.

7 (c) Any Hawaiian names and words that are misspelled or
8 incorrectly punctuated within a document or letterhead subject
9 to this section shall not be deemed to invalidate the document
10 or render it unenforceable. No cause of action shall arise
11 against the State, any county, or any state or county agency,
12 official, or employee for any Hawaiian names and words that are
13 misspelled or incorrectly punctuated."

14 SECTION 4. Section 5-6.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15 amended to read as follows:

16 "~~§~~**5-6.5**~~§~~ **State language.** (a) The Hawaiian language
17 is the native language of [~~Hawaii~~] Hawai'i and [~~may~~], effective
18 January 1, 2014, shall be used on all emblems and symbols
19 representative of the State, its departments, agencies, and
20 political subdivisions[-]; provided that for emblems and symbols
21 existing on January 1, 2014, conformance with this section may



1 be delayed until a replacement for the emblem or symbol is
2 otherwise required.

3 (b) The Hawaiian language as used on all emblems and
4 symbols shall conform to the standards of section 1-13.5(b).

5 (c) This section shall not be construed to require that
6 the full text of bills and other official documents be written
7 in Hawaiian."

8 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
9 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

10 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.



Report Title:

Hawaiian Language; Public Documents; Letterhead

Description:

Establishes references for accurate, appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian names and words, including proper Hawaiian spelling and punctuation. Clarifies that the full text of official documents is not required to be written in Hawaiian, misspelled or incorrectly punctuated Hawaiian words and names shall not invalidate documents or render them unenforceable, and no cause of action shall arise accordingly. (HB109 HD1)
