HRS Chapter 226 was enacted in 1978, after a multi-year, cross-sector effort to develop goals and policies to guide the development of the State and to establish an integrated planning and implementation system to deliver on those policies. The last review of HRS Chapter 226 was initiated in 1983 and completed in 1985, and resulted in the enactment of legislation to finetune the goals, policies, and objectives of Part I and priority guidelines of Part III of the state planning act.

Since then, there have been significant changes in Hawaii's economic, physical, and social conditions, technology, and the global marketplace, as well as in the contraints and opportunities the State faces as we plan for the future. Every legislative session there are individual bills proposing new policies and revisions to existing policies to address changes in our planning environment. A comprehensive review of the state planning act—with respect to how it aligns with current and emerging conditions and issues and its effectiveness in addressing the needs of Hawaii's people and providing for Hawaii's future—is long overdue.

HD 1 does not specify the amount to be appropriated for the purposes of the bill. Additional funds would be required as OP lacks the staff and resources to undertake a project of this scope at this time. A rigorous evaluation of the State Planning Act will require an investment of public and private resources. Development of the original plan included thorough topic area studies, statewide collaboration, and input by subject matter experts. The office estimates that approximately \$500,000 would be sufficient to accomplish most of this work.

The Department of the Attorney General offers the following comments on the proposed Senate Draft 1 ("S.D. 1") of House Bill No. 2518 regarding concerns over compliance with article III, section 14, of the Hawaii State Constitution.

The title of this bill is "Relating to State Planning." The proposed S.D. 1 contains two parts. Part I requires the State Office of Planning to review the Hawaii State Plan and make recommendations to the next Legislature. An indeterminate amount of money is appropriated for this purpose. Part II requires the High Technology Development Corporation to create a First Responders Technology Campus and Cyber Security Command Center. An indeterminate amount of money is appropriated for this purpose.

In this case, there are two concerns: First, part II of the proposed S.D. 1 is not encompassed within the scope of the title, "Relating to State Planning." Second, part I and part II of this bill are of such dissimilar subjects that they cannot be logically understood as being related to each other or parts of a single subject.

In the case of Schwab v. Ariyoshi, 58 Haw. 25, 564 P.2d 135 (1977), the Hawaii Supreme Court evaluated the language of section 15, article III, of the State Constitution (1975), and section 45, of the Organic Act, both pertaining to the requirements for a single subject, and both containing language identical to that contained in article III, section 14, of the Hawaii State Constitution.

We acknowledge that laws are presumptively valid and should not be nullified on subject-title grounds unless the violation is "plain, clear, manifest, and unmistakable." <u>Schwab v. Ariyoshi</u>, 58 Haw. at 31. Nevertheless, the Hawaii Supreme Court has held that "an act which contains provisions neither suggested by the title, nor germane to the subject expressed therein, is, to that extent void." <u>Id.</u> at 34, quoting <u>Territory v. Dondero</u>, 21 Haw. 19, 29 (1912).

In this case, the creation of the First Responders Technology Campus and Cyber Security Command Center as set forth in part II of this proposed bill is not suggested by nor germane to the bill's title, "Relating to State Planning." Consequently, part II of the proposed S.D. 1 is in violation of article III, section 14, of the Hawaii State Constitution.

Furthermore, the different parts of the bill must have some relationship with each other. The court in <u>Schwab</u> explained the purposes of the single-subject requirement, as follows:

First, to prevent hodge-podge or logrolling legislation, second, to prevent surprise or fraud upon the Legislature by means of provisions in bills of which titles give no intimation; and third, to apprise the people of proposed matters of legislation.

<u>Id.</u> at 30-31.

The Hawaii Supreme Court further stated:

To constitute duplicity of subject, an act must embrace two or more dissimilar and discordant subjects that by no fair intendment can be considered as having any legitimate connection with or relation to each other. All that is necessary is that act should embrace some one general subject; and by this is meant, merely, that all matters treated of should fall under some one general idea, be so connected with or related to each other, either logically or in popular understanding, as to be parts of, or germane to, one general subject.

<u>Id.</u> at 33, quoting <u>Johnson v. Harrison</u>, 47 Minn. 575, 50 N.W. 923, 924 (1894).

In this case, part I of the proposed S.D. 1 requires the Office of Planning to review the Hawaii State Plan. Part II of the proposed S.D. 1 requires the High Technology Development Corporation to create the First Responders Technology Campus and Cyber Security Command Center. Part I and part II are not connected to each other, are not related to each other, and are not logically or in popular understanding parts of or germane to a single general subject.

Accordingly, inclusion of part II of the proposed bill violates article III, section 14 of the Hawaii State Constitution.

I am Keone Kali, Chief Information Officer in the Office of Information Management and Technology (OIMT), speaking in support of the intent of H.B. 2518, HD1 (SD1 Proposed) Relating to State Planning that proposes a First Responders Technology Campus and Cyber Security Command Center.

The OIMT is undertaking a multi-year program to improve the reliability, availability, and capabilities of the State's data processing and communications infrastructure which support all State departments, including emergency response and public safety agencies. Specific actions include developing a centralized security operations center that coordinates State cyber security activities; and moving State's data centers and critical network switching centers from the Honolulu Civic Center to locations that will likely survive tsunamis, hurricanes, and other disasters. The OIMT has arrangements with several Oahu commercial data center service providers and with the High Technology Development Center and the Pacific Disaster Center on Maui to serve as backup facilities, and is exploring options at the University of Hawaii and county facilities.

The proposed First Responders Technology Campus and Cyber Security Command Center provides a needed secure, survivable state-operated facility for our data systems and security operations. When building that facility, OIMT can share its data center, communications, and cyber security planning and operational experience. Further, OIMT's data center consultant is available to meet with the committee to review other aspects of this proposal in detail. The OIMT defers to Budget and Finance about funding options, and to the respective expertise of the High Technology Development Corporation and the State Department of Defense to review, organize, and operate appropriate facilities and to provide other services required by first responder and law enforcement agencies proposed in this bill.

We thank the Committee for this opportunity to testify in support of the intent of this proposal that will protect the State's critical infrastructure, share our resources, and improve our public safety.

Chairs Dela Cruz, Espero, and Wakai, and Vice Chairs Slom, Baker, and Nishihara, and Members of the Committees:

The Chamber provides the following **comments** on HB 2518 HD 1 which proposes to provide for a comprehensive review of the Hawaii State Plan by:

- 1. Requiring the Office of Planning to:
 - a. Review the Hawaii State Plan to recommend amendments for updating the Hawaii State Plan in response to current state needs; and
 - b. Submit a written report to the Legislature no later than 30 days prior to the convening of the 2016 Regular Session of its findings, recommendations, and proposed legislation, with respect to reviewing and proposing updates to the State Planning Act; and
- 2. Appropriating funds (\$500,000.00) for the Office of Planning to review and propose updates to the State Planning Act.

The Chamber is the largest business organization in Hawaii, representing more than 1,000 businesses. Approximately 80% of our members are small businesses with less than 20 employees. As the "Voice of Business" in Hawaii, the organization works on behalf of its members, which employ more than 200,000 individuals, to improve the state's economic climate and to foster positive action on issues of common concern.

We understand that the State Plans have not been updated since the 1980's which seems to indicate that the plans were not required or adhered to for several years. We strongly support the need for sound planning especially when it provides the future vision for the State. However, considering the time lapse of almost 30 years since the plans were last updated, perhaps there needs to be some consideration given as to how the results of the update will be implemented or managed before expending \$500,000.00.

Finally, if the State Plan is a living state document that is being managed by the Office of Planning, why is a separate appropriation required to update the plan as opposed to updates and modification being done as a part of their normal duties and responsibilities?
