

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ENCOURAGING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO ESTABLISH A FETAL ALCOHOL SPECTRUM DISORDER INTERAGENCY COORDINATING COUNCIL TO COORDINATE AND DEVELOP FETAL ALCOHOL SPECTRUM DISORDER INFORMATION, EDUCATION, POLICIES, AND SUPPORT SERVICES.

WHEREAS, fetal alcohol spectrum disorder is one of the most 1 underdiagnosed developmental disabilities in Hawaii and across 2 the country; and 3 4 WHEREAS, nationwide, approximately forty thousand newborns 5 per year are affected by fetal alcohol spectrum disorder; and 6 7 WHEREAS, according to Hawaii pregnancy risk assessment 8 monitoring system data, one thousand three hundred women who 9 gave birth in Hawaii during the years 2009 to 2011 reported that 10 they drank alcohol in the last trimester of their pregnancy, and 11 two hundred women per year reported binge drinking during their 12 last trimester; and 13 14 WHEREAS, there are more cases of fetal alcohol spectrum 15 disorder than down syndrome, cerebral palsy, sudden infant death 16 syndrome, cystic fibrosis, and spina bifida combined; and 17 18 WHEREAS, the effects of prenatal alcohol exposure are 19 lifelong and can include physical, mental, behavioral, and 20 learning disabilities; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, fetal alcohol exposure is the leading cause of intellectual disabilities in the United States, and individuals 24 with diagnosed or undiagnosed fetal alcohol exposure often 25 suffer from secondary disabilities such as child abuse and 26 neglect, family separation, multiple foster placements, school 27 related failure, juvenile delinguency, job instability, 28 depression, aggression, and other serious mental health 29 disorders; and 30 31

WHEREAS, the intellectual disabilities and secondary 1 disabilities come at a high cost to the individual, their 2 families, and society; and 3 4 WHEREAS, caring for someone with fetal alcohol spectrum 5 disorder costs between \$1,400,000 and \$1,500,000 over a 6 7 lifetime; and 8 9 WHEREAS, fetal alcohol spectrum disorder is completely preventable, and the devastating effects of fetal alcohol 10 exposure can be substantially reduced by early diagnosis and 11 appropriate, effective intervention; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, poor coordination of resources hampers prevention, diagnosis, and service delivery; and 15 16 WHEREAS, fourteen states nationwide have established 17 permanent fetal alcohol spectrum disorder coordinators who serve 18 as key educational, informational, and coordinative links 19 between departments and agencies dealing with persons with fetal 20 alcohol spectrum disorder; and 21 22 WHEREAS, the fetal alcohol spectrum disorder-specific 23 services that exist in Hawaii are very minimal and the State 24 does not have any coordinated effort to address the issue; and 25 26 WHEREAS, fetal alcohol spectrum disorder is a statewide 27 public health concern that has service, policy, and economic 28 implications for virtually all state departments; now, 29 30 therefore, 31 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 32 Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 33 Session of 2014, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 34 Health is encouraged to establish a Fetal Alcohol Spectrum 35 Disorder Interagency Coordinating Council within the 36 Department's Family Health Services Division to coordinate and 37 develop fetal alcohol spectrum disorder information, education, 38 policies, and support services statewide; and 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council comprise no more 41 than seventeen members as follows; provided that each member 42 43 representing a state agency be a person with the authority to influence policy in the member's respective agency: 44 2014-1599 HCR SMA.doc


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
