A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STUDENT HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 302A-1164, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2 amended to read as follows:

3 "§302A-1164 Self-administration of medication by student
4 and emergency administration permitted. (a) [~~The~~] In
5 accordance with this section, the department shall permit:

6 (1) The self-administration of medication by a student for
7 asthma, anaphylaxis, or other potentially
8 life-threatening illnesses; [~~and~~]

9 (2) Department employees and agents to volunteer to
10 administer glucagon in an emergency situation to
11 students with diabetes[~~-~~]; and

12 (3) Department employees and agents to volunteer to
13 administer epinephrine in an emergency situation to a
14 student that the employee or agent believes in good
15 faith to be having an anaphylactic reaction.

16 (b) The student's parent or guardian shall provide the
17 department with:



- 1 (1) Written authorization for the self-administration of
2 medication or the emergency administration of
3 glucagon[+] or epinephrine;
- 4 (2) In the case of self-administration of medication,
5 written certification from the student's physician or
6 physician assistant stating that the student:
- 7 (A) Has asthma, anaphylaxis, or another potentially
8 life-threatening illness; and
- 9 (B) Is capable of, and has been instructed in, the
10 proper method of self-administration of
11 medication; [~~and~~]
- 12 (3) In the case of emergency administration of glucagon to
13 a student with diabetes, written certification from
14 the student's physician or physician assistant stating
15 that the student has medical orders that glucagon may
16 be administered by a volunteer[+]; and
- 17 (4) In the case of emergency administration of epinephrine
18 to a student with anaphylaxis, written certification
19 from the student's physician or physician assistant
20 stating that epinephrine may be administered to the
21 student by a volunteer.



1 (c) The department shall inform the student's parent or
2 guardian in writing that the department and its employees or
3 agents shall not incur any liability as a result of any injury
4 arising from compliance with this section.

5 (d) The student's parent or guardian shall sign a
6 statement acknowledging that:

7 (1) The department and its employees or agents shall not
8 incur any liability as a result of any injury arising
9 from compliance with this section; and

10 (2) The parent or guardian shall indemnify and hold
11 harmless the department and its employees or agents
12 against any claims arising out of compliance with this
13 section.

14 (e) The permission shall be effective for the school year
15 for which it is granted and shall be renewed for each subsequent
16 school year upon the fulfillment of the requirements in this
17 section.

18 (f) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, a
19 student who is permitted to self-administer medication under
20 this section shall be permitted to carry an inhaler or
21 auto-injectable epinephrine, or both, at all times if the
22 student does not endanger the student's person or other persons



1 through the misuse of the inhaler; provided that the department,
2 its employees or agents may confiscate a student's medication,
3 inhaler, or auto-injectable epinephrine if the student's
4 self-administration of the medication exceeds the student's
5 prescribed dosage, or if the student endangers others with the
6 student's medication, inhaler, or auto-injectable epinephrine.

7 For the purposes of this section, the term "inhaler"
8 includes:

- 9 (1) Metered-dose, breath-actuated, and dry powder
10 inhalers; and
11 (2) Spacers and holding chambers.

12 (g) Any employee or agent who volunteers to administer
13 glucagon in an emergency situation to a student with diabetes
14 shall receive instruction in the proper administration of
15 glucagon by a qualified health care professional. [~~A "qualified~~
16 ~~health care professional" means a licensed physician, physician~~
17 ~~assistant, advanced practice registered nurse or registered~~
18 ~~nurse, or certified diabetes educator.~~] The student's parent or
19 guardian shall supply the school with the glucagon kit required
20 to administer the glucagon. The school shall store the glucagon
21 kit in a secure but accessible location.



1 (h) Any employee or agent who volunteers to administer
2 epinephrine in an emergency situation to a student with
3 anaphylaxis shall receive instruction in the proper
4 administration of epinephrine by a qualified health care
5 professional. The school shall maintain a current supply of
6 auto-injectable epinephrine in at least two secure locations
7 that are accessible to department employees and agents; provided
8 that:

9 (1) The auto-injectable epinephrine shall not be stored in
10 a locked container or location; and

11 (2) The school's supply of auto-injectable epinephrine
12 shall include quantities sufficient to accommodate
13 students with unknown allergic conditions.

14 ~~(h)~~ (i) Any person, except for a qualified health care
15 professional providing the training required in subsection
16 (g) ~~(7)~~ or (h), who acts in accordance with the requirements of
17 this section shall be immune from any civil or criminal
18 liability arising from these acts, except where the person's
19 conduct would constitute gross negligence, wilful and wanton
20 misconduct, or intentional misconduct.

21 (j) For the purposes of this section, "qualified health
22 care professional" means a licensed physician, physician




1 assistant, advanced practice registered nurse or registered
2 nurse, or certified diabetes educator."

4 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.


5 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.


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

Report Title:

Student Health and Safety; Anaphylaxis; Emergency Administration of Epinephrine

Description:

Authorizes trained school personnel to administer epinephrine to a student believed to be having an anaphylactic emergency, with the written authorization of the student's parent or guardian and medical certification that epinephrine may be administered to the student. Requires schools to maintain a supply of epinephrine for anaphylactic emergencies.
