
SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO DESIGNATE THE ROYAL ORDER OF KAMEHAMEHA AS THE KONOHIKI OF KA'AWALOA TO HAVE OVERSIGHT AND MANAGEMENT OF KA'AWALOA, TO FORMULATE A MASTER PLAN FOR KA'AWALOA, AND TO EXPLORE THE POSSIBILITY OF LEASING KA'AWALOA LAND TO THE NONPROFIT ROYAL ORDER OF KAMEHAMEHA.

1 WHEREAS, the discovery of the Hawaiian Islands by Captain
2 James Cook in 1778 was an event of worldwide implications; and
3

4 WHEREAS, the Hawaiian Islands were immediately recognized
5 as a strategic discovery, serving as a refueling port and midway
6 point in traversing the vast Pacific Ocean, which dramatically
7 and forever altered the destiny of an island civilization that
8 had evolved for centuries in isolation from the rest of the
9 world; and
10

11 WHEREAS, Ka'awaloa was the vibrant village and home of
12 Kalaniopu'u, the ruling chief of Hawai'i in 1778, and it was also
13 where Captain Cook anchored his two sailing vessels in the
14 offshore waters of Kealakekua Bay to engage and learn about life
15 in the islands and restock food and water supplies; and
16

17 WHEREAS, Captain Cook's introduction of western
18 civilization to Hawaii, along with its technologies, weapons,
19 and diseases, dramatically altered the underpinnings of a simple
20 yet sophisticated island society; and
21

22 WHEREAS, Captain Cook was killed on the shoreline of
23 Ka'awaloa as a result of a number of incidents and cultural
24 missteps with native villagers; news of his demise spread
25 rapidly throughout Europe, followed by a steady and unending
26 flow of vessels to the Hawaiian Islands from nations throughout
27 the world; and

1 WHEREAS, the discovery of the Hawaiian Islands by Captain
2 Cook brought dramatic changes to Hawaii's ancient governance,
3 religion, economy, and societal structure that were amplified by
4 the fact that native Hawaiians lacked immunities to the simplest
5 of illnesses which were nonexistent in the islands but prevalent
6 throughout the western world; and
7

8 WHEREAS, there was no meaningful action to honor the death
9 and remains of Captain Cook at Ka'awaloa, and one hundred years
10 after his death the British government erected a monument on the
11 site where he died on a parcel near the shoreline, which was
12 gifted by the Hawaiian Kingdom to the British counsel; and
13

14 WHEREAS, while no event or place in the Hawaiian Islands
15 rivals the worldwide impact and historic stature of Captain
16 Cook's discovery and subsequent death at Ka'awaloa, no other
17 event or place in the Hawaiian Islands can be linked to the
18 indiscriminate loss of life and irreparable impairment that
19 ravished the health, character, and destiny of Hawaii's native
20 inhabitants who died at an inordinate rate from the simplest of
21 illnesses; and
22

23 WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii has struggled for years to
24 gain the necessary support for a plan that appropriately honors
25 Ka'awaloa, without the broad based support of the families of the
26 neighboring communities and the numerous native Hawaiian
27 organizations involved in the preservation, perpetuation, and
28 advocacy of native Hawaiian culture; and
29

30 WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii provides a special designation
31 to Iolani Palace and the Royal Mausoleum under the
32 administration of the Division of State Parks; and
33

34 WHEREAS, Ka'awaloa should be viewed as the predecessor of
35 Iolani Palace, having been the ancient seat of governance for
36 the ruling chief of the islands in 1778; and
37

38 WHEREAS, Ka'awaloa was a mausoleum for Hawaii's ruling
39 chiefs who were buried in the cliffs that buttressed Ka'awaloa as
40 well as grave sites and heiau within the village that required
41 greater security and oversight; and

1 WHEREAS, the Royal Order of Kamehameha was established in
2 1865 by Kamehameha V, Lot Kapuaiwa, to honor his grandfather
3 Kamehameha the Great who unified the Kingdom of Hawaii not long
4 after the death of Captain James Cook; and
5

6 WHEREAS, the Royal Order of Kamehameha continues to observe
7 and preserve the ancient traditions, rituals, and customs of
8 Hawaii's ancient leaders and understands the sensitivities,
9 protocols, and cultural nuances that are essential to the
10 historical and cultural underpinnings of the State of Hawaii;
11 and
12

13 WHEREAS, the Royal Order of Kamehameha is broadly
14 recognized and acknowledged throughout Hawai'i as the preeminent
15 leader, responsible for sustaining Hawaii's ancient traditions,
16 obligations, and duties in perpetuity for all future
17 generations; and
18

19 WHEREAS, the Aha Moku Advisory Committee has the
20 responsibility under section 171-4.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
21 to provide to the Department of Land and Natural Resources
22 advice on integrating indigenous resource management practices
23 with western management practices in each moku, among other
24 things; now, therefore,
25

26 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-seventh
27 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2014, the
28 House of Representatives concurring, that:
29

- 30 (1) The Department of Land and Natural Resources is
31 requested to designate the Royal Order of Kamehameha
32 as the konohiki of Ka'awaloa, to have oversight and
33 management of Ka'awaloa;
34
- 35 (2) The Royal Order of Kamehameha, in its capacity as
36 konohiki of Ka'awaloa, is requested to formulate a
37 master plan for Ka'awaloa that honors Hawaii's most
38 consequential historical event, the discovery of the
39 Hawaiian Islands and its introduction to Western
40 civilization;
41
- 42 (3) In the formulation of the Ka'awaloa Master Plan, the
43 Royal Order of Kamehameha is requested to consult with



1 the Aha Moku Advisory Committee and all trusts
2 established by the descendants of Kamehameha the Great
3 for the benefit of native Hawaiians, including the
4 Queen Liliuokalani Trust, Kamehameha Schools, The
5 Queen's Health Systems, Lunalilo Trust, Trustees of
6 the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the executive
7 leadership of the Hawaiian Civic Clubs, as well as the
8 families and community organizations of Napo'opo'o;
9

10 (4) The Royal Order of Kamehameha, in formulating the
11 Ka'awaloa Master Plan, is requested to consult with
12 Hawaii County, which has announced its intention to
13 complete the second phase of the highway, a requisite
14 of the Hokulia project that will provide a more
15 readily available access to Ka'awaloa, and to also
16 consult with the major landowners in the vicinity,
17 including the Keauhou Resort, Hokulia, and neighboring
18 ranches; and
19

20 (5) The Department of Land and Natural Resources is
21 requested to explore the possibility of leasing the
22 Ka'awaloa land of approximately forty acres to the
23 nonprofit Royal Order of Kamehameha for a nominal sum;
24 and
25

26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Land and
27 Natural Resources is requested to fund the costs of formulating
28 the Ka'awaloa Master Plan; and
29

30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Land and
31 Natural Resources is requested to report to the Legislature on
32 the details of the Ka'awaloa Master Plan no later than twenty
33 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2015; and
34

35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
36 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the
37 Board of Land and Natural Resources and the Royal Order of
38 Kamehameha.
