
SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ENDORISING AND SUPPORTING THE ALOHA+ CHALLENGE.

1 WHEREAS, Hawaii is recognized as a global island leader in
2 sustainability; and

3
4 WHEREAS, Hawaii exemplifies the urgent need for action on
5 the global challenge to build more sustainable economies, as
6 Hawaii's people depend on imports for roughly 95 percent of
7 their energy and 85 percent of their food, at an estimated
8 annual cost of more than \$8,000,000,000; and

9
10 WHEREAS, the Global Island Partnership (GLISPA), a
11 partnership for all islands regardless of size or political
12 status, works with island leaders around the world to conceive,
13 launch, and implement inspiring and successful high-level
14 commitments to island conservation and sustainable livelihoods;
15 and

17 WHEREAS, GLISPA invited Hawaii to join the Partnership in
18 September of 2013, and make a high-level international
19 commitment to sustainability because of the State's track record
20 and aspirations to build a more secure, sustainable, and
21 resilient island economy, community, and environment; and

23 WHEREAS, when Governor Abercrombie accepted GLISPA's
24 invitation at a Washington Place reception for GLISPA
25 representative Ambassador Jumeau from the Seychelles, he said,
26 "Hawaii will join the Global Island Partnership to share
27 Hawaii's successes and learn from other islands," and agreed to
28 invite Hawaii's elected chief executives, legislators, and other
29 leaders to join him in a statewide commitment to sustainability;

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32 WHEREAS, Hawaii Green Growth is a voluntary partnership of
33 state, county, federal, business, and nongovernmental leaders



1 from many sectors, including clean energy, local food
2 production, natural resource management, waste reduction,
3 climate change mitigation and adaptation, planning, green jobs,
4 and others, that is ready to support a shared statewide
5 commitment to sustainability; and
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7 WHEREAS, drawing from experience from other international
8 commitments, key elements for an *Aloha+ Challenge: A Culture of*
9 *Sustainability -- He Nohona 'Ae'oi*a have been outlined, with
10 principles and targets based on current state priorities and
11 policies; and
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13 WHEREAS, the Hawaii State Legislature has a proven track
14 record of supporting sustainability across economic, social, and
15 environmental sectors, including providing guidance to assure a
16 sustainable future through the Hawaii 2050 Task Force and
17 Sustainability Plan established in Act 8, Special Session Laws
18 of Hawaii 2005, and establishing sustainability as a priority in
19 the Hawaii State Plan under chapter 226, Hawaii Revised
20 Statutes; and

22 WHEREAS, the Hawaii State Planning Act defines
23 sustainability and provides guiding principles for the *Aloha+*
24 *Challenge*, including:
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- 26 (1) Respecting the culture, character, beauty, and history
27 of the State's island communities;

- 29 (2) Striking a balance between economic, social,
30 community, and environmental priorities;

- 32 (3) Meeting the needs of the present without compromising
33 the ability of future generations to meet their own
34 needs; and

- 36 (4) Addressing the impacts of climate change and
37 increasing climate change resilience; and
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39 WHEREAS, the Governor, Mayors of all the Counties, and the
40 Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs
41 have expressed their interest in accepting the *Aloha+ Challenge*;

1 WHEREAS, leadership and support by the Hawaii State
2 Legislature is critical for the success of implementing the
3 *Aloha+ Challenge*; and

5 WHEREAS, a statewide commitment to the *Aloha+ Challenge*
6 will help to:

- 8 (1) Increase strategic support from key county, state, and
9 federal agencies, elected officials, and partner
10 organizations, working together with the private
11 sector, on a shared green growth agenda;

13 (2) Attract global and regional meetings to Hawaii to
14 share Hawaii's green growth experience, such as
15 Hawaii's proposal to host the World Conservation
16 Congress in 2016;

18 (3) Expand regional collaboration on shared issues, such
19 as invasive species, climate change, fisheries, and
20 ocean resource management;
 - 21
22 (4) Promote:
 - 23 (A) Accountability and continuity for long-term
24 implementation through agreed measures;
 - 25
26 (B) A committed public-private partnership across the
27 State; and
 - 28
29 (C) Local, national, and international attention to
30 support progress on Hawaii targets;

 - 33 (5) Increase Hawaii's federal standing by supporting
34 national sustainability initiatives and targets, such
35 as the Federal Leadership in Environmental, Energy and
36 Economic Performance (Executive Order 13514); and

 - 38 (6) Strengthen Hawaii's partnerships with federal
39 agencies, international organizations, and other
40 islands, including the United States Department of
41 Energy, United States Department of Defense, United
42 States Department of State, President's Task Force on
43 Climate Preparedness and Resilience, National Invasive



Species Council, Global Island Partnership, and others; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2014, the House of Representatives concurring, that this body endorses and supports the integrated approach and six ambitious targets of the Aloha+ Challenge to be achieved by 2030, which include:

- (1) Clean Energy: 70 percent clean energy, including 40 percent from renewables and 30 percent from efficiency;
- (2) Local Food: At least double the local food production with a goal of 20-30 percent of food consumed being grown locally;
- (3) Natural Resource Management: Reverse the trend of natural resource loss mauka to makai by increasing watershed protection, community-based marine management, invasive species prevention and control, and restoration of native species;
- (4) Waste Reduction: Reduce the solid waste stream prior to disposal by 50 percent, through source reduction, recycling, and bioconversion;
- (5) Smart Sustainable Communities: Increase livability and resilience in the built environment through planning and implementation at the state and county levels; and
- (6) Green Workforce: Increase local green jobs and education to implement these targets; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii State Sustainability Coordinator is requested to submit a report to the Legislature no later than 20 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2015 on the launch of the Aloha+ Challenge, including recommendations for promoting action and tracking progress on the statewide sustainability targets; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor who in turn



1 is requested to transmit a copy to the Director of each
2 executive department, the Mayor of each county, and the Chair of
3 the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.
