S.B. No. 2072 (H.D. 1):

Senator Shimabukuro moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2072, seconded by Senator Galuteria.

At 10:15 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:15 a.m.

Senator Shimabukuro noted:

"Thank you so much, Madam President. The purpose of S.B. No. 2072 is to specify the manner by which summons are served for actions in the nature of assumpsit within the state. It will allow for a service of process to be delivered via certified, registered, or express mail only after actions and the reasonable attempts have been made to deliver the summons by personal delivery. It's limited to cases in the nature of assumpsit, which are cases that allow for recovery of damages for non-performance of a contract. There are currently a number of other instances where certified mail is an accepted means of service, such as small claims cases, cases involving property, operation of motor vehicles, cases involving boat operators, and under the Long-Arm Statute.

"This measure allows for the same thing for cases in the nature of assumpsit. The Committee on Judiciary passed it as is, and we're asking the Senate to agree to the House amendments that limited the scope of the bill to cases of assumpsit only. This will prevent the bill from possibly interfering with or overlapping other exceptions that allow for service of process through certified mail."

"Madam President, I rise in strong support of HB 2618 HD2 SD2. This bill incentivizes energy storage to help stabilize the electrical grid. Given that we're working to ramp up our use of renewable energy as quickly as possible to end our dependence on fossil fuel, we should be looking at cutting edge technologies to help us get there. In June 2013, California became the first state to set a target of achieving 1.3 GW of utility-scale energy storage by 2020. Some of the energy storage projects underway in California include: EV to grid projects, a solar-thermal power project incorporating molten salt energy storage, a compressed air energy storage system, and storage projects using sodium-sulfur batteries.

"Energy storage is one of the keys to taking us to the next level in our clean energy goals. As we know, solar and wind are intermittent power sources and when the sun isn't shining and the wind isn't blowing, those systems aren't generating power. So energy storage systems are kind of a 'holy grail' which allows that power to be stored for later use and makes it easier on our utilities to keep the power running smoothly. This bill applies to only utility-scale energy storage, so the number of taxpayers utilizing this tax credit will be limited. It does not apply to someone putting batteries in their backyard, but would only apply to large-scale facilities that will help to stabilize the grid. However, it would enable the utilities to accept more renewable energy, including PV. I ask you to join me in supporting HB 2618 HD2 SD2. Mahalo."

"Madam President, I rise in strong support of HB 1943 HD2 SD2. This bill came about because of the problems that net energy metered customers were having in interconnecting to the HECO grid. We received a lot of testimony from folks venting about HECO, mostly from frustrated PV owners. Our utilities need to ensure that those folks can connect to the grid in a timely manner without facing huge costs. You might have heard about former U.S. Department of Energy Secretary Steven Chu's recent quote in *Forbes Magazine* about HECO's decision to limit solar installation and I quote: 'Solar installations don't threaten grid stability until they approach 20 percent of the customer base. In Hawai'i solar is at 2 percent. Instead of that, you need a better business model. So I'm telling utility companies, this is coming down the line, so let's think of a new business model.'

“This bill would address this situation, but also goes beyond just distributed generation. The problem is that our electrical grids are antiquated and aren’t keeping up our rapidly changing world. This bill helps the PUC and the utilities get started on the road to modernization of the grids. This bill would require the PUC to commence regulatory action, either through one or more dockets or through a working group, to address the technical, policy and economic issues associated with grid modernization. My office put together our own working group, consisting of the PUC, Consumer Advocate, DBEDT, HECO, KIUC, HSEA, PV Coalition and Sierra Club, to come up with a consensus draft for this bill. And I’m pleased to announce that the working group recently reached ‘kumbaya’ on a consensus draft. I will be submitting that consensus draft as a proposed conference draft. I thank all those who have helped with the process. Colleagues, I ask for your support of this bill. Mahalo.”

"Besides the fact that I think the bill was hastily put together and is vague in many areas, I think it's going to increase the cost to the taxpayers. I know that the counties, particularly the City and County of Honolulu, at this time are looking for more revenue, but they're looking for revenue at the expense of taxpayers, who are already overburdened. Thank you."

We should have had an exemption from Obamacare from the very outset; we have a Prepaid Health Care Act, which has worked quite well since 1974. We have seen that people are now blaming the Prepaid Health Care Act for our additional costs and the dysfunction of the healthcare exchange, but it's not that at all. The Prepaid Health Care Act should have been left alone; we should have had the exemption beforehand. Now, to try to talk about it and wait until 2017, I think, is going to cost us more money and more bureaucracy. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'm delighted to hear that our Minority Leader supports so strongly the Prepaid Health Care Act, and I believe that that act has served us well. As we move into health transformation, which will actually help to improve the delivery of healthcare services to our state – to all of our residents, including those that may be underinsured at the moment – this measure will give us an opportunity to continue to be creative and innovative in the ways that we can provide for access to high-quality healthcare services in our state. I believe it's a measure that should move forward, and I have some additional remarks I'd like to have included in the Journal. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's additional remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in SUPPORT OF HB2581, SD2 Relating to Insurance

"The purpose of HB2581 is to establish a State Innovation Waiver Task Force of interested stakeholders to develop a unified strategy for a universal health insurance coverage system that meets consumer and provider needs, adds value and convenience to employers, and is economically sustainable. This group develop the healthcare strategic plan in order to obtain a state innovation waiver from certain requirements of the Affordable Care Act.

"This bill is necessary for Hawai'i to remain in control of its own healthcare and health insurance practices. We have always been in the forefront of healthcare innovation as seen through the Hawaii Prepaid Healthcare Act, our state's Medicaid program and various gap group strategies. These practices have advanced us to the point where the ACA makes our system more complicated than it needs to be.

"When we developed and passed legislation to form the Hawaii Healthcare Connector, we did so to maintain autonomy and to preserve our Prepaid Healthcare law. HB2581 establishes a task force that will develop a waiver request from various requirements of the ACA so that Hawai'i will continue to be in control of healthcare for its residents. We know what is best for us. We have a long history of providing better care for our residents than other states.

"The innovation waiver goes hand in hand with the sustainability of the Health Connector. States that are granted innovation waivers may receive federal assistance to operate their reform programs in an amount that is equivalent to the aggregate amount of tax credits and cost-sharing subsidies that the federal government would have paid for individuals enrolled in state health insurance exchanges. The goal of the innovation waiver is to provide the people of Hawai'i with the best possible healthcare options. By continuing to manage our local exchange, we are better positioned to accomplish this goal. We need to lead the charge instead of being dragged along and told what makes good health care policy.

"I urge my colleagues to join me to pass HB2581, SD2 to ensure that we continue to remain at the forefront of best practice in healthcare and provide the people of Hawai'i the best possible healthcare options available. Mahalo."

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise in strong support of this measure and have remarks that I’d like to have inserted in the Journal, please. Thank you.”

“Madam President, **I rise in support of HB2012, SD2 - Relating to Consumer Protection.**

“The purpose of HB2012 is to put the Hawai‘i consumer first when it comes to ticket sales for local events. Hawai‘i prohibits ticket scalping at boxing and mixed martial arts events, but doesn’t have restrictions on ticket scalping at other major events.

“CPN worked with the various stakeholders involved to craft a bill that supports our local consumers by reigning in exorbitant prices on scalped tickets and starting the sale of tickets at a reasonable time for Hawai‘i residents.

“Because of Hawaii’s location, Hawai‘i consumers are at a disadvantage when tickets go on sale, since many sales begin in much earlier time zones. HB2012 restricts commencing online ticket sale times to after 8:00 a.m. Hawaii Standard Time or before the primary ticket seller commences sales, whichever is later, to make sure that our Hawai‘i consumers have a fair chance to purchase tickets.

“As technology changes, we need to make sure our laws adapt to those advances. An important aspect of this legislation addresses ticket brokers who use computer software to circumvent online ticket queues and buy large blocks of tickets in seconds. The bill makes such actions a misdemeanor and tracks legislation from California that is recognized as one of the toughest anti-scalping laws. This bill will provide tools for civil and criminal enforcement authorities to investigate and prosecute allegations of illegal and unfair ticket selling practices.

“I urge my colleagues to pass HB 2012, SD2 so that the people of Hawai‘i aren’t held hostage by ticket scalpers or remain at a disadvantage for online purchases because of time zones when it comes purchasing tickets for events at local venues. Mahalo.”

So, I see this as a way of taking more money and then saying that we need to increase the conveyance tax. Thank you.”

We also have problems with cybersecurity in the health connector, as we’ve seen, and I know that the CIO has had difficulty in getting support from various departments and agencies. I think we need to correct that first before we add a new department. Thank you.”

“The purpose of this legislation is to balance the public’s concern of abuse of power with the ability of council members to attend and discuss council business at community meetings or similar events. This legislation is intended to help allow greater communication with the public, subject to appropriate limitations, by establishing a limited meetings category where any number of council members can attend public community meetings to hear and discuss concerns in the community without violating Chapter 92, HRS, the sunshine law.

“The sunshine laws were established to help promote transparency in government. Unfortunately, sometimes they are also a hindrance to hearing from the community. Council members are unable to attend important community meetings together that can be educational and better inform future decision-making. The public is then unable to have the opportunity to interact and question the council as a whole rather than just a few members. Instead, many times, the public feels that members do not actually care about a particular community or don’t seem aware of community concerns because not all are in attendance, when that is not the case. The community doesn’t always appreciate or understand why all council members can’t come to a meeting in their community.

“Passage of HB2139 will help to promote the rich and multifaceted dialogue that is necessary to implement the best practices in our local communities. It will lead to even greater transparency because the public will have the opportunity to more freely interact with more council members at community meetings to provide better insight into multi-faceted issues before decisions are made and policies are implemented.

“I urge my colleagues to pass this measure to help increase dialogue and transparency at the county level. Mahalo.”

“I think we’re all concerned about the incidence of skin cancer and also about UV rays, but I find several interesting things in this bill about tanning salons and ‘under 18.’ I spoke to people in the industry; no one seems to have been contacted or asked for what policies are, and most of the companies that I’m aware of, they already do not allow below 18-year-olds to have tanning unless there’s parental consent. So, what this bill does is take away parental consent, and it’s interesting that you can have a minor get tattoos and piercings with parental consent. So if, in fact, we want to involve parents in this process, there should have been an application for that. It is not; it’s a total ban. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise in strong support of this measure, and have some remarks that would begin to refute the comments of the previous speaker, and would like to have those inserted into the Journal, please.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Madam President, I rise in strong support of HB 611, SD1 - RELATING TO TANNING.

“HB 611 will make it unlawful for anyone who is under the age of 18 to use a tanning bed. It further requires tanning facilities to post notices that disclose the health risks associated with using tanning beds. The only exemptions to this legislation would be for physicians licensed to use ultraviolet light as a form of treatment.

“This bill is necessary to protect public health. Most people know that prolonged exposure to the sun’s ultraviolet rays is harmful. However, many people do not know that tanning via artificial ultraviolet light delivers levels of radiation 10-15 times higher than the mid-day sun. In fact, there is a misconception that a ‘base tan,’ obtained by using tanning devices protects from actual sun exposure. This is false.

“In 2009, the International Agency for Research on Cancer elevated tanning devices to its highest cancer risk category – ‘carcinogenic to humans.’ Excessive ultraviolet radiation

exposure, particularly during childhood and adolescence, is an important predictor of future health consequences.

“According to the American Cancer Society:

- Those who use tanning beds prior to age 35 have a 59% increased risk of melanoma, the most deadly of all skin cancers;
- Melanoma is one of the most common cancers among men and women aged 15-29 years;
- Using a tanning bed increases the risk of two types of skin cancer, squamous and basal cell carcinomas, by 67% and 29% respectively;
- UV radiation from indoor tanning and other sources is cumulative over time. The earlier a person starts tanning, the greater the risk of getting melanoma and other skin cancers later in life.

“Furthermore, the tanning bed industry lacks regulation. There are no guidelines regarding exposure times and frequencies, education of employees or information given to consumers.

“Passage of HB 611, SD1 will help protect public health by appropriately regulating the use of tanning beds and educating unaware consumers in the process. I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo.”

Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“As some folks observed when we started, the women of the Senate got together to take a photo because today is Equal Pay Day, and I just wanted to make sure that everyone understood what that meant. It’s the day representing how far into 2014 a woman has to work to earn a salary equal to what a man earned in 2013. So, women in America have to work more than three months longer than their male counterparts just to earn the same amount of money.

“I know that we are considering raising the minimum wage and I would note that a number of women, more than men, are at those low-end jobs; and so I join with my colleagues here on the floor in support of increasing the minimum wage to something that would be more acceptable and help women close that gap. And I would just note that Minnesota seems to be poised to increase their minimum wage to \$9.50. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Espero rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you. I’d just like to officially state for the Senate Journal and honor my parents. They’re in ‘Ewa Beach; they’re not here right now, but today they are celebrating their fifty-seventh wedding anniversary. My father, Victor Dungca Espero, from Bacnotan, La Union; and my mother, Paulina Calip Espero, from Santiago, Ilocos Sur.

“And to add to the celebration, my oldest son, the captain in the Marine Corps, is celebrating his thirtieth birthday today, as well. Thank you.”

The Chair extended her congratulations to Senator Espero’s family.
