# In consideration of **HOUSE BILL 2177. HOUSE DRAFT1** RELATING TO COMMUNITY FOOD FORESTS

House Bill 2177, House Draft 1 proposes to establish a community food forest program and make an appropriation for that purpose. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) would support a pilot project to be determined by the Department and as such, recommends that this measure be amended accordingly.

- **Forest Stewardship Program.** Through the Forest Stewardship Program, the Department encourages private landowners to invest in agroforestry projects on both privately owned food forest establishment and community managed agroforestry systems. The Kokua Kalihi Valley project on Oahu is an excellent example of a community managed forest that provides forest resources, food and opportunities for the public to engage in forest management.
- Kaulunani Urban and Community Forestry Program. The Department also supports the Kaulunani Urban and Community Forestry Program, funded in part by the United States Forest Service, which works with local government, communities and schools to increase and improve management of our urban forests and trees, including food bearing trees. Kaulunani has participated in and funded numerous tree planting projects in local schools, parks; along roadways; and in zoos.

The results from a pilot project could be used as a template in other areas of the State. Mahalo for the opportunity to provide testimony on this measure.

Comments: The practice of food forests is well known throughout the world as a means to provide communities with collective resources for every day life, for celebrations, ceremony and the passing of life. The Chipko Andolan (Chipko Movement) of India, founded on Gandhi's practices of nonviolence and the efforts of women to protect the food forests of their communities, is one of the most famous. Across Southeast Asia, such forest gardens are immensely productive and many are hundreds of years old. Hawaii's tropical climate has the capacity to support food forests. Trees; however, take time. They are intergenerational. This bill calls for a 15yr lease period. If you are planning for trees, plan for a lifetime. I would agree with the Dept of Land and Natural Resources that there are a number of challenges to implementing food forests; including vandalism, or becoming dangerous places for residents and children to be, as well as staff and funding limitations. The opportunity for communities to grow forest gardens is also worthy of implementation. I make the following recommendations to HB2177 HD1: 1) that the program refrain from micromanaging the selection of appropriate species in such forests and allow diversity and individuality to be defined by community members, but rather require that no invasive species or gmo plants be established within any food forests under this program; 2) place more long term commitment for management on the communities that seek leases for this purpose from DLNR. Too often projects get abandoned after a few years and food forest management is a long term effort; 3) require a commitment from the community that the products gathered from food forests are solely for home and community consumption and not for individual or collective income generation; 4) make a distinction between community gardens and community food forests by requiring that trees are a significant part each project and incorporated into a minimum of ten percent of plantings throughout a leased parcel; and 5) that UH CTAHR Cooperative Extension Services be the source for guidance and technical assistance in agroforestry and forest gardens rather than the DLNR. Currently UH CES Hawaii Island has a full time agroforestry specialist who is familiar with forest gardening practices, establishment and maintenance. The DLNR Forest Stewardship and Kaulunani programs are geared more towards timber production, native forest restoration and beautifying landscapes rather than orchard crops which would be significant portion of food forest tree species; 6) encourage and support UH CTAHR CES to add a food forest specialist position to each island; 7) allow for the

incorporation of bee hives within food forests to improve food crop pollination and medicinal plants to add to the capacity of communities to care for themselves; 8) that the intention of Talia Abrams to help provide a food resource for the homeless be heard and develop a means for homeless communities to qualify for the planting, maintenance of food forests for direct food benefits provided that they maintain a drug and crime-free project; and 9) that sufficient funding to support DLNR, UH CES and the counties be provided to implement this program.
