The Department of Transportation (DOT) supports the intent with strong reservations as we believe this bill is unnecessary.

According to the DOT's Statewide Bicycle Plan (Plan) and its priority list of bicycle projects Statewide, this area of Kahekili Highway is categorized as a Priority III. Based on the Plan's criteria and evaluation process, Priority III are facilities desired for construction beyond 20 years.

Furthermore, the DOT is currently re-evaluating the validity of the 1990 Final Environmental Impact Statement at the Kahekili and Likelike Highways Interchange, and along the Kahekili Highway corridor from Haiku Road to the Kamehameha Highway intersection. The DOT will be considering accommodations for all modes of transportation that includes a multi-use path along Kahekili Highway from the Haiku Road intersection to Kamehameha Highway near the Hygienic Store.

The Hawaii Bicycling League urges passage of HB736HD2 to build a shared bicycle and walking path on the mauka side of Kahekili Highway. All around the US and world people are demanding to be able to walk and bicycle safely in their communities. Is there any doubt this path would be used heavily? The path built in Laie is proof that if built, community members will use it for health, recreation and transport.

The City and County of Honolulu is working on more bike lanes, including protected bike lanes in Honolulu. Shared use paths are like protected bike lanes in rural areas.

By passing this bill you will be asking the state DOT to do what our citizens want and need. It has strong community support, and needs the Legislature's help.

In the Kahaluu/Ahuimanu area, the right of way is huge and allows this kind of facility. When it is built, people will use it. Now people have the choice of riding on narrow shoulders and disappearing bike lanes, and sometimes riding on the street itself alongside speeding cars. Some people even ride the wrong way against traffic, thinking this is safe because they can see oncoming traffic. This is extremely dangerous as drivers are not expecting to see a fairly fast-moving bicyclist moving toward them. If there ever is a collision between bicyclist and motor vehicle the result will be serious injury or death because the impact will be the cyclist speed (say, 15 mph) + the motorist speed (say, 40 mph) = 55 mph. Survival is unlikely at that impact speed. Let's do something to promote health and safety in Kahaluu!

WHEREAS, design and construction of a shared-use path could proceed expeditiously and would provide construction jobs during this period of economic recovery;





Yesterday, I received in the mail the DOT's survey for Kahekili Highway, which lists the construction of a shared use path as an alternative to highway widening or contraflow.

Good afternoon Chair English, Vice Chair Dela Cruz, and members of the Committee,

My name is David Henkin. I am a member of the Kahalu'u Neighborhood Board and the father of two children who have nowhere safe in our community to ride their bicycles. I appreciate this opportunity to testify in strong support of House Bill 736.

For years, the Kahalu'u community has tried to work with the State Department of Transportation to secure the construction of a pedestrian and bicycle path along the existing Kahekili Highway right-of-way, to no avail. As set forth in the attached, unanimous resolution of the Kahalu'u Neighborhood Board, our community strongly supports the construction of this path, which is desperately needed to provide our keiki and kupuna with safe routes to schools and businesses. Indeed, the Department of Transportation's own survey (also attached) concluded that over 80% of the people in our community support the construction of a shared-use path, with 57% expressing strong support.¹

Since the state already owns the right-of-way, the path could be built quickly and inexpensively. In past years, the Legislature has appropriated CIP funds for the construction of the path, but the Department of Transportation has refused to carry out the project. Accordingly, I respectfully urge the Committee to pass HB 736 in the form it was originally introduced, which would require the Department finally to build the path.

¹ The survey was worded in such a way that many respondents thought they had to make a choice between widening Kahekili Highway (which many in our community also support) and building the shared-use path. In fact, the Department of Transportation has confirmed that the right-of-way is wide enough to accommodate <u>both</u> the path and any widening that is currently being contemplated (<u>see</u> attached email from the Department). Had members of our community known that information when responding to the survey, the level of support for the path undoubtedly would have been even higher.

Dear Senate Transportation and International Affairs Committee Members,

I am writing in strong support for HB736 and urge the Committee to revert to the original version of the bill, requiring the Hawai`i Department of Transportation to begin planning, designing and constructing the pedestrian/bicycle shared pathway along Kahekili Highway. The current bill provides the funding for the pathway, but does not require the DOT to take action and begin the necessary steps in preparation for the building of the pathway.

A shared-use pedestrian and bicycle pathway would improve the quality of life of Kahalu`u residents by helping to promote healthier lifestyles (exercise), a safer walking, jogging and bicycle riding path (paved and designated walking/riding area), and an alternative for community residents to get to nearby parks, schools, and convenience stores (fewer cars on the road).

IMPORTANT FACTS TO CONSIDER:

- There are currently no sidewalks in place on Kahekili Highway, so people walk, jog, or walk their pets on the shoulder strip.
- Since moving to Kahalu`u in 2010, there have been two pedestrian fatalities (June 2012 and November 2010) on the strip of Kahekili Highway, between the two points (East Hui Iwa street and Waihee road) of the proposed shared-use pathway.
- Following community input, the Kahalu`u Neighborhood Board unanimously adopted a resolution (January 11, 2012) urging the DOT to construct a shared-use pathway along Kahekili Highway.

There is a need for the shared-use pedestrian/bicycle pathway, reflected through overwhelming community support for the project. I respectfully urge you to pass HB736 in its original form, as submitted by Representative Jessica Wooley.

This is not tenable, and the bill needs to include a clause requiring DOT to proceed with construction.
