Dear Chair Dela Cruz, Chair Slom and Members of the Committee,

The General Contractors Association of Hawaii (GCA) is an organization comprised of approximately six hundred (600) general contractors, subcontractors, and construction related firms. The GCA was established in 1932 and is the largest construction association in the State of Hawaii. The GCA's mission is to represent its members in all matters related to the construction industry, while improving the quality of construction and protecting the public interest.

House Concurrent Resolution 176 is requesting that the State Procurement Office conduct a study on the feasibility, necessary processes, and costs relative to requiring the consideration of past performance as a factor in awarding public contracts, including low bid contracts. This Resolution may be premature as the Procurement Task Force created last session is scheduled to report to the 2015 Legislature and will be addressing issues related to bad performing contractors. Furthermore, the State Procurement Office has testified that this Resolution is not necessary as their office is already conducting a study on past performance.

While GCA supports the intent of this Resolution, it finds that this legislation is unnecessary because such qualification criteria, or past performance is already permitted under 103D-302(f) under the invitation for bid process. Under Section 103D-302(f), HRS an invitation for bid may set the requirements to determine qualifications and criteria for a project. In other words, the agency may set the criteria and qualifications for the bidder in its bid specifications, which could include such criteria as past performance, recent project history and any other qualifications an agency may find necessary. It appears that this Resolution is attempting to address contractors that may not be performing up to par.

2013 Procurement Task Force pursuant to SCR 92, SD2 (2013)

GCA is actively participating in the ongoing Procurement Task Force convened by the legislature last year pursuant to SCR 92, SD2 (2013). The Resolution Requests the Comptroller to Establish a Task Force to Study the State Procurement Code and Identify Amendments that Would Increase Economy, Efficiency, Effectiveness, and Impartiality in the Procurement of Public Works Construction Projects. The Task Force is scheduled to report to the legislature next session, but has since met a number of times and has preliminarily identified items of concern. The areas of concerns identified include the subcontractor listing law, preferences, bid protests and the elimination of bad contractors.
