Thank you for the opportunity to support HCR 40. The potential for improving quality, cost-effectiveness, transparency, and patient engagement in our health care system is almost endless if we competently use available and emerging health information technology tools. The Hawaii Health Information Exchange currently fills a very important leadership role in carrying out the health IT elements of healthcare transformation, and has potential to do much more as the State's designated nonprofit partner. - Reducing waste related to needlessly repeated tests or procedures
- Enabling care coordination when admission, discharge, and transfer information flows from hospitals to primary care providers in real time
- Increasing provider efficiency with lab and pharmacy orders
- Helping providers reach quality goals by providing timely clinical performance feedback
- Serving as a conduit of information shared appropriately with extended providers across the continuum of care to improve coordination and case management
- Improving timely public health information about reportable conditions, immunizations, and

- other priority conditions
- Serving as a conduit to support and supplement data warehouses to contribute to our knowledge about the system and continuously improve it
- Helping providers and agencies identify and address prescription drug abuse

As federal funding supporting development of the HHIE's services ends, we in the State expect to enhance our relationships and investments with HHIE. This resolution is an excellent next step to continue building the foundation of a close public-private partnership for health IT.

- 3 Purpose and Justification: The Department of Health (DOH) support HCR40. As demonstrated during
- 4 the months long planning process for healthcare transformation guided by the Hawaii Healthcare
- 5 Project, health information technology and exchange are key foundations for a more efficient and
- 6 effective healthcare and public health system.

- 8 The Hawaii Health Information Exchange (HHIE) was identified as the State Designated Entity (SDE)
- 9 for health information exchange in 2009 and 2011, pursuant to the Health Information Technology for
- 10 Economic and Clinical Health Act of 2009 (Title XIII, Pub. L. 111-5). This formal recognization by the
- State of Hawaii, the US Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology, and the
- 12 US Department of Health and Human Services, intended to focus local efforts, as well as federal
- funding, to enhance Hawaii's infrastructure capacity building.

- 1 Although the five-year cooperative agreement with the federal government ended in February 2014,
- 2 much work remains for the state to establish relationships and propagate standards and technologies to
- 3 healthcare stakeholders. The designation of a single coordinating entity, in this case the entity that has
- 4 driven health information exchange efforts since 2009, is critical in maintain continuity.
