SUBJECT: SB 2054 SD1 - RELATING TO HEALTH

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities (DD) **SUPPORTS THE INTENT OF SB 2054 SD1.** The bill requires health insurers, mutual benefit societies, and health maintenance organizations to provide health care coverage and benefits for autism spectrum disorders (ASD).

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 1 in 88 children have been identified with ASD. That rate is anticipated to significantly increase in the next decade. With this alarming rate, it is imperative that children with ASD are provided with early diagnosis and treatment. Evidence-based practice shows that early identification and treatment results in overall improved outcomes for children with ASD. Moreover, services provided early on may decrease or minimize long-term services and supports needed as the child becomes an adult and through the individual's lifetime

SB 2054 SD1 provides comprehensive coverage of services, including well-baby and well-child screening diagnosis and evidence-based treatment for individuals with ASD under 21 years of age. There are two other bills before this Legislature. HB 2174 HD2 is pending House Finance Committee, and SB 668 SD2 HD1 was addressed during the 2013 Regular Session, deferred in Conference Committee on April 26, 2013, and carried over to this session.

The Council acknowledges that the above three bills are a work in progress and appreciates the opportunity for continued discussions between the Legislature and stakeholders to work out the specific provisions of each bill to develop a final measure that comprehensively addresses the needs of individuals with ASD.
