Position: Opposition

The Hawaii Food Industry Association is comprised of two hundred member companies representing retailers, suppliers, producers and distributors of food and beverage related products in the State of Hawaii.

Here in Hawaii we have used fireworks for many years to safely and responsibly celebrate our most important cultural, historical, and religious holidays, in particular New Year's Eve, Independence Day, and Chinese New Year's. We already have significantly stricter fireworks laws than most other parts of the country, even though a majority of Hawaii residents seem to support greater freedom in our fireworks legislation.

A recent Ward Research poll confirms what most of us already knew. The silent majority of Hawaii residents oppose having their personal, cultural and religious freedom taken away from them in the form of a total ban on fireworks.

Almost 4 in 10 (38%) of Hawaii residents strongly oppose a ban on the fireworks, while only 23% strongly support a ban. In other words, for those who stated they had strong feeling on the subject, those opposed to a ban outweigh those supporting it by 15 percentage points.

Those born and raised in Hawaii are more likely to strongly oppose a ban, 45% of those born in Hawaii strongly oppose a ban.

There were no significant differences in opinions between registered voters and those not registered to vote. Total State Results: Strongly Oppose: 38% Somewhat Oppose: 24% = Total Opposed = 62% Somewhat Support: 14% Strongly Support: 23% = Total Support 37%

The consumer fireworks as defined in this bill are designed for use by consumers to celebrate historical, cultural, and religious events, and there is no evidence to suggest that there has been the kind of significant misuse that would necessitate this kind of overbearing regulation. There is however evidence from other counties across the United States shows that bans on safe and sane consumer fireworks consistently result in an increase in the use of illegal aerial fireworks.

In addition to unnecessarily depriving Hawaii citizens of the ability to freely celebrate some of our most important holidays, this ban would also deprive retailers of thousands of dollars of revenue and the state of thousands of dollars in taxes.

The residents of Hawaii deserve to freely and responsibly celebrate religious, cultural, and historical events as they have for many years, without the state unnecessarily disrupting and curtailing our ability to do so.
