There is a desperate need for social services to be co-located in the Hawai'i Public Housing Authority's projects. Far too many of our citizens simply go into the projects and wait to die.

There is a need for monitoring some individuals to see that they remain on their medications. This relates to not only some of our disabled community but to the elderly as well.

There is a great need for geriatric social workers to help our seniors find a reason to get up in the morning. Far too many of them simply watch T.V. and again, wait to die.

The advantage of SB 2269, SD1, is that it should cost virtually nothing and will almost certainly lead to a reduction in overall Medicaid expenditures. If the graduate seniors use the projects as their practicum setting the People effectively get something for nothing. Couple that with the fact that anything that can get people out of their sedentary lifestyles will help prolong their lives and improve their overall shape then SB 2269, SD1 is the way to go.
