Chair Espero, Vice Chair Baker, and members of the Senate Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney, City and County of Honolulu, submits the following testimony in **support** of S.B. 2401

S.B. 2401 extends the period of separation that a police officer can order a person under suspicion of physical abuse or harm to 4:30 p.m. on the second business day following the weekend or legal holiday if the forty-eight hour period of separation expires on any Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday or if the incident occurs after 12:00 p.m. on any Friday, or on any Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday.

The intent of having the 48-hour period of separation is to keep the abuser away from the victim and give the victim time to get a restraining order and safe shelter. Currently, if an abuse happens over the weekend or holiday, all government agencies and many private organizations are closed while the clock is ticking away. This measure will give the time needed for victims to get help and legal protection.

For all of the reasons stated above, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu <u>supports</u> S.B. 2401. Thank for you the opportunity to testify on this matter.





The Department of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Maui, SUPPORTS SB 2401, Relating to Abuse of Family or Household Member.
