In consideration of SENATE BILL 2419 RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Senate Bill 2419 proposes to require the High Technology Development Corporation ("HTDC") to develop a sports-technology district in the Halawa-Aiea area of Oahu. The Department of Land and Natural Resources ("Department") has no objection to the bill, but offers the following comments.

The Department is responsible for managing approximately 1.3 million acres of public lands including the State's unique and limited natural, cultural and historic resources held in public trust for current and future generations of the people of Hawaii nei. The Department's responsibilities include managing and maintaining the State's coastal lands and waters, water resources, conservation and forestry lands, historical sites, small boat harbors, parks, and recreational facilities; performing public safety duties (e.g., flood and rockfall prevention); issuing and managing leases of public lands (agriculture, pasture, commercial, industrial, and resort leases); maintaining unencumbered public lands; and enforcing the Department's rules/regulations. To properly perform these duties, the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) determined that the Department should utilize a portion of the lands it manages to generate revenues to support the Department's operations and programs.

Three of the parcels identified in the bill are under the Department's management. Tax Map Key ("TMK"): (1) 9-9-003-035 ("Parcel 35") is the site of the former Aiea pump house. The Department is working to remediate mercury contamination issues at this site. The other two parcels under the Department's management, TMKs: (1) 9-9-012:046 & 047, are presently vacant but encumbered by various utility easements. Once Parcel 35 is remediated, the

Department will be looking to issue leases on the properties through the public process so that the lands can be put to productive use generating revenues to support the Department's broad mission. The Department believes that a sports-technology district may be an appropriate use of the lands, and would work with HTDC on any development plans that provided for revenue generation for the Department.
