S.B. 2949 – RELATING TO THE HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION

The Hawaii Government Employees Association, AFSCME Local 152, AFL-CIO strongly opposes the intent of S.B. 2949, which amends Hawaii Revised Statute 323F, by adding a new Part II "TRANSITION OF HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION, REGIONAL SYSTEM, OR COMBINED REGIONAL SYSTEM; 323F-A Hawaii health systems corporation; transition authority; 323F-B Transition board; combined regional system board; 323F-C Transition board, combined regional system board; powers; 323F-D Transition plan; criteria; 323F-E Attorney general, director of finance; approval; 323F-F Liabilities; period of transition; repeals 323F-7.6 Transition of Hawaii health systems regional system or health facility to a new entity; adds new Parts III and IV.

As the exclusive representative of employees included in bargaining units 02, 03, 04, 09 and 13 of the Hawaii health systems corporation, we oppose as drafted S.B. 2949 as the establishment of guidelines for the transitioning of the Hawaii health systems corporation does not provide for inclusion as part of the transition authority. The language basically allows a region or combined regions to make decisions based on self-interest in regards to their own region and not necessarily the how the services to the people of Hawaii would be impacted.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON S.B. 2949 RELATING TO THE HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION

The ILWU Local 142 would like to offer comments on S.B. 2949, which establishes guidelines for the transition of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, a regional system, or a combination of two or more regional systems into a nonprofit corporation and proposes certain retirement benefits for employees of the HHSC who are ERS members.

The Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC) has been faced with financial challenges since its inception. HHSC maintains hospitals statewide that, for the most part, do not generate revenue and are not self-sufficient. Much of the services provided are for long-term care, and most of the patients served are on Medicaid. HHSC has been looking at other sources of revenue and other models of governance, but the concern raised by many, including the ILWU, is preservation of the safety net function that HHSC is mandated to provide.

The ILWU represents more than 18,000 active members and thousands of retired members statewide. Most of our members and retirees live on the neighbor islands, which heavily depend on HHSC facilities, and many of them live in rural communities like Ka'u and Lanai where health care resources are limited. Without HHSC, there would be no emergency room services for them.

S.B. 2949 sets up guidelines for the dismantling of HHSC. The assumption is that anyone who takes over the entire corporation or a portion of it will have sufficient financial resources to continue services in that region. The problem will be the other regions that will not be acquired. Will the State continue services for them, especially with the potential for greater outlay of capital and diminished revenues? The State's requirement to provide safety net services should be honored.

S.B. 2949 also provides a retirement incentive for those who qualify. However, the disruption due to layoffs will be huge to the community.

There is no easy solution to the fiscal dilemma HHSC faces. We urge caution in proceeding with a proposal to allow another entity to acquire all or some of HHSC hospitals. Thank you for considering our comments.

It consumes over 60% of the operating budget. I would like to see that the 'current' employees remain eligible for the benefits that they have accrued and were promised. However, going forward, each employee should re-apply for their position and be re-employed' if they meet criteria. This will mean that 'bad' employees (who thus far have been 'protected' by unions) may not be re-hired in the new system. Moving forward, the 'benefits' package needs to be revised so as not to burden the new 'non-profit' hospital system.

RE: TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 2949, RELATING TO HHSC

Aloha Chair Green, Vice Chair Baker and Member of the Committee:

My name is Nicole Apoliona, M.D., medical director of Kula Hospital and I'm in strong support of S.B. No. 2949, that seeks to establish guidelines for the transition of one or more regions of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC) into a nonprofit corporation.

As a medical doctor of Maui Memorial Medical Center (MMMC) and Kula Hospital and a resident of Maui, my main concern is the future of health care services on our island. MMMC is HHSC's largest acute care facility and only full-service hospital in Maui County. We are the only hospital in the state with a 24/7 stroke treatment program, the only neighbor island hospital that provides comprehensive cardiovascular services and the only neighbor island hospital with a Trauma Center designation. Currently, we have over 1,400 employees, including 200 attending physicians, making MMMC one of the largest employers on Maui.

I support this legislation because we need a solution that will help MMMC, as well other HHSC facilities across the state, become sustainable, rely less on government subsidies and expand services to address the current and future health care needs of our communities.

When operating revenues are not enough to cover expenses, we have a problem. And if nothing changes, we will be forced to make tough decisions that will compromise the delivery of health care services in Maui County and jeopardize the well-being of our residents and visitors.

On behalf of my colleagues at MMMC and my friends and family on Maui, I urge you to pass this legislation that will allow us to explore the option of a public-private partnership. I am, however, concerned that the transition boards are given unqualified powers which does not guarantee appropriate input from all community stakeholders. I would recommend modifying the bill, by adding "after appropriate input from medical staff, hospital staff and community stakeholders" prior to each empowerment clause. This ensures that the stakeholders have a voice in the choice. This is a good opportunity for us and we need your help to move forward.

We have a State run hospital with not enough resources, an aging doctor community and difficulty recruiting new doctors to our medical community. We are proud to serve the population on Maui but we are short in many subspecialties such as ENT, Gastroenterology, Orthopedics and Urology. We have one Neurosurgeon and as wonderful as he is, he is on call 24-7. Maui has a vibrant growing population and our medical community needs additional resources to reach the level of excellence I believe we are capable of. To have a private partnership would allow us additional financial and academic resources, and allow us to have a premier training program so we can indoctrinate future physicians into our medical community. If we do nothing and allow the status quo, I hate to think what will happen. It would be irresponsible not to plan for a thriving medical community. I predict more doctors will leave due to the difficult call schedule and although we may have a stellar reputation as a destination vacation, people will think twice about moving and traveling here if the medical care is in decline.
