Dear Senate Committee:

As a pediatrician in Honolulu and medical director of the HEALTHY Quit Smoking Program, I strongly support SB2496.

The early initiation of smoking before age 18 is an important problem to address. Almost 90% of adult smokers started when they were younger than 18. I care for many children that suffer from secondhand smoke and urge you to consider the adverse health effects from tobacco use.

Raising the prices of all tobacco products helps deter the initiation of tobacco use, especially for young people, who are more sensitive to increased prices of these products. SB2496 raises the tax on other tobacco products (OTPs) to the same level as cigarettes, so that the price barrier for all tobacco products is equivalent.

Please also consider earmarking a portion of the funds from these taxes towards supporting tobacco cessation and prevention programs. As the medical director of the HEALTHY Quit Smoking Program, I have seen the positive outcomes from cessation efforts.

- 1 Department's Position: The Department of Health (DOH) supports the intent of SB2496,SD1 because
- of the public health impact of the measure, while deferring to the Department of Taxation (DoTax) on
- 3 matters of implementation and revenue generation.
- 4 Fiscal Implications: The DOH offers suggestions regarding the disposition of the additional monies
- 5 collected.
- 6 Purpose and Justification: The National Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids has recommended an
- 7 excise tax of 85% of the wholesale value as the amount to achieve parity between the tax on cigarettes
- and other tobacco products (OTPs) in Hawaii. The last change in excise tax for OTPs was in 2009. The
- 9 DOH supports the requirement in SB2496, SD1 that any increase in excise tax on cigarettes would
- 10 trigger an automatic excise tax increase on OTPs.
- OTPs are currently taxed lower than cigarettes, yet are similarly addictive and dangerous. They
- 12 present a significant health risk leading to cancer, heart disease, respiratory illnesses, and other serious
- diseases. Adult and youth smokers are attracted to purchase the less expensive tobacco products,
- including small cigars, smokeless, loose, or roll-your-own tobacco. OTPs pose a danger as gateway
- products that can lead to habitual tobacco use, including smoking and long term addiction to nicotine.

- The 2014 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Office on Smoking and Health publication,
- 2 "Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs," reports that smoking and tobacco use
- 3 are the leading causes of preventable death and disease in Hawaii, claiming 1,200 lives each year and
- 4 creating \$526 million in annual health care costs.

- SB2496 SD1 is consistent with the recommended strategy of the CDC to reduce the demand for tobacco through increasing the price of the products by raising tax rates. This in turn will lead to
- 7 significant reductions in the use of tobacco by current consumers, encourage more people to quit, and
- 8 reduce the initiation of tobacco use by youth. The DOH supports this excise tax measure that provides
 - parity with the current tax on cigarettes along with a mechanism that triggers an automatic excise tax
- increase on OTPs when the tax of cigarettes increases. Higher tax rates on all tobacco products prevent
- initiation or switching to lower-taxed and lower-priced tobacco products.
- 12 With regard to the disposition of the excise tax revenues, the DOH suggests that, instead of the
- entire amount of excise tax collected being credited only to the Hawaii Cancer Research Center Special
 - Fund, that equal amounts of the additional monies collected be deposited to the credit of the Hawaii
 - Cancer Research Center Special Fund, the Trauma System Special Fund, the Community Health Centers
- 16 Special Fund, and the Emergency Medical Services Special Fund.



As a pediatrician in Honolulu and President of the American Academy of Pediatrics, Hawaii Chapter, I strongly support SB2496.

The early initiation of smoking before age 18 is an important problem to address. Almost 90% of adult smokers started when they were younger than 18. I care for many children that suffer from secondhand smoke and urge you to consider the adverse health effects from tobacco use.

Raising the prices of all tobacco products helps deter the initiation of tobacco use, especially for young people, who are more sensitive to increased prices of these products. SB2496 raises the tax on other tobacco products (OTPs) to the same level as cigarettes, so that the price barrier for all tobacco products is equivalent.

Please also consider earmarking a portion of the funds from these taxes towards supporting tobacco cessation and prevention programs. As the medical director of the HEALTHY Quit Smoking Program, I have seen the positive outcomes from cessation efforts.


