Chair Ige and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments:

This bill establishes a five-year pilot project at the University of Hawaii at Hilo College of Pharmacy that ensures the financial self-sufficiency of the College.

As proposed, this bill raises a concern that it intrudes into the internal management of the Board of Regents (BOR). Under article X, section 6, of the Hawaii State Constitution, the BOR is to have "exclusive jurisdiction over the internal structure, management, and operation of the university." However, section 6 further provides that: "This section shall not limit the power of the legislature to enact laws of statewide concern. The legislature shall have the exclusive jurisdiction to identify laws of statewide concern."

The legislature should consider amending this bill to add a provision identifying the bill to be a law of statewide concern.

We respectfully ask the Committee to consider our comments.

SB 2550 SD1 - RELATING TO HIGHER EDUCATION

Chair Ige, Vice Chair Kidani and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on SB 2550 SD1 which establishes a five-year pilot program at the pharmacy school of the University of Hawai'i at Hilo (UHH), under which the school shall be financially self-sufficient and managerially autonomous from the University of Hawai'i. The bill establishes a UHH Pharmacy School Special Fund and a Board of Governors for the Pharmacy School; and appropriates an unspecified sum out of the special fund for the purposes of the Act.

The University of Hawai'i appreciates the intent of the bill, which provides an avenue for funding the Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy's facilities, which is required to maintain its accreditation. The college has met all requirements for accreditation except for having a permanent home. This requirement must be met by June 2014 or the college is in jeopardy of losing its accreditation. The University places a very high priority on maintaining the college, which is the only college of pharmacy in the region.

Provisions of the bill would duplicate or replace parts of the University's functions. The University has an existing mechanism for evaluating new programs. The Board of Governors this bill would establish duplicates the function of the Board of Regents. We believe both provisions are not necessary for the purpose of establishing a self-supporting college.

We are concerned that there are uncertainties in the financial aspects of establishing a college as self-sufficient or autonomous. It is not clear that the college is able to be both self-sufficient on its tuition revenues and able to cover the debt service on the full cost of the building the college requires, especially over the 30-year period of the debt.

The budget request submitted by the Board of Regents of the University of Hawai'i and included by the Governor in his executive budget request has as its first priority for new construction \$28M in general obligation bonds and \$5M in revenue bonds to construct a permanent home for the college. The University continues to believe this is the best approach to funding this building. We stand ready to discuss alternatives, but at this point, we prefer the Governor's proposal to the funding mechanism described in this bill.

Chair Ige, and committee members, thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on SB2550 SD1 creating a five year pilot program to ensure the financial self-sufficiency of the college of pharmacy and could permit the construction of a permanent facility for The Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy (DKICP) at the University of Hawaii at Hilo.

Kaiser Permanente Hawaii supports efforts to maintain the college of pharmacy at the University of Hawaii at Hilo.

Hawaii continues to have a shortage of pharmacists to fill all of the positions needed in the state. This shortage is a problem for Kaiser Permanente Hawaii as well as many other health care organizations in the state. DKICP is the only program in Hawaii to offer the Doctor of Pharmacy which is the recognized degree for becoming a licensed, registered pharmacist.

Without a permanent building, the college is in imminent risk of losing accreditation and closing which means Hawaii would no longer have a college of pharmacy. This could have a wide ranging negative effect on health care in Hawaii. Funding for a permanent building helps to assure the College can meet all of the professional accreditation standards and continue contributing to the State and the profession. In as much as the proposed five year program may support the construction of the needed facility we are in support of it.

We urge the legislature to support the continuation of the DKICP. Thank you for your consideration.

Dear Chair Ige, Vice Chair Kidani, and members of the committee:

The Hawai'i Construction Alliance supports SB2550 SD1, which establishes a five-year pilot project at the Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy that ensures the financial self-sufficiency of the college and establishes a special fund for the Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy.

The Hawai'i Construction Alliance is comprised of the Hawai'i Regional Council of Carpenters; the Hawai'i Masons Union, Local 1 and Local 630; the Laborers' International Union of North America, Local 368; and the Operating Engineers, Local 3. Together, the four member unions of the Hawai'i Construction Alliance represent 15,000 working men and women in the four basic crafts of Hawai'i's construction industry.

The Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy currently includes over 500 student, faculty, and staff members; has graduated three classes of PharmDs; and contributes more than \$50M into the state's economy each year. It was also ranked as one of the top five new schools of pharmacy by US News and World Report in 2012. In order for the school to continue its impressive track record in research, education, and outreach, and to support its accreditation, it must secure funding for a permanent facility.

We find that SB2550 SD1 proposes an innovative approach to fund the construction, maintenance, and operation of the Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy. Although a more customary approach – such as general obligation bonds – may be more practical in bringing about the construction of a permanent facility for the college, an alternative funding mechanism may also be successful.

Therefore, we respectfully request the Committee on Ways and Means to pass SB2550 SD1 to allow for this alternative funding option to remain viable.

Aloha! My name is Barry Mark. I am an owner of a financial planning and investment advising practice in Hilo, HI. I was born and raised on the Big Island and have been a resident for 32 of my 47 years.

I am recording my strong support of SB2550 SD1 to secure funding for the permanent building for The Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy (DKICP). Thank you for accepting my testimony on this important issue.

DKICP is the only program in Hawaii and the Pacific Region to offer the Doctor of Pharmacy. This is the only recognized degree for becoming a licensed, registered pharmacist. Without a permanent building, the college is in imminent risk of being placed on probation, losing accreditation and closing. This would mean that Hawai'i would no longer have a college of pharmacy. This would have dire effects on health care in Hawai'i, all related health care organizations and the state's ability to improve the quality of rural health care.

The pharmacist shortage in the Pacific region served by the UH College of Pharmacy continues to be identified as one of the largest deficits in the nation according to data from Pharmacy Manpower Project. At the same time, DKICP is transforming health care in Hawai`i with new models of care such as the \$14.4 million Pharm2Pharm project, which leverages the current supply of pharmacists.

I appreciate and commend the efforts in considering various options to ensure the success of UH Hilo's Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy. Given the short time frame remaining to achieve full compliance for national accreditation of the pharmacy program, the need to address the UH System repair and maintenance backlog, as well as the capacity for DKICP to be able to service the debt obligation with appropriate operational and funding modifications for this permanent facility, the approach outlined in SB2550 SD1 represents the most practical and viable vehicle to reach the compromise required to achieve this highly necessary and desired outcome.
