#### **COMMENTS ON THE PROPOSED LEGISLATION**

SB2581 SD1 proposes to reconfigure the membership of the State Building Code Council (SBCC), modifies the Hawaii State Building Codes, and staggers the adoption of codes among other provisions. A representative (Thaddeus Tomei) from the Elevator Section of the DLIR's Hawaii Occupational Safety & Health Division (HIOSH) sits on the SBCC.

The DLIR supports the housekeeping amendment to 107-22(3), which changes the DLIR representative to one with significant experience in elevator safety and eliminates "or fire safety." This is consistent with the department's expertise, especially as the State Fire Council also has a member serving on the Council, which is administratively attached to the DLIR.

The DLIR defers to other entities on the other specific, substantive portions of the proposal. The department is in the process of updating the Elevator Standards and has actively participated in the deliberations of the Council. The DLIR <u>strongly supports</u> the Council's efforts to serve as a clearinghouse to help affected parties navigate the various state and county codes and agencies.

The construction and related industries are often left in the dark to try to make sense of how the various codes relate to each other. The Council serves an important role in trying to improve the compatibility and interrelationship of the codes by serving as a forum where there can be a meeting of the minds.

The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) **supports** Senate Bill No. 2581, SD1, which modifies the composition, quorum, and duties of the Hawaii State Building Code Council, as well as other housekeeping language as appropriate. Most importantly, it appropriates funding to the Department of Accounting and General Services for the State Building Code Council to function in its mandated responsibilities.

As we testified before the Senate Committee on Economic Development, Government Operations and Housing, and Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs on February 3, 2014, the City strongly supports the State Building Code Council's mission to provide for the continued review and adoption of building codes to be used as the standard for building construction in the State of Hawaii, while preserving the home rule rights of the counties. This Council combines the resources of the State and four counties with members of the industry and the public to review and update the codes that regulate the building industry.

In 2009, the State Building Code Council adopted a series of State Building Codes, which provided uniformity in the application of codes throughout the State. Because of the lack of funding, there has been no update since this initial rule adoption. The appropriation contained in the Bill is needed for this effort to continue.

The Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism offers comments on this bill, which modifies the composition of the Hawaii building code council and funds an executive director's position. We support the intent of this bill, but caution that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in our Executive Budget.

To be more effective, an executive director with appropriate technical credentials in the administrative rule process must oversee and facilitate the work of the Council. Proposed new members of the council include construction industry specialists with expertise on industry practices and the practicality and cost effectiveness of proposed codes.

An expected outcome of the bill's passage would be expedited adoption of the 2012 International Energy Conservation Code. The code provisions should measurably reduce energy use in homes and buildings and move Hawaii closer to its goal of energy independence.

The General Contractors Association of Hawaii (GCA) is an organization comprised of approximately six hundred (600) general contractors, subcontractors, and construction related firms. The GCA was established in 1932 and is the largest construction association in the State of Hawaii. The GCA's mission is to represent its members in all matters related to the construction industry, while improving the quality of construction and protecting the public interest.

GCA is in <u>support</u> of S.B. 2581, SD1, Relating to the State Building Code, which proposes, among other things, to modify the composition, quorum and duties of the Code Council, clarifies the code adoption process and ensures there are no conflicts with Chapter 444, HRS. Particularly, the measure proposes to amend the membership of the Hawaii State Building Code Council (SBCC) to increase the representation of members of the construction industry and also proposes an appropriation to assist with the administration of the SBCC.

In 2007, the Senate Ways and Means committee recognized the importance of the formation of the State Building Code Council when it said,

[t]he adoption of a uniform set of statewide building codes applicable to one and two family dwellings, all other residential uses, commercial and industrial buildings, and state buildings would make it possible for building owners, designers, contractors, and code enforcers within the State to apply a consistent standard. The health and safety considerations

related to the codes are of statewide interest, especially relating to emergency disaster preparedness. Hawaii State Legislature. S. Comm. Rpt. 784, March 2, 2007.

Last session the Senate Committees on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs and Ways and Means recognized the importance of the construction industry's involvement in the State Building Code Council in the Standing Committee Report of H.B. 763, H.D. 1, S.D. 1 (2013) when it said,

[y]our committees find that representatives from the construction industry should be included on the Council because they will provide valuable input regarding the impacts of code changes on construction projects, costs, and whether materials to meet the new requirements are available in Hawaii. Hawaii State Legislature. S. Comm. Rpt. 1311, April 5, 2013.

The GCA believes that by involving the building industry technical experts on the SBCC, it will expedite the implementation of the codes once they are approved because the people who actually have to construct with the new codes would have been involved in the entire adoption process and are able to bring up any constructability issues from the start. Thus, by adding the builders onto the council, these constructability issues can be addressed while the codes are still being discussed. GCA members have been actively participating on the State Building Code Council and recognize its importance in bringing private industry and government entities together to discuss uniform building codes and regulations, especially if any conflicts may arise.

GCA remains willing to participate on the Hawaii State Building Code Council and requests a viable appropriation be highly considered in this measure.

My name is Gladys Marrone, Government Relations Director for the Building Industry Association of Hawaii (BIA-Hawaii). BIA-Hawaii is the voice of the construction industry. We promote our members through advocacy and education, and provide community outreach programs to enhance the quality of life for the people of Hawaii. BIA-Hawaii is a not-for-profit, professional trade organization chartered in 1955, and affiliated with the National Association of Home Builders.

BIA-Hawaii strongly supports S.B. 2581 S.D.1. S.B. 2581 S.D. 1 is the version that has been worked on and agreed to by all current voting members of the State Building Code Council ("SBCC").

Since its creation in 2007, the SBCC has been operating with no funding, \$250,000 was originally appropriated but was never released. The role of the SBCC is significant to the public health and safety of Hawaii's residents, as well as to provide a forum for all stakeholders to review national codes and discuss and approve those provisions that benefit, and are appropriate for, Hawaii. Funding is critical for the continuance of the SBCC.

S.B. 2581 S.D.1 also reconfigures the composition of the voting members of the SBCC by adding representatives from the construction industry. According to the International Code Council, at least 25 state building code councils nationwide include representation from the construction industry. The construction industry would offer real guidance on what practically works and what does not, as well as input on the cost of code changes, which can have a tremendous impact on the cost of construction. We believe a costbenefit analysis should have a place in new codes being adopted.

BIA-Hawaii strongly supports S.B. 2581 S.D. 1, and urges your favorable approval.

#### I urge you to support SB 2581.

I have been a practicing architect in Hawaii since 1970. I am also a member of the State Building Code Council, representing the Honolulu American Institute of Architects and a past president of that organization.

Senate Bill 2581 was drafted with input from the members of the State Building Code Council (the Council) to address several concerns:

- To add representatives of the contractors and subcontractors to the Council.
   To allow the adoption of staggered editions of the nationally recognized building codes.
- 3. To clarify certain terminology.
- 4. To provide funds to enable the Council to operate effectively.

The Building Code Council was established in 2007 to bring the building codes of all four counties into general consistency with one another and to review and adopt nationally recognized building codes while allowing each county the flexibility to deal with its unique conditions. The Council includes representatives of the four county building departments and of Hawaii's design professions.

The building codes adopted by each of Hawaii's counties are based on model codes drafted by the International Code Council (ICC), which revises its model codes every three years. While each new edition includes new issues, not all of the issues addressed are of concern for Hawaii and not all need to be addressed immediately. In order to minimize the number of changes to the code while addressing important new concerns as they are needed, the Council reviews the proposed changes by the ICC, discusses the potential impact with Hawaii's architects, engineers, contractors and subcontractors, and recommends changes to the counties.

This takes a great deal of work and requires a great deal of coordination with the various members of the construction industry. The contractors and subcontractors have been informal members of the Council since the beginning, providing their input into the initial stages of the discussions. Bringing them formally onto the Council is only common sense. Providing funds to hire a small staff to help with the paperwork and coordination is essential.

SB2581 has been developed with the input of all components of the construction industry and represents a good compromise to the various problems facing the Council. I urge you to support this bill.
