1 **Department's Position:** The Department of Health (Department) opposes this measure.

2 Fiscal Implications: None.

3 Purpose and Justification: The Department respectfully opposes this measure because it conflicts with

4 Hawaii Administrative Rules. Chapter 11-62 requires all buildings located within or near proximity of

5 an available public sewer system to connect to the public sewer. The use of individual wastewater

6 systems is intended to serve as a temporary measure until such time as public sewers become available

7 to the lot.

8 This bill prohibits the county from requiring a property with an authorized individual wastewater

9 system, based on proximity, to connect to a county operated wastewater treatment system.

10 However, cesspools and other individual wastewater systems have the potential to adversely

11 affect our groundwater and near shore waters. County wastewater treatment plants provide higher levels

12 of treatment and better quality wastewater that can be used as reclaimed water which conserves our

- limited water resources. Once county sewers are constructed, the counties have the responsibility and
 means to properly operate, maintain, and provide adequate treatment of wastewater to levels that are

SUBJECT: Senate Bill 2749, Relating to Wastewater

The City and County of Honolulu, Department of Environmental Services (ENV), opposes Senate Bill (SB) 2749, Relating to Wastewater, which would not allow counties to prohibit, based on proximity to a county operated wastewater treatment system, the use of an otherwise authorized individual wastewater treatment system as an on-site means of wastewater disposal in lieu of wastewater treatment works.

This bill talks primarily about composting toilets as an alternative, although the proposed language is broader and includes all otherwise authorized individual wastewater systems. While the use of composting toilets may be appropriate in areas not served by a county operated wastewater treatment system, allowing individuals to disconnect or not connect to the county operated wastewater system places an unfair burden on other customers served by the county operated wastewater system. Counties have been required to build wastewater systems to serve the majority population centers of the counties and have invested billions of dollars in wastewater infrastructure sized to support mandatory connection within the service area. Customers have to pay for the construction, operation, and maintenance of that pre-existing infrastructure. Allowing some potential customers to not connect unfairly increases the cost burden on other customers.

The Department of Environmental Services respectfully recommends that SB 2749 not be moved forward.

- 1. Section 27-21.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, assigns to the counties the regulation of individual wastewater systems and private wastewater treatment works.
- 2. By limiting the counties' authority to prohibit certain on-site means of wastewater disposal, this bill would infringe upon the counties' ability to perform effective regulation.
- 3. The counties must continue to be allowed to ensure that wastewater is treated and disposed of in a manner that protects the environment and maintains the viability of county treatment systems.

For the foregoing reasons, I oppose this measure.

The County of Hawai'i Department of Environmental Management (DEM) opposes Senate Bill (SB) 2749, Relating to Wastewater, for the following reasons:

- <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §27-21.6(5)(A):</u> Transfer of the regulation of the design, construction, and operation of individual wastewater systems and private wastewater treatment systems places an operational burden on the County. Despite the availability of start-up funds by the State, there will be an annual financial burden on the County to address both operational and staffing expenses.
- 2. Hawai'i Revised Statutes §27-21.6(5)(B):
 - a. The inability to prohibit the use of individual wastewater systems (IWS), based on proximity, as an onsite means of wastewater disposal reduces the ability of Counties to require properties with an IWS to connect to a county operated wastewater treatment system. This is in contravention to the following:
 - i. Hawai`i Administrative Rules (HAR) §11-62-06(b) which requires that all buildings generating wastewater located within or near proximity of an available public sewer system to connect to the public sewer.

County of Hawai'i is an Equal Opportunity Provider and Employer.

- ii. Hawai`i County Code Chapter 21, Sewers, §21-5 which requires that owners of all dwellings, buildings or properties used for human occupancy, employment, recreation, or other purposes, which are accessible to a sewer are required at their expense to connect directly with the public sewer within one hundred eighty days after date of official notice.
- iii. Cesspools by definition are considered to be IWS's under HAR §11-62-36, Subchapter 3, Individual Wastewater Systems. As such, SB 2749 which reduces the ability of Counties to require properties with an IWS, based on proximity, to connect to a county operated wastewater treatment system is in contravention to the intent of HAR §11-62-05, Critical Wastewater Disposal Areas (CWDA).
- b. Additional Concerns:
 - Use of IWS's, by properties that are accessible to County Sewer, as an on-site means of wastewater disposal in lieu of connection to the County Sewer system could jeopardize the County's ability to obtain Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) grant funding under 40CFR35, State and Local Assistance.

Based on the above, the County of Hawai'i Department of Environmental Management respectfully requests that SB 2749 not be passed.

SUBJECT: SB 2749 RELATING TO INDIVIDUAL WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEMS

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the subject bill. The County of Maul Department of Environmental Management (DEM) OPPOSES the bill.

The County of Maui (Department of Environmental Management, Wastewater Reclamation Division) is opposed to Senate Bill No. 2749 being considered in the twenty-seventh legislative session (2014). The proposed changes to item (5) Section 27-21.6, Hawaii Revised Statues are not in the best interest of Maui County's government and its residents. Item 5 should be completely deleted from HRS, as well as the proposed revisions involving individual wastewater treatment systems (IWTS's) for several reasons:

- 1. The County does not have the expertise to undertake the responsibilities of regulating the design, construction and operation of IWTS's and private wastewater treatment works.
- 2. The State Department of Health who currently oversees these actions has an experienced staff and the resources and expertise required to conduct such oversight.
- 3. The majority of the properties in proximity of existing sewer systems are urban residential in nature and not rural areas with farming required for self sustenance or with large enough areas that they require compost generated on site with human waste.
- 4. The Environmental Protection Agency (with assistance from the State Department of Health) currently oversees the production of compost using human waste (sludge from treatment plants) to ensure it is safe for human exposure and use. There would be little, if any, oversight if this were allowed at individual residences.


- 5. This would severely impact the financial ability of the County to provide public sewer service. The County requires monthly payments for sewer service. These payments are necessary to operate the sewage collection and treatment systems. Allowing properties to disconnect will increase the cost to those connected as less revenue is being collected.
- 6. The environmental impacts will increase as all types of affordable IWTS's release substantially higher volumes of nutrients and pollutants into the environment than the County's collection and treatment systems.

We trust you will carefully consider these comments in your consideration of this proposed bill. We appreciate the opportunity to comment on this bill and we are available if you have any questions or require clarification of our comments.
