The Department of Taxation (Department) strongly supports S.B. 2834, an Administration measure, to support Hawaii's seniors.

S.B. 2834 doubles the refundable food/excise tax credit for taxpayers 65 years of age or older. The credit would still be phased out as the taxpayer's adjusted gross income increases; however, the credit itself would be increased by allowing a taxpayer 65 years of age or older to claim double the credit for him or herself.

The Department notes that the mechanism for increasing the tax credit can be added to the forms and instructions with minimal change. The income tax credit for low-income renters under section 235-55.7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, currently contains the same calculation mechanism, which is based on the number of allowable personal exemptions. Taxpayers who are 65 years of age or older are allowed two exemptions for Hawaii income tax purposes.

SUBJECT: INCOME, Increase food/excise tax credit

BRIEF SUMMARY: Amends HRS section 235-55.85 to allow taxpayers who are age 65 or older to claim double the food/excise tax credit for tax years beginning after December 31, 2014.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Tax years beginning after December 31, 2014

STAFF COMMENTS: This is an administration measure submitted by the office of the governor GOV-10 (14). Currently, the food/excise tax credit is inversely graduated and available to taxpayers with adjusted gross incomes (AGI) of under \$5,000 receiving \$85, while taxpayers with AGI under \$50,000 receiving \$25. This measure will allow taxpayers age 65 and older to claim double the food/excise tax credit, thereby granting an additional tax preference to these taxpayers solely on age without regard to their tax burden. From a policy perspective, it is unclear why taxpayers age 65 and older deserve this relief while young taxpayers, also struggling to make ends meet, would not.

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA), which represents the federally qualified community health centers in Hawaii, supports Senate Bill 2834, doubling the food/excise tax credit for taxpayers 65 years of age and older.

The HPCA is a staunch believer in the social determinants of health, those economic and social conditions that influence an individual and a community's health status. These conditions serve as risk factors endemic to a person's living and working environment, rather than their behavioral or genetic histories. Factors such as income, education, access to recreation and healthy foods, housing, and employment, can and do have measurable impacts on a person and a community, both in health and financial outcomes.

Seventy-three percent of the patients seen by community health centers live below one hundred percent of the federal poverty limit. Eighty-Nine percent reside under two hundred percent of the federal poverty limit. This living situation has been shown to manifest in poorer health outcomes, often as a direct result the social determinants associated therein, such as lack of adequate housing or access to fresh produce. When coupled with health complications that arise with advancing age, there is a quantifiable need to alleviate financial strains and encourage better eating habits.

For these reasons, the HPCA support this measure and thanks you for the opportunity to testify.
