In consideration of SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 140/SENATE RESOLUTION 76 REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE TO RECOMMEND DESIGNATED AREAS OF STATE PROPERTIES ON WHICH TO ERECT AHU AND TO REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE PRIOR TO THE 2015 REGULAR SESSION

Senate Concurrent Resolution 140/Senate Resolution 76 requests that the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) convene a task force to recommend designated areas of State properties on which to erect ahu and to report to the Legislature prior to the 2015 Regular Session. The Department offers the following comments.

The Department acknowledges the importance of ahu construction in ancient times, as well as today. The choice of location and its deliberate construction manifests its importance to its creator. Ahu were built for a wide variety of functions, some as a community endeavors (heiau, land unit boundary marker, etc.), but more commonly for personal reasons (burial markersidentification and protection, in addition to aumakua worship).

The Department currently is already willing to work with anyone who wants to erect an ahu on state land if that person can document the traditional/historical use relating to that location, and the monument does not interfere with any contemporary use or operations at that location.

Accordingly, the Department does not believe that a task force is necessary. If the Committees believes that moving forward with these resolutions is prudent, the Department recommends creating a working group instead of a task force.

On behalf of the Aha Moku Advisory Committee (Committee), we respectfully offer comments on SCR 140 and SR 76. The Aha Moku System is inclusive of eight main Hawaiian Islands and forty-three (43) traditional moku districts. Within these districts the native Hawaiian traditional resource managers, often called konohiki still work within the resource areas. The Committee supports the intent of these resolutions and offers comments pertaining to Ahu and the need to create a Task Force to recommend designated areas on state properties on which to erect the ahu. While ahu are commonly known to have been erected as memorials for kupuna iwi, they were also used as marker or memorials for heiau, wahi pana and other uses. The Committee believes that the use of ahu could be incorporated into SCR 109 and SR 58, resolutions calling for OHA and DLNR to form a traditional land use task force who would be charged with researching the feasibility of establishing traditional land use districts. However, if the Legislature decides that SCR 140 and SR 76 must move on, then we would ask that the proposed Task Force include a representative of the Aha Moku Advisory Committee. We believe we could assist by providing specific cultural knowledge on specific sites that would be designated for memorial ahu. Thank you for the opportunity to offer comments on these Resolutions.
