Good Afternoon Senators and thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony **IN STRONG SUPPORT** of SCR63/SR30.

Last year I was intensively involved in a military sexual assault case that involved one of my prior DV (domestic violence) survivor moms. Years removed from her abusive exhusband, this mom was happily remarried to a member of our military preparing to deploy to Afghanistan. When her husband deployed, this mom had a 5 year-old, a 3 year-old and an 18 month-old in her care. Only a week into her husband's deployment, mom was brutally attacked and raped in her home *in front of her children*. While mom was on the floor being raped by a high-ranking enlisted, she recounted the outstretched hand of her 5 year-old pleading with her to "Just grab my hand mommy, just grab my hand..."

Recalling the details of the assault that this mom shared with me is probably as difficult for you all to read as it is for me to tell you about but can you fathom what this memory is like for this mom and her children? Can you fathom what it was like for her husband to receive this information while on the battlefield? Now try to fathom what came next:

Nothing

Mom and I reported to everyone and anyone of every rank, standing and office we could think of from here to Washington DC believing that what happened to her was so unique and extraordinary that surely someone would do something – but then it was revealed that mom was only one of **19,300** reported victims that rose to **26,000** reported victims with further inspection. At first we were hopeful because with numbers like those, someone somewhere was sure to do something right? A year after mom's report, here's what happened:

Nothing

It's time to do *something* – make SCR63/SR30 it.
