### REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO MAXIMIZE THE USE OF FEDERAL FUNDS UNDER THE SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PROGRAM

Senate Committee(s) on Transportation and International Affairs & Education

The Department of Transportation (DOT) opposes these resolutions.

The DOT currently manages the Safe Routes to School (SRTS) program created by Section 1404 of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) by awarding federal infrastructure and non-infrastructure grants to counties and other eligible recipients. This process continues under the current federal legislation, Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Act (MAP-21) in allowing the DOT to facilitate and administer oversight to finance projects submitted by communities and schools that will most effectively enable and encourage students in grades K-8 to walk and bicycle to school, resulting in improved safety and reduced traffic, fuel consumption, and air pollution in the vicinity of schools. The DOT is not eligible under federal law to use SRTS funds for projects.

Effective SRTS programs include encouragement, enforcement, education and evaluation, as well as engineering strategies. Therefore, we recommend schools, communities and other stakeholders put together comprehensive SRTS plans that include both infrastructure and non-infrastructure projects. These projects may be eligible to be funded with federal SRTS funds.

The DOT has existing programs and different federal fund authority that includes the planning, design and construction of multi-modal transportation in our capital improvement program. This includes pedestrian and bicycling modes.

# Testimony of Linda Rosen, M.D., M.P.H. Director of Health March 24, 2014

- Department's Position: The Department of Health (DOH) respectfully submits comments on Senate
- 2 Concurrent Resolution 68 (SCR68).

- 4 Purpose and Justification: The purpose of SCR68 is to request the Department of Transportation to
- 5 utilize federal funds to supplement projects that are adjacent to schools to enable students to safely walk
- 6 and bike to and from school.

The Department offers comments on SCR68 because creating safer environments for walking and bicycling around Hawaii schools supports both the health and safety of our children and community members. The goal of Safe Routes to School programs are to encourage more children to walk and bike to schools safely on an everyday basis. Safe Routes to School (SRTS) programs also create operational and physical improvements to the infrastructure surrounding schools that reduce speeds and potential conflicts with motor vehicle traffic, and establish safer and fully accessible crossings, walkways, trails

and bikeways. These improvements to the built environment increase safe opportunities for healthy physical activity for everyone.

The statewide Hawaii Physical Activity and Nutrition Plan and the Hawaii Injury Prevention
Plan both support the implementation of Safe Routes to School in each county. Currently, the state
expends \$470 million a year on obesity-related, and \$770 million on diabetes-related medical costs. In
2012 13.2% of high public school students in Hawaii (2011, Youth Risk Behavior Survey) were obese
(2012, Behavioral Risk Factors Surveillance Study), and one out of five youth did not meet the National
Physical Activity Guidelines (2011, Youth Risk Behavior Survey). One-third (32%) of non fatal injuries
to pedestrians were in the 5-24 year age group and 26% of patients were in the 1-14 year age group
(HHIC, 2008-2012). Utilizing federal funds to enhance safety for walking and biking around schools
will help address the coordination, education, and infrastructure development needs to improve
pedestrian safety and provide supportive environments for physical activity around schools.

Creating healthy places makes physical activity the easy and desirable choice for our children and families. The SRTS programs can create the environments conducive to walking and bking to schools. According to the school year 2011-2012 Safety and Wellness Survey, only 14% (31) of public schools reported having a SRTS program. The Department offers its support and assistance to the Department of Transportation for the implementation and utilization of funding for Safe Routes to School programs in our state.

#### Testimony in Support

My name is Virginia Pressler, MD, MBA. I am the Executive Vice President and Chief Strategic Officer for Hawai'i Pacific Health. Hawai'i Pacific Health is a not-for-profit health care system, and the state's largest health care provider and non-government employer. It is committed to providing the highest quality medical care and service to the people of Hawai'i and the Pacific Region through its four hospitals, more than 50 outpatient clinics and service sites, and over 1,600 affiliated physicians. Hawai'i Pacific Health's hospitals are Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children, Pali Momi Medical Center, Straub Clinic & Hospital and Wilcox Memorial Hospital.

We support SCR 68 and SR 33. The Safe Routes to School Program objective is to promote walking and bicycling to and from school, thereby encouraging elementary and middle school aged children to be physically active. This in turn helps to prevent childhood obesity. Current data indicates that childhood obesity is on the rise. Approximately 1 in 3 children entering kindergarten in Hawai'i are overweight or obese. Additionally, 23% of Hawai'i adults are obese and another 34% are overweight.

Safe Routes to School Program activities remain eligible for funding through the state Department of Transportation which administers the program. By maximizing the use of these federal funds to plan, design and construct projects that will substantially improve the ability to walk and bicycle to school, we will increase the opportunities for children to engage in physical activity.
