SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 6 REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO PARTNER WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, OFFICE OF PLANNING, HAWAII FARM BUREAU FEDERATION, AND OTHER AGRICULTURAL STAKEHOLDERS TO DEVELOP A FARM-TO-SCHOOL PROGRAM TO PROVIDE LOCALLY GROWN PRODUCE TO SALAD BARS AT ALL PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN THE STATE.

Chairpersons Nishihara and Tokuda and Members of the Committees,

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on SCR 6. This resolution would request the Department of Education (DOE) to partner with the Hawaii Department of Agriculture (HDOA), Office of Planning, Hawaii Farm Bureau Federation, and other agricultural stakeholders to develop a farm-to-school program to provide locally grown produce to salad bars at all public schools in the State. The HDOA supports the intent of this resolution.

The HDOA believes in the potential of a farm to school program that can greatly increase the amount of locally-grown fruits and vegetables that are procured within the state and has participated in a number of task forces and working groups surrounding this topic that reported to the legislature including: a report to the 2012 Legislature resulting from House Concurrent Resolution 167 (2011) and a report to the 2010 Legislature per Senate Concurrent Resolution 121 (2009). Both of these reports highlighted the difficulties that a farm-to-school program would encounter, and HDOA would look forward to working with the DOE and other departments and stakeholders to further discuss and develop a viable farm-to-school program.

The HDOA suggests that the State Procurement Office (SPO) be added as another department the DOE would partner with in developing a farm-to-school program in order to find ways to improve the procurement processes to allow public educational institutions to purchase local fresh produce.

Aloha Chair Nishihara, Chair Tokuda, Vice Chair Kouchi, Vice Chair Kidani, and Members of the Committees:

I am Christopher Manfredi, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFBF is comprised of 1,832 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interest of our diverse agricultural community.

HFB supports the intent SCR 6, which seeks to provide locally grown produce to salad bars at all Hawaii public schools.

While we understand SCR 6 seeks to provide only locally grown produce, HFB strongly supports increased use of all locally grown agricultural products, including fruits, vegetables, meats, dairy and poultry products in our schools and other public institutions. This will truly be a significant step towards increasing our levels of self-sufficiency.

Many formal and informal studies have been done addressing farm to school programs and we understand the Department of Agriculture (DOA) has also done some work in this area in the past. Our farmers and ranchers have tried to work with the procurement system and can speak to the shortcomings of the system. For example, supplying a school or schools within a geographic area is feasible, but providing to the entire school system is not. Focus should now be on working with the procurement system to make institutional markets accessible while considering the capacity of farmers and ranchers in Hawaii. Assistance to farmers on how to navigate the system should be a priority.

Many farmers and ranchers are ready to understand the opportunity and identify crops and other products that can be grown and produced or these markets. Students and parents want fresh local products. The demand exists.
