A brief description of the applicant's background;

In 2003 two visionary women, of children with special needs, frustrated by the bureaucracy, lack of real skill development training opportunities and a critical need for services for young adults with disabilities opened a large Thrift Store.

The Ho'omana Thrift Store's primary focus is used as a "training site" for individuals with special needs to gain job transferable skills and life development skills that can be applied to their future through the Hana Kalima Program. Working with the Department of Education and other community agencies Ho'omana developed curriculum based programs to ensure young adults with disabilities opportunities to gain the necessary skills to become contributing members of their communities. Over the past 11 years, Ho'omana has since expanded its services to include clients from the Dept. of Human Services needing to perform the required volunteer hours to receive their benefits (financial, food stamps, housing, medical etc.).

Ho'omana developed a financial literacy curriculum designed to teach participants how to manage their money and make informed financial decisions. Using group and individual activities teaching basic money management skills participants become familiar with banking procedures, check writing, deposits, withdrawals, developing monthly budgets and becoming proficient in differentiating between needs verses wants when making purchasing decisions. The use of "Makana Money" paid for hours volunteered at a predetermined rate provides opportunities to purchase merchandise and other rewards from the Thrift Store. This fiscal training increases their financial knowledge, gaining positive attitudes, self-motivation, and self-confidence as they gain life skills.

In 2014 Ho'omana expanded program activities to include supportive employment services, A'o Oihana Project for Ho'omana's participants, with local business. Through the A'o Oihana Project (Job Training/teaching,

Coaching), Ho'omana provides supportive employment strategies designed to provide employment opportunities to those with disabilities. Ho'omana will create, modify or customize a job position (provided by the employer) in such a way that it can be successfully performed by an individual with disabilities, while simultaneously meeting the needs of an employer. Participants are monitored for 90 days by a Job coach. In these 90 days, Ho'omana's Job Coach will assess, analyze and adopt/accommodate the position's requirements and responsibilities for the participant (which is now the new employee).

Ho'omana offers referrals to other service organizations and works in partnership with community agencies providing clothing and household items to their clients free of charge (Alu Like, Ho' ola la Hui, Hale Opio, Child and Family Service). Lastly, Ho'omana sells donated household goods and merchandise otherwise headed for the landfill, back to the community at a nominal price. Revenue from these sales has sustained Ho'omana for the past eleven years.

Currently the program includes two of the three Kauai High Schools. Our goal is to include 15-20 students from both Kapa'a High and Kauai High Schools in the 2015-2016 school year.

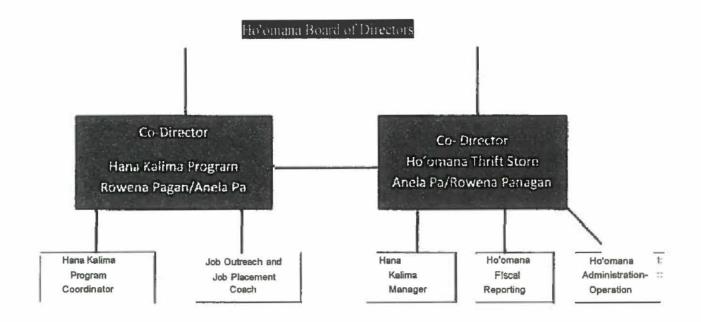

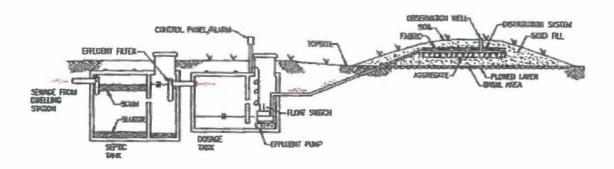


Figure 4-4 Elevated Mound System

Elevated mound systems are engineered mounds of sand/soil used to create acceptable soil conditions for effluent disposal and/or to create vertical separation from groundwater. The land on which the mound will be placed is first tilled, and a layer of sand and distribution system is placed over the tilled surface. The top of the mound is covered with surrounding soil and aesthetically landscaped.

Considerations and Restrictions

Mounds are commonly used in areas where absorption trenches and beds cannot be used, such as when the terrain is excessively steep, when there is a high groundwater table, or when the soil percolation rate is not conducive for a SWIS. Landscaping is required as the mounds could reach a height of three feet. As shown in the figure above, the disposal point is higher than the treatment system, therefore a pump system will be required.

Effluent Quality

Effluent quality for an elevated mound system is similar to that of an absorption trench or bed (see D-4).

Typical Installed Costs (2007)

Construction costs range from \$10,000 to \$15,000, but can go as high as \$25,000 per 1,000 gpd of treated wastewater in Hawaii.

Operation and Maintenance Costs

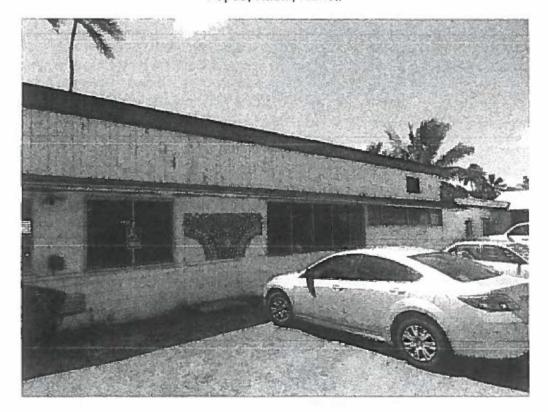
Since the elevated mound system requires a pump to lift the effluent to the specific elevation, the pump's power costs need to be budgeted. The estimated power consumption is approximately 100 - 300 kW-h per year. The same care must be provided to the mound as would be provided to the mound as would be provided to themches or bads. Introduction

This report summarizes the structural due diligence assessment of the single story building at 4531 Kuamoo Road, Kapaa, Kauai. The building is located near the corner of Kuamoo Road and Wailua Road and is approximately 500 feet from the ocean.

The original structure appears to be the portion of the building that houses Storage 1 and Storage 2 (see *Elevations/Plans*). At least 2 additional structures (store and office) were added to the original structure as is suggested by their differing structural systems. Neighboring single story wooden structures are present on the south/southeast side of the lot (see *Figure 1*). A drainage canal runs along the north side of the property adjacent to the parking lot. The site is relatively flat with the only major grade change occurring at the entrance to the property from Kuamoo Road.

No construction drawings were available for the existing structure; however the building appears to have been originally constructed during the 1950's with additions/renovations occurring over the last 60+ years. A noticeable repair or renovation of the building occured between gridlines 1 and 2 which shows the addition of 4x6 posts, 4x12 beams, roof plywood sheathing (in lieu of corrugated metal roof) as well as smaller rafters.

The footprint of the building is generally rectangular in shape with an approximate footprint measuring 200 feet x 36 feet or roughly 7,500 sq.ft (see *Plans/Elevations*).

Scope of Work

Our scope of work consisted of the following items:

A review of available building documents, including specifications, drawings and related documentation provided. A study to verify the accuracy of the drawings with respect to the existing construction is not included.

A field survey of the building which consisted of non-destructive visual observations of exposed building elements at the interior and exterior of the structure that was readily accessible and permitted by the owner. Observations took place from floor level locations and typical distressed structural elements were identified. Hidden or concealed conditions such as those covered by flooring, ceiling or wall panels and coverings were not reviewed during our visit. This survey did not include any physical testing of the structural elements. The survey also did not include any investigation of hazardous materials such as asbestos or lead based paint.

A structural assessment of the building was performed based on the document review and the field survey. Deficiencies that are readily apparent were noted. This assessment does not include any quantitative structural analysis of the structural systems or cost estimates. This assessment does not include Probable Maximum Loss (PML) evaluation.

Structural Description

Below are the descriptions for Addition No. 1:

Store (between gridlines 1 and 2)

The Vertical Gravity Framing System is summarized as follows:

- The ground floor is a concrete slab-on-grade with a thickened slab edge that provides support for the perimeter bearing walls (see Photo 11).
- Single wall construction is typical (see Photos 7-10).
- Partial height perimeter 8" CMU stem walls support the exterior bearing walls. (see Photos 2, 3)
- Roof framing consists of 2x8 rafters at 4'-0" spacing with 2x4 flat runners at 24" o.c. with 5/8" plywood sheathing (see Photos 7-10, 13). A 4x12 beam runs along gridline D and is supported by 4x6 posts (see Photos 7 and 9).

The Lateral Force Resisting System (for seismic and wind resistance) is summarized as follows:

- The primary lateral force resisting system is a non-conforming wood shear wall system consisting of 1x6 wood planks vertically oriented and attached to 2x framing (see Photos 7-10).
- The plywood sheathing at the roof level acts as a diaphragm to transfer wind and seismic forces to the lateral force resisting system (see Photos 7-10).

Store (between gridlines 2 and 4)

The Vertical Gravity Framing System is summarized as follows:

- The ground floor is a concrete slab-on-grade with a thickened slab edge that provides support for the perimeter bearing walls (see Photo 11).
- Single wall construction is typical (see Photos 12, 15, and 16 as well as similar Photos 7-10).
- Roof framing consists of 2x12 rafters at 4'-0" spacing with 2x4 flat runners at 24"
 o.c. with corrugated metal roof (see Photos 14-17).

The Lateral Force Resisting System (for seismic and wind resistance) is summarized as follows:

- The primary lateral force resisting system is a non-conforming wood shear wall system consisting of 1x6 wood planks vertically oriented and attached to 2x framing (see Photos 12, 15, and 16 as well as similar Photos 7-10).
- The corrugated metal roof at the roof level attempts to act as a diaphragm to transfer wind and seismic forces to the lateral force resisting system (see Photos 14-17).

Below is the description for Addition No. 2:

Office

The Vertical Gravity Framing System is summarized as follows:

- The ground floor is a concrete slab-on-grade with a thickened slab edge that provides support for the perimeter bearing walls (see *similar* Photo 11).
- Single wall construction is typical (see similar Photos 7-10, 12, 15, 16).
- Roof framing consists of 2x carpenter wood trusses at 4'-0" spacing with 2x4 flat runners at 24" o.c. with corrugated metal roof (see similar Photos 14-17).

The Lateral Force Resisting System (for seismic and wind resistance) is summarized as follows:

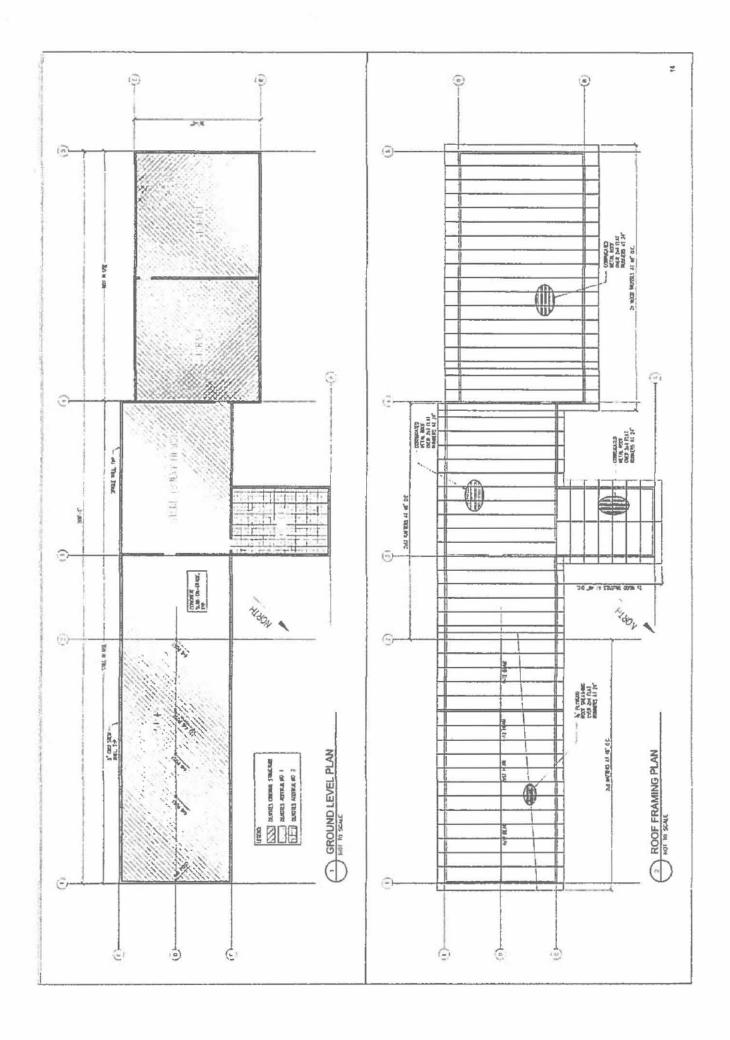
- The primary lateral force resisting system is a non-conforming wood shear wall system consisting of 1x6 wood planks vertically oriented and attached to 2x framing (see similar Photos 7-10, 12, 15, 16).
- The corrugated metal roof at the roof level attempts to act as a diaphragm to transfer wind and seismic forces to the lateral force resisting system (see similar Photos 14-17).

Below is the description for the Original Structure:

Storage 1 and Storage 2 (not in use)

The Vertical Gravity Framing System is summarized as follows:

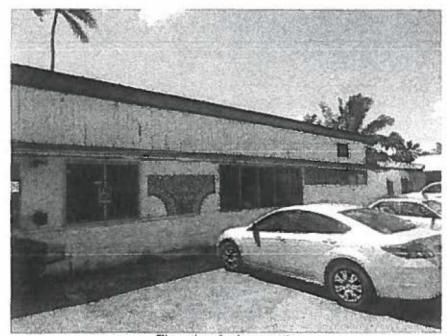
- The ground floor is a concrete slab-on-grade with a thickened slab edge that provides support for the perimeter bearing walls (see similar Photo 11).
- Single wall construction is typical throughout building (see Photos 19 21).
- Roof framing consists of 2x carpenter wood trusses at 4'-0" spacing with 2x4 flat runners at 24" o.c. with corrugated metal roof (see Photos 18 and 19).

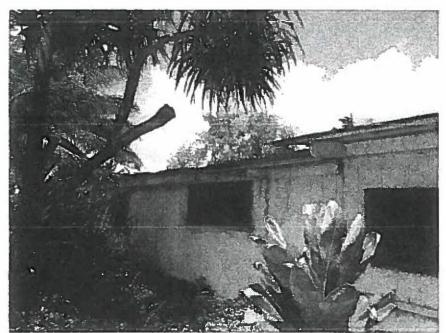

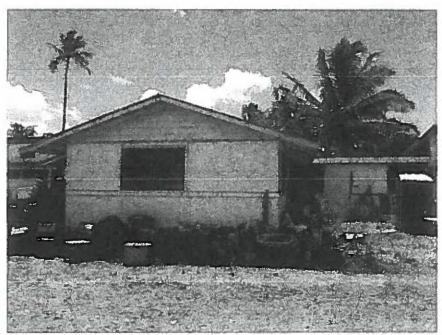

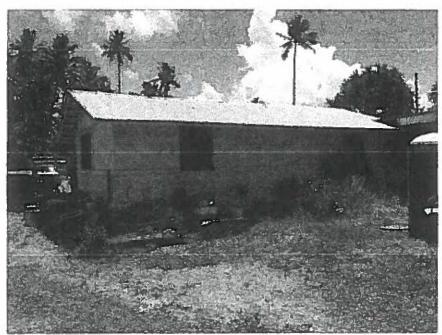

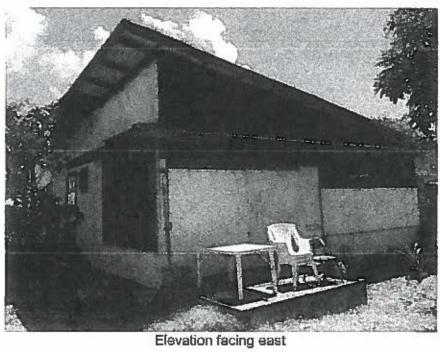

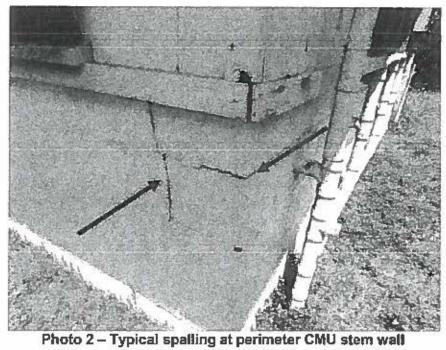

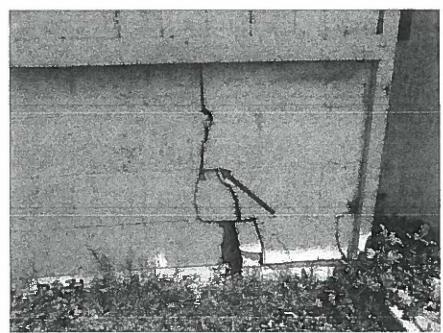


Photo 3 - Typical spalling and cracking at perimeter CMU stem wall

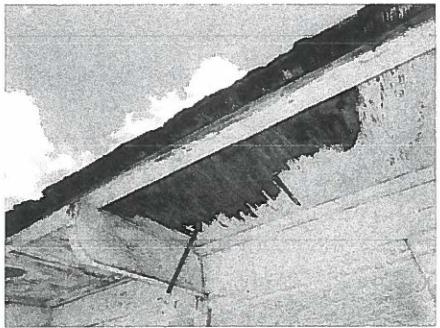


Photo 4 - Typical deteriorated plywood sheathing

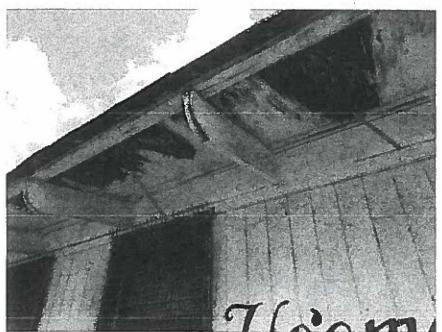


Photo 5 - Typical deteriorated plywood sheathing

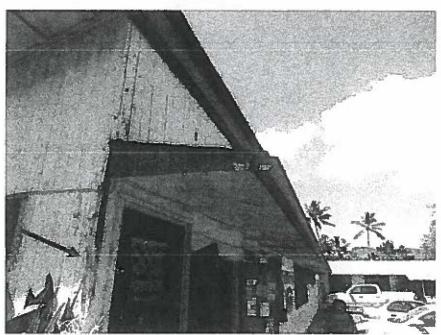


Photo 6 - Typical deteriorated 1x6 plank (near entrance)

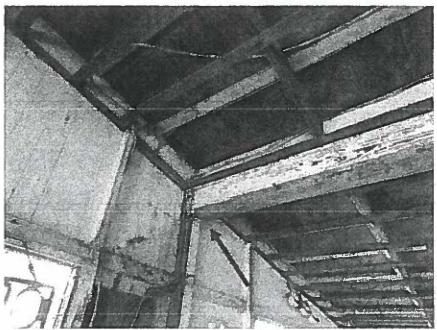
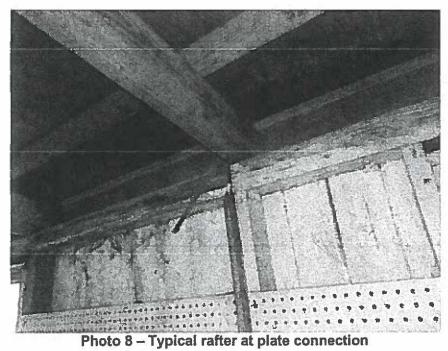


Photo 7 - Typical beam to end post connection



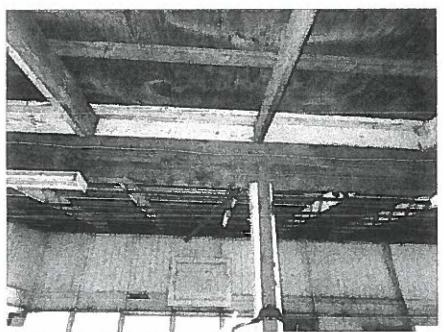


Photo 9 – Typical beam to intermediate post connection

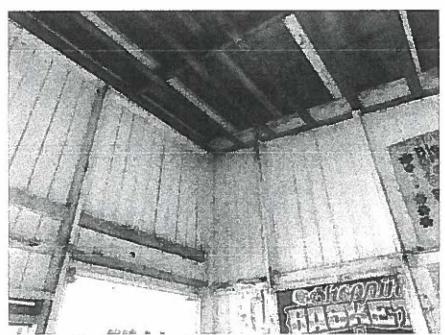


Photo 10 - Typical single wall construction (near entrance)

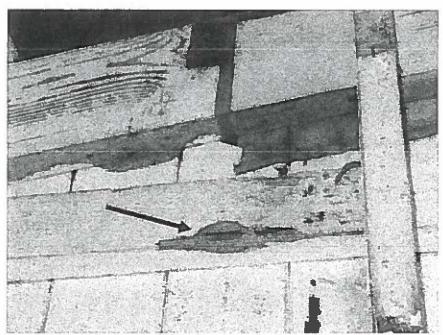


Photo 12 - Typical termite damage at load bearing wall

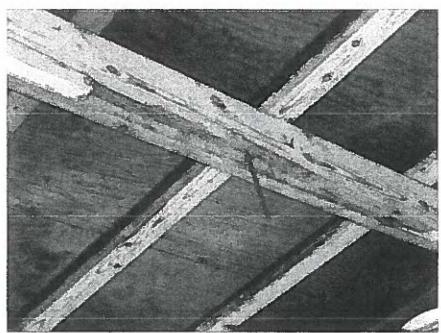


Photo 13 - Typical checking and termite damage at rafter

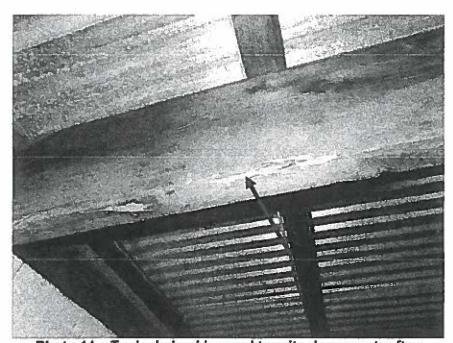


Photo 14 - Typical checking and termite damage at rafter

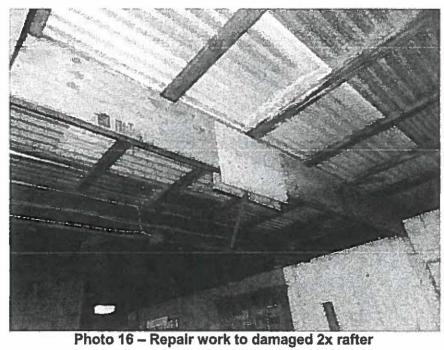




Photo 17 – Severe termite damage

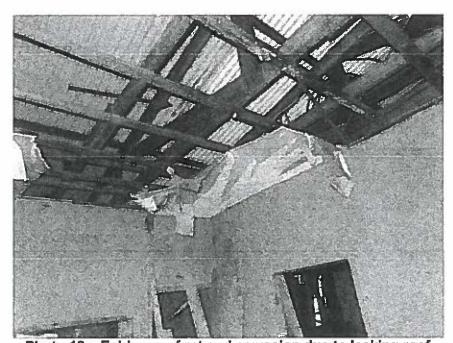


Photo 18 - Evidence of rot and corrosion due to leaking roof
