A brief description of the applicant's background;

Founded in 1939, Lanakila Pacific is a unique Hawaii-based 501(c)3 non-profit that has grown tremendously over the years. Our programs and social enterprises currently serve over 2,200 Oahu and Kauai residents annually with programs that build life skills, which in turn support our greater community. Our core programs are Lanakila TLC (Teaching and Learning Centers), which assists individuals with disabilities in developing life skills while emphasizing community inclusion; Lanakila Workforce Resources, which promotes independence through meaningful employment, and; Lanakila Meals on Wheels, Hawaii's largest and only island-wide meal provider for seniors.

Lanakila Pacific's main facility is located on Bachelot Street in Honolulu. We also have a satellite facility in Wahiawa, along with a network of 13 workforce training sites and 16 Kupuna Wellness Centers throughout Oahu. More than 400 volunteers support our programs throughout the year.

Our established social enterprises including Lanakila Kitchen (catering), Lanakila Custom Products (apparel and promotional products), and Maintenance Services (grounds and custodial) set us apart from other non-profits. These enterprises generate revenue to further our mission while providing jobs for people with disabilities.

The goals and objectives related to the request;

Lanakila Pacific's main facility on Bachelot Street is typical of buildings erected in the 1960's. The building is owned by the State of Hawaii and leased to Lanakila Pacific under long-term 30 year lease.

Ten years ago, certain renovations were completed to increase efficiency, allowing Lanakila Pacific to support the growth of Lanakila Meals on Wheels and establish our entrepreneurial programs including Lanakila Kitchen's Catering Services &

Lanakila Custom Products. This year, additional health and safety issues are being addressed. However, additional renovations are necessary to renovate the outdated elevator and address ADA, accessibility and security issues.

The elevator renovation is crucial to increase elevator reliability, reduce long-term maintenance expense and meet the ASME 2010 code adopted in July of 2014. The current controller and hydraulic system were installed in 1977. These systems are no longer in production, and replacement parts are no longer produced. The lack of parts availability increases the down time experienced when the elevator is out of service.

In the last year alone, the elevator was out of service six times, with outages lasting as long as two weeks. The down time significantly impacts program accessibility for participants using wheelchairs and with limited mobility who are unable to use the stairwell. In addition, program participants have been stuck in the elevator on several occasions, which is particularly alarming for those with certain disabilities

ADA door openers/operators are needed to allow program participants and employees with disabilities barrier free access to the essential areas of the building. Currently, the facility only has one functioning door operator. Participants, guests and employees need assistance to enter the conference room, office areas, restrooms and secure program areas of the building.

Upgraded and redesigned access control is needed to protect the safety of program participants and employees, as well as the facility. With the current design, the doors must be left open and unmonitored to accommodate work processes and remain accessible to the public. This creates potentially dangerous situations since we are unable to restrict or control who enters the building and comes in to contact with vulnerable program participants. Electronically controlled locks and integrated camera systems will allow our participants the freedom to participate unrestricted and allow us to create a safe environment for them. The upgraded camera systems and access control also allows our employees to work unrestricted without compromising building security. These upgrades will also ensure we can safely shelter people with disabilities in the event of an emergency.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Lanakila Pacific's main facility on Bachelot Street is typical of buildings erected in the 1960's. The building is owned by the State of Hawaii and leased to Lanakila Pacific under long-term 30 year lease. We are cognizant of our responsibility to enhance and improve these facilities so that they will serve Lanakila Pacific's program participants well into the 21st century.

The renovation plan for the Bachelot Building is to modernize the outdated elevator and address ADA, accessibility and security issues to significantly improve safety and program access for seniors and people with disabilities.

Lanakila Meals on Wheels currently serves over 2,000 Hawaii seniors more than 250,000 meals each year. Lanakila TLC and Workforce Resources provide training and employment for over 230 individuals with disabilities each year.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Lanakila Pacific's target population is adults with disabilities and seniors who live on Oahu and wish to develop or require assistance with their work and living skills. In the last year, Lanakila Pacific provided life skill building programs to over 230 adults with disabilities. At any given time Lanakila Workforce Resources provides paid-work training and employment for over 100 adults with disabilities and Lanakila TLC provides life skills training for over 130 adults with disabilities. Lanakila Meals on Wheels serves over 2,000 Hawaii seniors more than 250,000 meals each year. Supporting our delivery of services is a network of 400 dedicated volunteers, many of whom have been with Lanakila Pacific for many years.

Demographic projections indicate the population requiring Lanakila Meals on Wheels will increase significantly in the next ten years. The AARP Public Policy Institute calculates that nationally, a baby boomer turns 60 every 11 seconds. Hawaii's kupuna, or elderly population, will increase by nearly 40% in the next ten years, according to AARP's 2011 "Successful Aging in Hawaii" survey.

People with disabilities utilizing Lanakila's Workforce Resources and Teaching and Learning Center programs are also getting older. According to Erickson, W., Lee, C., & von Schrader, S. (2014). 2012 Disability Status Report: Hawaii. Ithaca, NY: Cornell University Employment and Disability Institute (EDI), the prevalence of disability of any type in Hawaii's general population in 2012 was about 11.1 percent. Those rates rise dramatically the older the population segment examined, doubling to 22.1 percent for persons aged 65 to 74 and jumping nearly five-fold to 51 percent for persons 75 and over. Among persons 65 to 74 years old, the most prevalent disability was the inability to walk, reported by 13.6 percent.

This project will address ADA, accessibility and security issues and significantly improve safety and program access for seniors and people with disabilities in Hawaii.

The main facility is located at Bachelot Street in Honolulu and serves as the hub for a network of 16 training sites and 16 Kupuna Wellness Centers throughout Oahu as well as for island-wide home delivery meal service.



Biography for Marian E. Tsuji

Marian E. Tsuji has over thirty years of experience working with disadvantaged populations in New York City and Hawaii.

She began her career in New York City teaching basic literacy and math skills to jailed inmates on Rikers' Island. After twelve years in the 25,000 inmate system, she left New York City as the Assistant Commissioner for Alternatives to Incarceration to work in Hawaii's Department of Public Safety. Here she served as the department's Substance Abuse Treatment Services Officer, Security Coordinator and as the Deputy Director where she was responsible for the operation of the state's eight jails and prisons, and the contract administration of three private prisons on the mainland. This included an operating budget of \$150 million, 1,800 staff and over 5,000 inmates.

Ms. Tsuji also served as the Chief of Staff to Lieutenant Governor Mazie Hirono where she coordinated projects in high tech, economic development and education amongst government, private sector and university communities.

She is currently the President & CEO of Lanakila Pacific, a unique Hawaii-based non-profit offering programs and social enterprises that build independence for thousands of people with challenged lives. Founded in 1939, Lanakila Pacific has grown tremendously over the years and today serves over 2,300 people with challenged lives each year with an operating budget of \$10 million.

Ms. Tsuji was also an instructor at the University of Hawaii teaching in the School of Social Work, and an independent consultant with the National Institute of Corrections. She serves on various boards and commissions.
