A brief description of the applicant's background: The Nisei Veterans Legacy Center was organized to preserve, perpetuate and share the legacy of the Americans of Japanese ancestry (AJAs) who served in the U.S. armed forces during World War II and to recognize the socioeconomic changes brought about in Hawaii because of their extraordinary wartime service. The NVLC was incorporated in 2012 as a nonprofit organization, supported by six Nisei-veteran related organizations; the 100th Infantry Battalion Veterans Club, Sons and Daughters of the 442nd RCT, Military Intelligence Service Veterans Club of Hawaii, 1399th Engineer Construction Battalion Veterans Club, 100th Infantry Battalion Legacy Organization and 442nd Regimental Combat Team Foundation.
2. The goals and objectives related to the request: The Nisei Veterans Legacy Center is dedicated to preserving and telling the story of all the Nisei who served in World War II, particularly in the units that were racially segregated by the government: the 100th Infantry Battalion (Separate), 442nd Regimental Combat Team, Military Intelligence Service, and 1399th Engineer Construction Battalion. It is our belief that service of the Nisei in the face of injustice and adversity, should be made known throughout Hawaii and the United States by generations to come.
3. The public purpose and need to be served: The story of the World War II Japanese Americans who offered their lives to a doubting nation, and their post-war contributions is an integral part of today's Hawaii. The NVLC will help preserve that story and raise public awareness of it, promoting civic responsibility at the same time.
4. Describe the target population to be served: We intend to target Hawaii residents, visitors and eventually all of America.
5. Describe the geographic coverage. Our current geographic area is the State of Hawaii however we fully intend to take this nationwide.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

In 2014, Eric Saul, the founder and executive director of Visas For Life and Institute for the Study of Rescue and Altruism in the Holocaust (ISRACH), generously donated the Go For Broke Exhibit to the Nisei Veterans Legacy Center (A description of the exhibit as well as a biography of Mr. Saul is attached as Exhibit "A"). Since then, the NVLC has presented the Exhibit at the following locations and dates:
 - i. Hawaii State Capitol, Oahu, Hawaii – March 24 – 28, 2014
 - ii. University of Hawaii West Oahu – March 31 – April 11, 2014
 - iii. Honolulu Hale, City and County of Honolulu – April 14-25, 2014
 - iv. Maui Nisei Veterans Memorial Center, Wailuku, Maui – May 1 June 13, 2014
 - v. 100th Infantry Battalion Clubhouse, Oahu, Hawaii – June 23-July 4, 2014
 - vi. Arizona Memorial Visitor's Center, Oahu, Hawaii – July 14-July 25, 2014
 - vii. Hawaii Community FCU, Kailua-Kona, Hawaii – August 18-September 12, 2014
 - viii. Hawaii Japanese Center, Hilo, Hawaii – September 17-October 10, 2014
 - ix. Central Pacific Bank, Oahu, October 25-December 6, 2014
 - x. Kauai Veterans Center and Museum, Lihue, Kauai, January 5-30, 2015

- b. Additionally, the Nisei Veterans Legacy Center has installed permanent exhibits or plans to install exhibits at (Attached as Exhibit C):

- iii. Honolulu International Airport – Interisland Terminal – Currently being planned

c. Annual Joint Memorial Service – The Nisei Veterans Legacy Center has assumed coordination and sponsorship of the World War II AJA veterans’ annual Joint Memorial Service, which honors the fallen members of the Nisei units. The Ninth Annual Joint Memorial Service was held on Sunday, September 28, 2014 at the National Memorial Cemetery at Punchbowl and was attended by approximately 300 people representing military organizations, veterans groups and members of the general public. Following the service, in keeping with tradition, some of the wreaths were placed at the Brothers in Valor Monument at Fort DeRussy.

d. A comprehensive interactive website is currently being developed which will be utilized to raise awareness of our efforts, our educational plans and partnerships with other Nisei Veterans organizations throughout Hawaii and the Mainland.

2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service: Installing the Go For Broke Exhibit at each location demands a tremendous amount of volunteer participation and the Nisei Veterans Legacy Center has been very fortunate in that we have received the outstanding support of the following volunteer organizations:

With these organizations, along with private contributions and significant in kind contributions, the NVLC was able to achieve a significant schedule of exhibitions during 2014 and it is our intent to replicate that effort in 2015. We are currently exploring other venues for the Go For Broke Exhibit and making improvements. Additional venues will be added to the exhibit schedule as they become available. Additionally we are working on permanent exhibits at Kahului Airport and Honolulu International Airport.

In September of 2015, we will hold the 10th Annual Joint Memorial Service at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific at Punchbowl to honor fallen Members of the 100th, 442nd, MIS and 1399th.

The NVLC website is currently under development and we anticipate that the website should be operational during the second half of 2015.

3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results; and

We have been gathering information from the public, including veterans and their Families, everywhere we showed the Go For Broke Exhibit since its Hawaii unveiling at the Capitol last year. With additional input from experts including the original exhibit's producer, historian Eric Saul, we are updating and revising the Go For Broke Exhibit to better tell the story of the Hawaii Nisei in World War II. For example, we are adding new pieces to tell of the story of the internment camps in Hawaii where Japanese Americans were imprisoned, particularly the Honouliuli Camp in West Oahu. We are also adding images and artifacts from the 100th Infantry Battalion's Honolulu office and the 442nd RCT Foundation.

The overall effort of the NVLC is being led by the following individuals:

Wesley Deguchi - president of the NVLC and also president of the Sons and Daughters of the 442nd RCT. Mr. Deguchi has been involved with the NVLC since its inception and has spearheaded the effort to bring all of the Nisei military units of World War II together. He has successfully grown the NVLC and has had similar success in growing the membership and interest among descendants of 442nd RCT veterans.

Mr. Lloyd Kitaoka - president of the 100th Infantry Battalion Veterans Club and an integral force in the Club's current growth and standing in our community. Mr. Kitaoka has also been involved in the 100th Battalion Veterans Club's Legacy Center design and construction and has valuable insight into growing the Go For Broke Exhibit by including more content about veterans who originated from the State of Hawaii.

Mr. Ted Tsukiyama – A prominent Honolulu attorney and a World War II member of the Varsity Victory Volunteers, 442nd Regimental Combat Team and Military Intelligence Service. Mr. Tsukiyama is a noted historian of all of the Nisei units from World War II. Mr. Tsukiyama has worked extensively with the University of Hawaii's Japanese American Veterans Center to preserve historical documents, photographs and artifacts that tell the story of the Nisei veterans of World War II

B. Facilities

The bulk of the NVLC's initial effort has been in program design and development as exhibited by the Go For Broke Exhibit, permanent exhibits at Honolulu International Airport and Central Pacific Bank, the annual AJA Veterans Joint Memorial Service and the design of the NVLC's interactive website. In the near future, the NVLC will put forth a plan for a permanent facility.

V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing






EXHIBIT DESCRIPTION

Go For Broke: Japanese American Soldiers Fighting on Two Fronts chronicles the history of Japanese American soldiers from the 100th Infantry Battalion, 442nd Regimental Combat Team (RCT) and Military Intelligence Service (MIS) who served during World War II.

Japanese American soldiers of the 100th and 442nd fought in eight campaigns across Europe, receiving an unprecedented seven Presidential Unit Citations. To this day, the 442nd RCT remains the most decorated unit in United States military history for its size and length of service. It is no wonder the 100th/442nd also suffered one of the highest combat casualty rates of any US military regiment.

Meanwhile, Nisei soldiers of the MIS helped win the war in the Pacific. Using their language skills, they “saved countless Allied lives and shortened the war by two years” according to Major General Charles Willoughby, G-2 Intelligence Chief under General MacArthur’s command.

The *Go For Broke* exhibit was originally created in 1980-1981 through the efforts of more than 100 Nisei veterans in the San Francisco Bay Area and Los Angeles. The exhibit was originally shown at the Presidio of San Francisco and toured throughout the United States for nearly 10 years. It formed the basis for other exhibits at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington DC and Ellis Island Immigration Museum in New York. Most recently, the *Go For Broke* exhibit was featured at the Japanese American National Museum in Los Angeles.

The exhibit covers the following components:

- Japanese Immigration to the territory of Hawaii and the continental United States, 1885-1924
- Prewar Japanese experience in Hawaii and the mainland, 1924-1941
- Pearl Harbor – Japanese American evacuation and internment on the west coast
- Japanese American soldier in World War II, including story of the 100th/442nd/522nd, and the history of Japanese Americans of the Military Intelligence and Language Service, to include the role of Japanese Americans in the occupation of Japan after the War
- Individuals who helped Japanese American soldiers during World War II
- Soldiers returning home – closing of the internment camps
- Japanese American veterans and the civil rights movement
- The Redress Movement – passage of House Resolution 442, Civil Liberties Act of 1988
- The continuing legacy

The **Nisei Veterans Legacy Center (NVLC)** is proud to present this exhibit and the remarkable story of the Nisei. The NVLC’s mission is to preserve, perpetuate and share the legacy of Hawaii’s Nisei soldiers who were part of the 100th, 442nd, MIS and 1399. ABOUT THE CURATOR



Eric Saul is the Founder and Executive Director of Visas for Life and Institute for the Study of Rescue and Altruism in the Holocaust (ISRAH), whose mission is to document a comprehensive history of the Holocaust. One its projects, *The Righteous and Honorable Diplomats* created six traveling exhibits, which have been shown in more than 150 institutions worldwide. Over the period of 40 years, Eric Saul curated a number of exhibits on the contribution of minorities to the US military. He has curated an exhibit documenting the history of the famous Japanese American soldiers of the 100th, 442nd and MIS, which eventually evolved into an exhibit at the Smithsonian Institution entitled *A More Perfect Union: Japanese Americans and the Constitution*.

In 1980, Eric Saul co-founded the Go For Broke 100th/442nd/MIS Foundation, later called the National Japanese American Historical Society (NJAHS). Eric Saul has curated exhibits documenting the story of Japanese American immigration to the U.S., soldiers of the 522nd Field Artillery Battalion who liberated the infamous Dachau Death March. In 2002, he created a national project, the Kansha Project, to honor people who risked their reputations to help Japanese Americans during World War II. In 2010, Saul curated the exhibit *Go For Broke: Japanese American Soldiers Fighting on Two Fronts*. The exhibit was recently shown at the Japanese American National Museum in Los Angeles.

Saul has also written several publications. He was the co-author of *The Great Earthquake and Fire of 1906* (1982) and contributed to *Go For Broke: The Story of the Japanese American Soldier in World War II* (1981). He was coeditor of Yukiko Sugihara's memoir, *Visas for Life* (1995). He also authored *Unlikely Liberators: The Story of Chiune Sugihara and Japanese Americans of the 522nd Field Artillery* (1995). He is presently writing a major new book on diplomatic rescue in World War II.






