I. Background and Summary

Palama Settlement (PS) is a private, non-profit, community-based social service agency that has been serving the densely populated urban neighborhoods of Liliha-Palama-Kalihi since 1896. Over the years the agency has been the pioneer of many innovative programs to meet the critical needs of the ever-changing face of this community. These programs have included the state's first public health nursing clinic; outpatient, birth control, prenatal, well-baby and venereal disease clinics; pure milk depots; and free dental care through the Strong-Carter Clinic. With the City and County and State taking over the community's medical needs in the late 1940s, Palama Settlement focused on addressing the needs of the waves of new immigrants who settled in the neighboring community.

From inception, Palama Settlement has provided both the young and old with a place to gather, to learn and to expand their creativity. A major part of Palama's mission is to serve the less fortunate, and disenfranchised families that reside in an area of Honolulu with the highest density of low-income housing projects in the State. The youth who reside in this low-income neighborhood, particularly those who reside in one of the Kalihi area public housing projects, are frequently exposed to crime, drugs and violence. Growing up in poverty is additionally associated with risk factors that impede the successful transition to adulthood and self-sufficiency.

Palama Settlement's mission statement is: To help those with the greatest needs in our surrounding community to empower themselves through promoting education, health, and well-being. Currently, PS offers an afterschool program for children, providing youth with afterschool homework assistance from the low-income neighborhoods surrounding Palama Settlement, many of whom are from the Micronesian community. Among these families, some parents are unable to help their children with homework assistance because of their language barrier. These children often have limited experiences with literacy and math skills except during the school day. However, we are looking to expand programming with direct emphasis on meaningful and relevant literacy activities and math projects. The goals are to increase exposure to a range of literacy and math experiences by increasing comprehension and fluency in reading and building math skills.

As a community-based, non-profit organization established in 1896 and incorporated in 1910, PS has developed innovative programs and services to meet the challenges faced by the ever-changing community of new immigrants. Since 2007, Palama Settlement has worked with Home Work Plus (HWP) an afterschool program of Learning for a Lifetime (LFL), a 501(c) organization that has provided tutoring to elementary school-aged

children at Palama Settlement. Beginning in 2013, PS provided financial support to LFL for their invaluable services to the neighborhood children. LFL has created a foundation for the program, but because of LFL's limited resources, they are unable to expand and further develop the program.

With the financial assistance of this grant, Palama Settlement's future plan would be to transition this program from LFL to Palama Settlement having complete oversight of the program. PS would rebrand the program to be called "Ho'opa'a Kakou" (meaning to learn together) afterschool program. In addition to providing oversight, PS will also provide management of daily operations and fiscal responsibility, assisting with recruitment of participants and volunteers, collection and tabulation of data and through the provision of supplies and incentives. PS will develop and expand the curriculum and activities to ensure that the proposed outputs and outcomes are achieved. Palama Settlement will provide leadership and direction to the lead instructor, assistant and volunteers. PS will also provide direct oversight of the daily programming and curriculum development.

The target population of Ho'opa'a Kakou program is the children from the low-income neighborhood surrounding Palama Settlement. Most of the children attend Likelike and Kaiulani Elementary schools and many are children of Chuukese immigrants. Although open to all children in the neighborhood, the participants are primarily ages 6 to 10 years old. With expanded literacy and math skills focused activities, the program will be publicized to the neighborhood public schools to increase attendance by kindergarteners, as well as to recruit volunteers from literary and math, accounting clubs at local universities.

The goal of the Ho'opa'a Kakou afterschool program would be to expand the hours and provide more enriching curriculum and activities where children will learn in a fun and hands-on way. Children will learn increased literacy and math skills that will help them stay engaged in the classroom and ultimately succeed in school.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

Currently, the afterschool program operates on a token economy with children earning points for completing various tasks. Points are redeemed for snacks or toys (bubbles, cars, etc.) or may be saved. With between 8 to 23 children attending the drop-in afterschool program on a given day, the one (1) instructor and occasional volunteer is usually busy providing homework assistance with little time to provide intentional literacy and math skills activities.

This proposal is to expand the hours and staffing, so that activities can provide a variety of literary and math skills experiences. To enhance the literacy learning experience, curriculum would be developed to include story time to promote familiarity of books, understand story structure, improve listening comprehension and vocabulary, followed by open book discussions or related activities. Children will engage in purposeful reading to acquire information that connects books/writings to activities such as recipes and cooking; and written instructions to hunt for treasure, earn a snack, play a game or construct a project. To bring stories to life, role playing, puppets and/or story boards will also be used.

To enhance the math skills learning experience, curriculum would be created to teach children arithmetic, addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Everyday experiences like counting and sorting the number of objects such as toys, pencils, cups, etc. Real world situations and exercises such as counting the number of bananas on a bunch at the grocery store would provide practical experience for the children. Fun activities such as board games like *Chutes and Ladders* and *Monopoly* could be utilized to exercise counting and arithmetic skills.

Furthermore, homework assistance will be provided only during the first hour to encourage on-time attendance and to allow 1 ½ hours for literacy and math skills activities.

Projected Timeline:

Month 1 & 2: Plan, design and develop curriculum

Month 3: Market and intake enrollment

Month 4: Implement curriculum and conduct pre-test

Month 5: Continue curriculum and introduce new components

Month 6: Continue curriculum and conduct post-tests

Month 7: Conduct mid-year evaluation, review for any improvements, develop plan (if needed)

Month 8, 9, 10 & 11: Continue curriculum, conduct post-test, and adjust as needed Month 12: Conduct annual review and analysis, review for any suggestions for overall improvements.

To measure the success of the program, the following will be monitored:

- Up to 30 children will attend the program each month (unduplicated each month) as evidenced by a sign-in log.
- At least 10 children will attend the program 90% of the time, each month.
- The program will offer two different literacy and math skills activities each week.
- A pre-test of the children will be conducted as well as a post-test, providing at least 75% of the children receiving an increased post-test score.

Palama Settlement staff will closely monitor and evaluate the success of the Hoʻopaʻa Kakou afterschool program. A daily attendance sheet will be recorded to track and monitor participation. The curriculum and program activities will be logged and described in a monthly report to the Program Administrator. A pre-test would be conducted at the beginning of each component to establish a baseline of knowledge prior to instruction of the subject area. Furthermore, a post-test will be conducted at the end of each session measuring the knowledge gained from the instruction and activities. Pre and post tests will be analyzed and evaluated for effectiveness and success of the program.

Meetings with the staff and volunteers to assess the program will be conducted every two months to review reports, evaluate the program and discuss any ideas for improvements. Viable suggestions for improvements will be implemented and monitored. At the completion of the year, a comprehensive analysis on the program will be conducted.

IV. Experience and Capability

A. Necessary Skills and Experience

Palama Settlement has a rich history of providing activities and programs for atrisk youth in the Kalihi, Palama, and Liliha areas. PS in partnership with LFL has administered this afterschool program since 2007, which produced successful results. Currently, an average of 23 children attend the program monthly and learn a variety of academic skills and receive assistance with their homework. Because this program is a drop-in program and offered free of charge, the daily attendance of children can vary. Those who do attend PS afterschool program are provided

with a safe and nurturing environment for them to learn in and gain skills to be successful in school.

For the past seven years, Ms. Lynn Sager has been the lead staff of Palama Settlement's afterschool program. Ms. Sager possesses the enthusiasm and passion for working with youth and educating children. She provides them with support and guidance in an enthusiastic, yet patient way and gives students positive feedback and encouraging words. In turn, the children enjoy learning and participate eagerly in the educational activities. With more than 15 years of teaching experience, Ms. Sager's background and experience includes being an academic instructor and a private tutor. In addition, she received a bachelor's degree from the University of Hawaii and is Microsoft certified in a variety of software applications.

B. Facilities

The Palama Settlement campus sits on 6.5 acres of land mauka of Vineyard Boulevard, and makai of the freeway, and is bordered by Palama Street to the west and Pua Lane to the cast. Seven buildings are situated on the campus, and include the Weinberg Gymnasium, locker rooms, Higashino Administration Building, the Rath Building, the Tenant Building, Corbett House and a private residence. The Tenant, Corbett and Rath Buildings were built in the 1920's. The most recent construction was the expansion of the 1984 Administration Building and dining area, completed in 2006. There is also a 25 meter swimming pool, which is open to the public for free swim, and a football practice field.

Palama Settlement's Harry and Jeanette Weinberg gymnasium was built in 1959. The gymnasium consists of a full-sized basketball court and a smaller court under 20 feet ceilings. There is also an outdoor court which was built by a donation from the Alfred L. Castle Jr. Trust adjacent to the gym. Ample free parking behind the gym makes the Weinberg gymnasium a desired location for various activities and functions. With its double courts, the Weinberg gymnasium is one of the largest on the island.

The Ho'opa'a Kakou program is located on the first floor of the Rath Building. The classroom space is limited and at times is overflowing, but it does provide kids a clean, safe place to enjoy learning, reading and the various after-school activities.

V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

A. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

To expand and enhance the current program, our goal is to hire two part-time staff to help support the mission of the Hoʻopaʻa Kakou program. We would conduct an extensive recruiting effort to find the most qualified staff, who would be able to work and provide the children with a safe, nurturing environment as well as the teaching experience to offer a curriculum where children are able to learn and develop. The staff would have an education background with an interest in helping and teaching young children. Because PS services an ethnically diverse population, including those from an immigrant population where English is their second language, the staff would need to have the compassion and desire to work with this type of disadvantaged, at-risk youth. The staff would also need to be creative, self-directed and enjoy working with children, helping them to learn and succeed.

Palama Settlement's Executive Director Wendy Abe has an extensive background in the operations and management of local non-profit organizations. She will be assisted by the program administrator, a licensed social worker who has been with Palama Settlement since 1995, and served as program director since 2007. Our Business Manager Rosalinda Reyes, has been working for Palama Settlement for the past 34 years and has vast experience in budgeting, fiscal planning and reporting. The newly hired fund development director will continue to seek additional resources to help support the program.
