After-School All-Stars Hawaii (ASAS Hawaii) provides after-school and summer programs that keep children safe and help them achieve in school and in life. ASAS Hawaii provides structured after school programming which includes academics, enrichment and health/fitness activities, targeting Hawaii's middle /intermediate school youth. ASAS Hawaii partners with seven schools on Oʻahu and three schools on Hawaii Island, and served 1,901 children last year.

The key success factor is that ASAS Hawaii operates at partner school sites, with a full-time staff member located at each school. This enables program staff members to get to know students and parents, while working closely with school faculty and administration. ASAS Hawaii staff members have familiarity and experience with the diverse population of Hawaii and a passion for working with low-income and at-risk youth.

Founded by Arnold Schwarzenegger in the 1990s, today ASAS is a national association of fourteen chapters serving 72,000 youth annually in 326 schools across the country. The Hawaii chapter, formed in 2009, benefits from the experience and expertise honed of years of providing these programs nationally.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

ASAS Hawaii requests a Grant-In-Aid to help socially and economically disadvantaged students achieve the recommended sixty minutes of physical activity every day. ASAS Hawaii will meet this need by providing daily after-school health/fitness activities in some of the poorest middle schools in Hawaii. Through participation in health/fitness activities as part of the comprehensive ASAS program, students will experience improved attendance, behavior and academic performance.

The following objectives will be targeted:

2,000 students will engage in daily sports or health/fitness activities through ASAS Hawaii.

- 28% or fewer chronic absences for ASAS participants (students with absences greater than 8.5% of elapsed school year).
- ASAS participants will demonstrate positive school behavior, as evidenced by 1-2% of program participants with 10 or more behavior risk scores.
- · ASAS participants will perform well academically, as evidenced by 5% or fewer program participants with course failures on their report cards.
 - 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Daily exercise has proven mental, emotional and physical health benefits for children. Students are able to achieve their personal best in school when they are equipped with the tools to lead healthy, active lifestyles.

Due to budget cuts and focus on testing during the school day, the Department of Education has cut back on extracurricular classes such as art, music and P.E. According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), there is substantial evidence that physical activity can help improve academic achievement, including grades and standardized test scores. Further, physical activity can have an impact on cognitive skills and attitudes and academic behavior including enhanced concentration, attention, and improved behavior. (Comprehensive Schools Physical Activity Programs: A Guide for Schools. National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, December 2013.)

Specifically, the CDC reccommends before and after school activities because students are able to: 1) practice what they have learned in physical education, 2) work toward the nationally recommended 60 minutes of daily physical activity, 3) become more adequately prepared for learning, 4) engage in safe, social, and supervised activities, and 5) identify activities they enjoy and might engage in long term.

Unfortunately, many children in Hawaii do not have access to organized sports and activities. Low-income families cite lack of money for fees, lack of transportation and lack of opportunities as reasons why children are unable to participate in organized sports.

ASAS Hawaii is in a position to provide enrichment and health/fitness activities Monday through Friday for 2-3 hours every day. Further, ASAS seeks to interrupt the typical trend in which children become less physically active as they age. Generally, participation in sports declines as children age. In a nationally representative survey, 77% of middle school students had participated in daily physical activity, compared to 29% of high school students. (CDC. Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance—United States, 2013. *MMWR* 2014;63(SS-4)).

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

ASAS targets middle school students who face one or more challenges indicating they are "atrisk," such as low household income, poor academic performance, poor attendance record, and lack of access to after-school alternatives. ASAS Hawaii serves middle school children because this age is a pivotal point in young people's lives. Middle school students are going through academic, social and developmental changes and developing habits that can profoundly affect their futures. Students who develop good academic and lifestyle habits will be well prepared for success in high school, college and beyond.

For the proposed ten school sites, about 2,000 students will be involved in the project. Across ten schools about 79% of participants qualify for free or reduced school lunch. An estimated 40% of participants are Native Hawaiian and 40% are of another ethnic minority. After-School All-Stars is the only after-school provider in the state of Hawaii that specifically targets 6th, 7th and 8th graders in the public middle/intermediate schools.

This project will combine daily activities with culminating community events that engage family members and motivate students throughout the year.

The following tasks will be achieved:

- 2,000 middle school students engage in physical activity for about 60 minutes each day
- · Two "Sports Showdowns" held on each island (O'ahu and Hawaii Island)
- · 300 students participate in at least one "Sports Showdown"
- 50 students participate in the Special Olympics Area Games

To achieve the daily goal of sixty minutes of daily activity, ASAS Hawaii will introduce middle school students to a variety of sports and activities, from football to Zumba to hula to nutrition and gardening classes. As they are exposed to new experiences, students will learn and be more likely to engage in physical activities when they transition to high school.

ASAS Hawaii will partner with community organizations when needed to provide sports including football, basketball, volleyball, soccer, tennis, bocce ball and Zumba. ASAS Hawaii has partnered with the Police Athletic League, Special Olympics of Hawaii, Pop Warner, Boys and Girls Club and many others. High school athletic directors have told us these experiences boost students' confidence and increase their likelihood of trying out for sports when they get to high school.

Research shows that youth participation in physical activity is influenced by participation and support of parents and siblings. Recognizing the importance of family involvement, ASAS Hawaii will host two "Sports Showdowns" each year. This will be a fun day bringing together about 300 students from different schools to compete in a range of events. Students will have a chance to showcase their new athletic skills in a fun, competitive setting. Volunteer coaches and athletes from Hawaii Pacific University/Chaminade University will serve as officiates for the events.

Additionally, ASAS Hawaii partners with Special Olympics Hawaii on the Area Games in May. Through this partnership, ASAS students train, support, and compete with children with disabilities. These relationships foster respect, dignity, and advocacy for students with disabilities. On Oʻahu, ASAS Hawaii peers will compete at UH Mānoa and enjoy the added benefit of staying in the college dorm on the weekend of the event. Our students often cite the Special Olympics as the most rewarding aspect of their involvement with ASAS Hawaii.

ASAS Hawaii uses iResult to monitor behavioral, social and academic progress. iResult is a technology platform designed to help educational leaders collect data, evaluate programs, and make decisions based on performance and outcomes. iResult pulls data from multiple systems and transforms data into a standard format. Participating ASAS students are "grouped" in order to analyze the influence of the participation based on data. iResult also supports participant applications, which enables ASAS to maintain individual records and manage data efficiently.

Program quality assurance is supported through oversight by our parent organization, After-School All-Stars National. ASAS Hawaii is part of a national organization that provides a structured framework and program support. Our local chapter must meet standards related to program quality, reach and outcomes, organizational governance, and financial sustainability. Thus, program processes are consistent across all sites, while being tailored locally to meet needs and access available resources.

ASAS Hawaii has demonstrated success in providing after-school programs across multiple sites. The program meets the needs of students with mulitple barriers to academic success. Our strengths include: 1) site coordinators who work full-time at the school; 2) access to student behavioral, attendance and academic data, which helps us identify and address problems collaboratively with parents and teachers; and 3) relationships with dozens of community partners who bring experiential learning opportunities in a range of disciplines; 4) solid

relationship with Hawaii Department of Education for the past seven years, good rapport with administration.

B. Facilities

ASAS Hawaii programs operate at their respective school campuses. This facility usage is Type II usage of public schools, which is designated for governmental agencies, not for profit community educational or recreational activities, youth clubs, athletic teams, labor organizations or service clubs conducting general recreational activities, community affairs, or public hearings for which there is no admission charge, collection taken or offering received during the use of school facilities.

The leadership team and organizational structure will contribute to success of this project. Leading our team is Dawn Dunbar, CEO, who founded ASAS Hawaii in 2009. Dawn will be responsible for meeting the administrative contract requirements (insurance, non-discrimination, etc.) and will oversee contract corrective action. Dawn has a Master's Degree in Business Administration from Graziadio School of Business at Pepperdine University, and a Bachelors Degree in English from Loyola Marymount University. Dawn has built relationships with schools, partners, funders and public officials, which have been critical to our success.

Paula Fitzell, COO, oversees the administrative functions and daily operations for ASAS Hawaii. Paula has a Master's Degree in Education from Trinity College in Dublin, Ireland. She previously worked for KCAA Preschools, overseeing administration of the organization with an annual operating budget of approximately \$7 million.

David Asato, Director of Programs, oversees programs on two islands, managing program staff and coordinating efforts with partner agencies. David was previously a teacher for Olomana High and Intermediate and a consultant for Hawai'i Department of Education. He was also executive director of VSA arts of Hawaii-Pacific, a statewide non-profit organization committed to helping at-risk adults and youth with developmental and other lifelong disabilities prepare to enter the workforce or continue their education. Program operations and evaluation are supported by a full-time Program Coordinator who works closely with the Director of Programs.

ASAS Hawaii Site Coordinators are responsible for daily operations of ASAS Hawaii programs at each school. They work on-site and are directly involved with students, teachers and administrators every day. Site coordinators have one or more years experience working in a leadership or supervisory capacity in an after-school, day-camp or community youth outreach setting.

Program Leaders teach classes, run activities, assist with homework, chaperone field trips and collaborate with partner instructors. We maintain a 20:1 leader to student ratio to ensure adequate supervision and individual attention. Program leaders must have a year or more of non-profit or related experience in youth development. Our staff members have familiarity and experience with the Hawaii's diverse population, and a passion for working with low-income or at-risk youth.

Sustaining these programs is always a challenge because there is insufficient federal and state funding to meet the demand for after-school programs in middle school. Each year, ASAS Hawaii pursues diverse revenue sources to ensure programs operate uninterrupted despite

fluctuations in public funding. Numerous resources support programs each year, including HIDOE, Kamehameha Schools, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Hawaii Community Foundation, Hawaii P-20 and various private foundation grants. ASAS Hawaii also has loyal individual and corporate supporters providing funding each year.

Toward the goal of sustainable funding for after-school, ASAS Hawaii helped create the Hawaii Afterschool Alliance in 2014. The Alliance is part of a national initiative by Charles S. Mott Foundation to expand afterschool resources and enhance the public conversation around this issue. The Alliance is comprised of business and political leaders, nonprofits, educational advocacy and school partners. The Alliance will drive meaningful dialogue at all levels about the importance of prioritizing and resourcing afterschool as fundamental element of every child's education. The Alliance will support a network of afterschool providers in policy/advocacy related to quality and sustainability of programs.

Also contributing to sustainability, ASAS Hawaii maintains low overhead by using minimal office space and relying on in-kind administrative and program space at school sites. There is no charge to students to attend ASAS Hawaii programs.

In spite of funding challenges, it is clear that the investment in quality after-school programs for this age group clearly outweighs the huge cost of juvenile detention, teen pregnancy, and drug abuse — vices of unsupervised time during the danger zone hours. Another way to look at the benefits is that it costs approximately \$10,000 per student for six hours of school, and \$1,000 for three hours after school. ASAS participants receive 15% more time in school each day at 10% of the cost, and they are engaging in academic and extracurricular activities that help promote self-confidence and a positive attitude towards their futures. In other words, the return on investment are dollars well spent when kids have somewhere to go, something to do, and someone to believe in them.
