Application for Grants

I. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Ho'opulapula Haraguchi Rice Mill (HHRM) a 501(c)(3) nonprofit was established on October 14, 1983 to restore the Haraguchi Rice Mill (HRM) after Hurricane Iwa. Listed on the State and National Register of Historic Buildings, the organization's mission at that time was to rebuild the mill and utilized as an education resource to document the agrarian history of The goals and objectives related to the request;

Taro farmers and other farmers are experiencing crop depredation by Endangered Waterbirds and Nene geese, and have not been able to protect their crops and continue to suffer financial loss of their crops that has increased exponentially as the bird populations continue to increase yearly. Kaua'i produces 85% of the taro in the State with the majority (65%) produced in Hanalei. During the 1970s the first instance of 1 of the 3 endangered water birds (Hawaiian Coot - 'Alae Ke'oke'o) consuming taro was sporadic and minimal. Then in 1999 the Nene geese were introduced into the Hanalei Valley which started with approximately 2 dozen and currently the north shore has over 800 Nene geese, an increase of 3200% in 15 years.

Due to the birds are on the Endangered Species List, the farmers have tried every suggestion by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS) to alleviate the taro depredation (collecting and placing sticks in the field, leaving weeds in fields) but none have proven successful. The farmers have tried formal mediation with Peter Adler but USFWS refused to complete the process. The farmers have tried a fencing experiment with USFWS but the summary results presented by USFWS were not able to be discussed in the incomplete mediation process, (which the farmers disagreed with the summary), resulted in denying farmers the ability to fence the newly planted taro field. The farmers offered to donate huli (taro seedlings) and labor to plant taro in the USFWS ponds to draw more birds there, but were told that it would degrade their ponds and refused the offer. The birds are consuming the newly planted taro shoots until the plant dies. Then the birds also consume the plants that were able to survive, before the farmer can harvest the taro. Some fields are experiencing 95% consumption by birds, for example, a field that would have produced 120 bags (9600 lbs) of taro was left with only 5 bags (400 lbs). Last year, Haraguchi farms lost 40,000 lbs of taro. Another farmer raising beets lost 2,000 lb to the birds and quit farming that area. Another

farmer on the Big Island that once farmed 60 acres of a 3rd generation farm, he reduced it to a 17,000 square feet greenhouse and now has given up. He told his children there is no farm left to come back to after college and his marriage ended in a divorce.

With all of the previous options, the farmers are running out of time and ideas. This project may be the last attempt to solve this challenge. There is no question that rice can grow in Hawaii and was an economic success at one time. At the peak of rice production in Hawaii (1887) there were approximately over 10,000 acres of rice that produced over 13 million pounds of rice which was exported. In 1899 Hawaii's production has expanded so that Hawaii placed 3rd in production behind Louisiana and South Carolina.

The Haraguchi Rice Mill (HHRM) was the last surviving rice mill when it closed in the 1960s. Rice is planted in May and harvested in September and October just before the birds start to eat the taro. This project is to test the feasibility of wet fallowing the harvested rice fields to draw the birds to consume the fallen rice grains and stalks, and lessen the depredation on the taro fields. This will enable the farmers to utilize crop rotation to enhance the soil and receive some income from the harvested rice.

California rice farmers have proven that working collaboratively with the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) Waterbird Habitat Enhancement Program (WHEP), to enhance habitat on 100,000 acres of rice lands was successful. This program helps to sustain production agriculture in the Central Valley while also providing wildlife with surrogate wetland habitat to help offset substantial loss of wetland habitat over the past 150 years. It has proven to become a model for enhancing waterbird habitat. This was a cooperative effort between the NRCS, California Rice Commission, rice growers, Audubon California, Point Blue Conservation Science and The Nature Conservancy to find ways to both grow rice and improve habitat for birds. And that it needs continual investment to provide long-term benefits to farmers, birds, our environment and consumers.

In essence, the taro farmers are doing this already on a very small and limited scale in comparison to the amount of acreage that this study entailed and with no cost by the government to maintain the taro/bird habitat which the taro farmers maintain, nor are taro farmers receiving any compensation for the taro loss. Taro farming has proven to be a natural and sustainable environment for the Hawaiian waterbirds year round that now includes the Nene geese; and so much so that the success of the habitat has increased the bird populations to over populate the taro fields and consume the taro. Utilizing the success of the California rice farmers,

this project will also contribute to solving the depredation of taro by the Hawaiian waterbirds and Nene geese.

The demise of the Hawaii rice industry was due to several factors that this project will avoid such as the problems of the Chestnut Mannequin (rice bird) consuming the crop can be alleviated by covering the field with a fine fiber netting that are now produced. HHRM had done a prior rice crop for a demonstration educational program for the HHRM education program, and utilized this cover. However, a week before harvest, Hurricane Iniki hit Kaua`i and although the rice crop didn't survive, the fiber cover did.

Another problem was the lack of mechanization and the small fields as compared to the California rice fields. The rice farmers here tried utilizing a John Deere harvester which was huge and heavy and would get stuck in the mud. A Japanese representative had suggested utilizing similar machines from Japan due to the similarity of the field size and the compact and light machines. With the rice industry already declining and it may have not been feasible to consider equipment from Japan; this project will research and bring in the appropriate new and used machines. In order for rice to grow in Hawaii again, it has to be fully mechanized as it is done in Japan, from planting, weeding, harvesting, processing and marketing. In addition, this project will also grow several specialty varieties that are being recommended from Japan and U.S. in several areas of Kaua'i to test the different soils and weather conditions while utilizing a fully mechanized process from planting to harvesting to processing to marketing. There may also be a possibility to adapt the rice equipment for taro cultivation also.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The depredation of agricultural crops by the Endangered birds are increasing each year and has already driven farmers to quit farming in the area of depredation and for some to quit farming entirely. With many farms going out of business for various reasons, this crop depredation is another reason that will prevent Hawaii from reaching its goal of sustainability. Taro is the State Plant and culturally significant to our Hawaiian culture and needs to be protected. It also contributes to the scenic vistas and to tourism as reflected on the many photos that are utilized for advertising. Agriculture will only survive to the next generations if we can find ways to resolve the challenges in a cooperative and positive way. It is not agriculture vs endangered birds, taro farmers have been the reason the bird populations have increased so successfully that the birds are now eating their own habitat.

4. Describe the target population to be served;

The initial target will be the farmers that will be able to benefit by lessening the crop depredation by the birds. The newly tested rice crop may create another agricultural crop and in Hawaii. Rice is also a main staple next to poi and there is no rice grown commercially for consumers. It will also enhance the visitor industry by providing local restaurants with local staple rice and sushi rice. The millers, stores, farmers markets; will also have a more consistent supply and, both taro and rice consumers are another target population that will benefit from this project.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Testing will be done in Hanalei, Kapa'a and Koloa initially. However, after the project is completed, farmers that are interested may be able to utilize the rice equipment and learn the production techniques to grow rice to protect their taro fields.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

Participants have traveled to Japan twice last year to visit Japanese farmers and to attend the Japan World Agriculture Expo in Chiba and also the International Packaging and Processing Expo in Tokyo. They will again travel to Japan to learn in detail about rice cultivation, rice varieties and to select the rice equipment for production, harvesting and processing. They will also travel to Sacramento to see rice farms that have successfully fallowed harvested fields that have attracted birds similar to the Hawaiian Waterbirds and Nene, such as the American Coot, American Moorhen and Canadian geese.

Harvested taro fields will be planted with several selected rice varieties in different locations and cultivated in both organic and conventional methods. Fields will be tested for yields and qualities. Harvested rice will be tested for quality and taste, and packaging equipment will be tested for marketing specialty rice.

2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service:

This project may take more than a year to complete depending on the funding, arrival of equipment from Japan and the rice varieties that will be tested. The first quarter will be traveling to Japan and U.S., learning rice cultivation, selecting and receiving the rice equipment. An Advisory Board will be established to gather

more rice cultivation information. Depending on the time of year, fields will be prepped and planted with rice and harvested after 6 months. The Advisory Board and additional people will comprise a focus group to test the yield, quality and taste of each variety planted, and to gather a survey of restaurants that may be interested in purchasing rice.

3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate and improve their results;

The Advisory Board will be made up of people who have a PhD in agronomy with experience in growing rice, a former rice farmer, a former extension service person that is familiar with rice cultivation for the California Rice growers and from the local food service industry. Each of the Advisory Board members have extensive experience to advise the participants.

4. List the measure(s) of effectiveness that will be reported to the State agency through which grant funds are appropriated.

Cost and expenditures will be verified by actual invoices and receipts for each budgeted item. Each request will be accompanied by an explanation for purchases and also the portion of the grant it represents. Participants will also keep a daily log of bird counts of the 3 birds and to take photos to document the results.

III. Experience and Capacity

A. Necessary Skills and Experience

Rodney and Karol Haraguchi, President and Vice-President, have extensive experience from establishing the nonprofit organization, reconstruction of the HRM twice after Hurricanes Iwa and Iniki, which involved coordination with contractors, FEMA, State Historic Office and other foundations. They continue to run the organization through its Board of Directors and Education Coordinator. They also own W.T. Haraguchi Farm, Inc. and operate 2 farms located in Hanalei and Koloa. They are also partners in their value-added LLC, Hanalei Taro & Juice Company that processes, whole sales and retails their taro products. They have constructed and established their commercial kitchens that are fully certified with the Department of Health and have received certification for the various Food Safety training. Rodney is also President of the Kaua'i Taro Growers

Association, which he will be collaborating with the members that are interested in the project and would like to establish rice fields after the completion of this project.

V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

A. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

Rodney and Karol Haraguchi are contributing their time, office space, utilities, telephone, insurance, field use, equipment use as in-kind contribution. Jerry Ornellas will also be contributing his time, field use, equipment use as in-kind contribution to this project. Rodney will serve as Principal Investigator and will be hiring additional people who will do the field work in Hanalei and Koloa, according to his guidance and instruction. Karol Haraguchi will coordinate the grant with the expending agency and do the financials for the project. Total in-kind contribution to this project is \$62,120.

All of them have extensive farming experience and have considerable information on rice and taro to carry out this project. Karol has previously worked with FEMA, federal and state government departments, CPAs, computerized accounting, nonprofit accounting and will be able to provide all financial statements.

B. Organization Chart

HHRM President, Rodney Haraguchi and the Principal Investigator,, will be responsible to for the overall guidance and completion of this project. He will be responsible for hiring the additional part-time person and to train and instruct this person. Vice-President Karol Haraguchi will have fiscal and administrative responsibility for the grant and all accounting and financials.

HHRM nonprofit organization's Board of Directors and Officers are all on a voluntary basis. Rodney Haraguchi, President, has farmed taro since 1974 and his family has raised rice during the previous 2 generations prior to him. His father, William Haraguchi, will also be advising on this project. Rodney also holds a

Type 4 driving license that will allow him to haul any load that this type of license requires and also to haul the equipment between farms. Karol Haraguchi holds a B.Ed. degree from the University of Hawaii at Manoa and is a licensed Realtor in Hawaii. She has completed the Kaua'i Community College culinary and Food Safety Program for their certified kitchens. She has worked successfully with FEMA, other Foundations, and Federal and State funded projects for Historic Preservation and small businesses. She is the financial administrator for W.T. Haraguchi Farms, HHRM, Hanalei Taro & Juice Company and Hanalei Valley Realty.

D. Future Sustainability Plan

 Famers in Hawaii will not be able to survive if these challenges of crop depredation by endangered birds are not dealt with immediately as each year the bird population is increasing exponentially. If the State prefers not to fund this project, most farms are at a tipping point and are already operating on a slim margin of profit, if any profit at all. Agriculture will continue to decline in Hawaii and the dream of self-sufficiency and sustainability will not be possible and just a dream.
