Nā Kama Kai (Children of the Sea) is a nonprofit organization, whose mission is to connect our keiki with the kai (ocean) and nurture a deep sense of aloha and kuleana (responsibility) for their natural environment.

We empower youth by creating, conducting and supporting ocean-based programs, specifically targeting ocean safety and conservation awareness in order to increase the capacity of youth in the community through Hawaiian values, culture and environmental education. As stewards of the kai (sea) and 'āina (land), keiki (youth/children) from all ethnic origins and economic backgrounds learn to embrace their kuleana (responsibility) as caretakers of marine ecosystems that must be nurtured for future generations.

Nā Kama Kai was founded in 2008. Through the years, our programs have focused on mentorship of Hawai'i's youth. To date, 12,000 keiki have participated in Ocean Clinics, Alaka'i camps & Surf Contest, with nearly 1700 keiki served in 2015.

Ocean Clinics:

These popular clinics service our community statewide through touching the lives of our youth in numerous ways. The ocean clinics nurture a deep sense of love for the ocean and ingrain in each of the participants an understanding of their kuleana to water safety and environmental awareness. Nā Kama Kai programs target all youth ages 2-17. The clinics offer group and one-on-one interactions with professional surfers, watermen and waterwomen, lifeguards, firefighters, marine scientists, Hawaiian cultural practitioners, and ocean rescue instructors, providing a positive, nurturing, and controlled environment enabling keiki to become confident in the ocean through a personally guided experience. Participants also learn Hawaiian stories related to the event location, help shape traditional wooden surfboards, and learn about traditional Hawaiian ocean culture.

In 2016, Nā Kama Kai will conduct clinics at several locations on Oʻahu, including Haleʻiwa Beach Park, Waikiki (Publics), Kahana Bay Beach Park, Pōkaʻī Bay Beach Park, 'Ewa Beach Park, Waimānalo Beach Park, and Kailua Beach Park.

Alaka'i Mentorship Program:

This program establishes a relationship with youth in the community seeking a stronger commitment to the conservation and stewardship of the ocean including concepts of mālama 'āina and mālama kai (stewardship of the land and sea). This program is tailored to help meet the needs and interests of the youth in our community that are willing to commit to our program for one year. Our mentorship activities are carefully planned to guide youth in developing the self-respect and self-reliance necessary to accomplish long-term goals. Ocean navigational and boating skills are taught through a partnership with the Polynesian Voyaging Society. Participants are also introduced to ocean-related career opportunities through interaction with marine science professionals.

The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of this request is to acquire a specific parcel on Pōka'ī Bay and construct an ocean activity center called Halau Nā Kama Kai, to provide a consistent venue for Nā Kama Kai's ocean-based education and conservation awareness programs. Pōka'ī (or "night of the supreme one") was once the site of a navigational heiau and is named for an early voyaging chief from Kahiki who brought and planted the coconut from which has sprung a famous coconut grove. This culturally significant location will provide the perfect venue to educate keiki from the area about ocean conservation and Hawaiian values.

The purpose of Halau Nā Kama Kai is to provide a safe space for keiki to learn about the importance of ocean safety and conservation both after-school, weekends, and during school breaks. The center will be fully staffed to run Nā Kama Kai programming on a continuous, year long bases providing Lifeguards, mentors, ocean rescue certifications, lifesaving certifications (CPR, AED, First Aid, lifeguard), and become a familiar place that establishes a base for youth the depend on for consistence and support. Moreover, it will serve as a base of operations for Nā Kama Kai's where administrative offices are used to plan, organize, manage, and orchestrate events and activities. This site will also be used to house, repair and maintain equipment necessary for conducting ocean clinics and other public outreach and educational programs.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The population of Wai'anae and the Leeward Coast is predominantly Native Hawaiian and is historically low-income. It is considered a severely underserved

area. Wai'anae is the ideal place to base Halau Nā Kama Kai programing and activities.

Statistics from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention indicate that fatal drowning is the second leading cause of death for children ages 1-14 in the United States, claiming the lives of approximately 600-700 children each year. Hawai'i is no exception; it ranks among the nation's top ten states for youth-related drowning deaths. According to the State Department of Health, there has been an increasing trend in the annual number of drownings on O'ahu. Ocean activities are also the leading cause of spinal injuries in Hawai'i.

Insufficient swimming skills and limited participation of keiki in safe water and ocean related activities are a primary causes for this problem. Hawai'i is also one of the eight states in the U.S. that still do not offer a required youth oriented water safety education program even though the state is completely surrounded by water. Nā Kama Kai embraces this responsibility and teaches ocean safe practices in their clinics.

The connection of youth to the natural world is important, however, an increasing number of young people are spending less time outdoors. Such a disconnect has been termed "nature-deficit disorder" (R. Louv, "Last Child In the Woods"), suggesting a link to behavioral problems such as attention disorders and depression among children. Moreover, the absence of such a link increases the probability of growing up without understanding the importance of caring for our natural environment. To help mitigate this problem, Nā Kama Kai exposes keiki to nature during their ocean clinics, and engages them in a range of educational activities on shore and in the water.

Nā Kama Kai is also keenly aware of the need for our keiki to become more thoughtful stewards of the Hawai'i's natural treasures. Due to the exploitation of Hawai'i's resources this distinct archipelago has been labeled as the "endangered species capital of the world," with more endangered species per square mile than any other place on the planet (Bishop Museum). Certainly there could not be a more compelling reason to instill a strong conservation ethic in our youth *now*.

Nā Kama Kai Ocean Clinics are designed to teach a core Hawaiian concept of mālama 'āina, which is to actively take care of the living systems that sustain us. Keiki are given hands-on opportunities to learn about and connect to the kai. Our programs teach ocean conservation through a unique combination of marine science, water sports, and traditional Hawaiian culture. Through highly experiential and immersive experiences that promote by doing, keiki are inspired to develop a deep and lasting connection to the sea. As they grow, it is our hope they will remember this special place and continue to develop their relationship to the ocean. Hence, Nā Kama Kai ocean programs fill a void where place-based learning for keiki can be achieved through both cultural and contemporary modes of education.

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There is also a need for more targeted ocean safety programs in Hawai'i. Nā Kama Kai hopes to fill this void by providing quality, culturally relevant educational programs aimed at teaching the concept of kuleana through community service and care for our precious marine resources, increasing self-esteem and confidence in the ocean, and strengthening cultural knowledge and pride.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

While NKK target keiki ranging in age from 2-17 from a wide variety of ethnic and socioeconomic environments, most of participants fall within the 6-14 year-old age category.

During this important time in development, keiki establish their sense of identity and make significant strides toward adulthood by becoming competent, independent, self-aware, and involved in the world beyond their families. Biological and cognitive changes transform children's bodies and minds. When adolescents are involved in positive settings such as Na Kama Kai that are attuned to their needs and emerging independence, they gain confidence in themselves (Jacquelynne S. Eccles 1999). Our programs strive to support such positive outcomes.

Wai'anae is among the most economically disadvantaged communities in the state. Percentage of residents in poverty and median household income are two good measures of the challenges that a community faces. For these two metrics, according to the 2009 American Community Survey, the five towns along the Wai'anae Coast are in the bottom quarter for the state, led by Mākaha Valley. 33% of population on the Wai'anae Coast is under 18 years of age.

The geographic scope of this project will be the entire Leeward Coast, though the facility itself will be located at Pōka'ī Bay. Outreach will be focused on elementary, intermediate, and high schools in the area.
