1. A brief description of the applicant's background; Ohana Services Network (OSN) was established in July 2, 2014 as a 501(c) 3 non-profit corporation. OSN is a coalition of organizations that have established recovery-oriented systems of care across the state of Hawaii. Its formation resulted from the State of Hawaii's Access to Recovery (ATR) initiative, and provides recovery support services to support clients by providing treatment, recovery mentoring, counseling and group support with the resources it has available. Members of the coalition have also provided services since 2011 to youth through the National Guard Youth Challenge Program, an at-risk youth program.

Members of the coalition include Hale Na'au Pono, Kokua Support Services, Makana O Ke Akua, Inc., Newman Consulting Services, One Point Connections, Women in Need, Dawn Patrol Assessments, Family Nurturing Centers of Hawaii, For Living Hope, Lifeline, Pacific Cultural Institute, and the Honolulu Vet Center.

The coalition is a partnership that was developed as a result of the State of Hawaii's Access to Recovery (ATR) Initiative, which was funded by SAMHSA from 2008-2014. Since 2008, coalition members have been working in collaboration with the State of Hawaii Department of Health Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division. Since then, the coalition has continued and expanded its services on the islands, and through this grant seeks to expand into more communities.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request; With the Grants-in-Aid funding, OSN seeks to provide support services to homeless individuals living in shelters. OSN will assist them in transitioning from the shelters into more stable living environments. OSN will continue to provide a continuum of support services through their partner organizations as clients transition to become self-sustaining. By doing this, the individuals will continue to have structure support and contact resources outside the shelter.

- 3. The public purpose and need to be served; OSN seeks to serve the homeless population living in shelters. The organization will specifically be targeting families and individuals living in shelters in and around downtown Honolulu as well as shelters in Waianae. Due to the economy and the rising cost of living, the amount of homelessness in the community is increasing. The amount of homeless individuals within the City and County of Honolulu has increased 11.2% over the past three years, and is likely to increase more as the state continues to grow and develop. OSN plans to provide the necessary resources to help these individuals train, support, and sustain their livelihoods as they transition from shelters into independent living.
- 4. Describe the target population to be served; The target population to be served is homeless individuals and families. In a count performed by the City and County Honolulu Department of Community Services, Oahu's homeless population increased from 4,712 to 4,903. While the number of homeless family households decreased from 578 to 556, the number of homeless single individuals rose from 2,356 to 2,563. In addition, the numbers of individuals who are chronically homeless have increased over a two-year span. Of these numbers 993 are those with mental illnesses, 771 are those with substance use problems, and 476 of them are homeless veterans. While the local government and communities still work to reach a solution for these displaced individuals, it will be more imperative than ever to be able to provide the means necessary to support and empower these individuals as they transition from homelessness into other circumstances.
- Describe the geographic coverage. OSN is a coalition of different non-profit organizations spread across the island of Oahu providing a variety of services ranging from behavior and mental health counseling to workforce development and substance abuse treatment. Member headquarters are spread across the island, from downtown Honolulu to Waianae. These locations are important as they remain close to areas with higher numbers of homeless individuals living in shelters.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

In order to extend the reach of their program, OSN will also be partnering with homeless shelters between Honolulu and Waianae and determine which services will be most beneficial to the individuals who reside there. From there OSN will partner with the individual to create an action plan (AP) that will be tailored to the individual's own needs.

- The AP will be developed and implemented by the client and is designed to have a long-term plan to help the individual gain the skills and means necessary for independent living.
- 2. The AP should have a comprehensive approach and is designed to guide the client to improve different areas of his or her own life, such as employment, job skills, physical health, substance abuse, and domestic life.

- 3. The AP will involve a weekly action plan of steps that make progress towards the individual's goals, and will be assessed by OSN providers.
- 4. The AP emphasizes drawing on the collective experience of its providers so that they may work towards the best solution for its clients.

 - OSN is targeting to help 100 families or individuals with 30-50% of its clients accomplishing progress towards self sufficiency by the conclusion of June 2017. Self-sufficiency will be the ability to meet their own basic needs..

At these points, OSN will seek feedback to improve its program, as well as assess the clients for progress on their AP and track any changes the client has made. These changes

include an increase in job skills, a decrease in substance abuse, and other measurable attributes to be reported each quarter.

Each of OSN's organizations participated in the state's Access to Recovery (ATR) Initiative, servicing 10,000 individuals. According to SAMHSA's Services Improvement and Accountability System (SAIS) the data system that tracks client outcomes for all ATR grant initiatives across the nation, Hawai'i's clientele enrolled in ATR Ohana reported the following outcomes at six (6) months post enrollment in ATR Ohana:

- 18% improvement in Abstinence from drugs and alcohol
- 10% improvement in Stable Housing
- 31% increase in recognition of Social Consequences from substance use
- 50% increase in enrollment in education and/or training
- 44% increase in employment

The coalition has the capacity to continue to increase its efforts and results in the state's mental health community and initiative.

a. Hale Na'au Pono (HPN)

Hale Na'au Pono is a private non-profit corporation created by the people of the Wai'anae Coast to meet the needs of our community. Hale Na'au Pono, a Hawaiian name interpreted as "The House for Inner Balance", provides culturally and socially sensitive, community-based, behavioral health services for children and adults.

KSS mission is to serve, advocate, provide direct services, educate and assist the vulnerable populations in our community. Those populations include but are not limited to too; the disabled, homeless, those involved in the judicial system, substance abuse populations and the elderly. The purpose is to allow disadvantaged individuals the opportunity to achieve a higher level of independence through addressing their specific needs in a manner that promotes the greatest degree of self-respect and determination. KSS is committed to planning and nurturing seeds of change in the vulnerable populations we serve.

c. Makana O Ke Akua, Inc. (MOKA)

Makana O Ke Akua Inc. was founded for the sole purpose of offering a structured, clean and sober living environment for men who want to make a positive change with their lives. The organization offers support to men who may need support to properly identify and connect with the individuals who may need support in reconnecting with their families and children.

d. Newman Consulting Services, LLC (NCS) dba Newman Learning Center NCS's mission is to connect individuals to career success and opportunity by providing affordable training and support services in an atmosphere of respect, trust, understanding and communication. We are committed to transforming the lives of offenders in Hawai'i by providing support and training that lead to livable wage employment. We help clients understand that a good attitude and a strong work ethic are essential to getting and keeping a job. Our goal is to connect with the inmates through education, role-models and setting high standards for achievement. We promote the value of learning, self-worth and quality performance.

e. One Point Connections (OPC)

One Point Connections is a training system to develop the Trainee to become more connected to his Way of Living: spiritual-cultural, intellectual-metaphysical, and physical-health. When Ki is extended, when each Trainee extends positive thoughts via his way of living, his Spiritual, Cultural, Intellectual, Emotional, and Physical life is connected at a higher awareness and appreciation of relationships. Na 'Opio, the Youth will find purpose in his calling towards preparation to be leaders of his Family, and further, the community. The Kupuna, the Elders will model wisdom in their decision making as they will be the reference points for the

Family, further, Community's future. This connectedness fills the void found today in relationships between Son and Father, Mother and Daughter, Citizens and their Community.

f. Women In Need (WIN)

WIN's mission is to empower at risk men, women and children by helping them develop the basic tools and skills of personal development and self-sufficiency to become independent and productive members of our community—living in SAFE and stable environments, and in healthy relationships.

g. Dawn Patrol Assessments

Dawn Patrol Assessments provides counseling that addresses the identified need of the person and the co-existing issues related to family, relationships, employment, education, spirituality, physical health, mental health, alcohol/drug use and criminal justice concerns.

h. Family Nurturing Centers of Hawaii

Family Nurturing Centers of Hawaii focuses on building nurturing parenting skills for the prevention of child abuse and neglect. A parenting program is offered to parents and their children statewide.

i. For Living Hope

For Living Hope is a non-denominational ministry that provides for the emotional, physical, educational and social needs of at-risk children, youth and families.

i. Lifeline

 - d) Allows the state agency to which funds for the grant were appropriated for expenditure, legislative committees and their staff, and the auditor full access to their records, reports, files, and other related documents and information for purposes of monitoring, measuring the effectiveness, and ensuring the proper expenditure of the grant.
- 2) If the applicant is an organization, the applicant meets the following requirements pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes:
 - a) Is incorporated under the laws of the State; and
 - b) Has bylaws or policies that describe the manner in which the activities or services for which a grant is awarded shall be conducted or provided.
- 3) If the applicant is a non-profit organization, it meets the following requirements pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes:
 - a) Is determined and designated to be a non-profit organization by the Internal Revenue Service; and
 - b) Has a governing board whose members have no material conflict of interest and serve without compensation.

Pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, for grants used for the acquisition of land, when the organization discontinues the activities or services on the land acquired for which the grant was awarded and disposes of the land in fee simple or by lease, the organization shall negotiate with the expending agency for a lump sum or installment repayment to the State of the amount of the grant used for the acquisition of the land.


