Unite Hawaii is an anti-human-trafficking nonprofit victim services and prevention program provider. According to statistics compiled by Sisters Offering Support and IMUAlliance, every year, more than 2,500 women and children are trafficked on our shores. Hundreds of victims are children, with the average victim being only 13 years old, both local and nationally. Moreover, Hawai'i is home to over 150 high risk sex trafficking establishments. The islands are also subjected to "cybertrafficking," with over 110,000 ads for prostitution in Hawai'i posted online each year.

UNITE! is an educational program devoted to ending human trafficking in Hawai'i. Through outreach and awareness in local schools, we provide students with the skills necessary to prevent exploitation by building healthy relationships and learning communities. Our program, "It Ends With Us," explains how trafficking works in the 21st Century, preparing students to recognize threatening situations and respond to potential abuse. Additionally, we teach young adults how to become leaders in developing support systems that help heal peers who have been targeted by traffickers. Our program is standards-based, measurable, and age appropriate. Finally, Unite Hawaii is a leader in direct intervention services, providing crisis intervention and basic needs to victims, performing outreach and investigative functions in places at which trafficking occurs, and helping victims matriculate into healthy, sustainable lives.

This grant request will fund four critical functions:

- Establishing a drop-in center for sex trafficking victims and at-risk youth in need of assistance;
- Expanding prevention programming in intermediate and high schools, especially through the founding of extracurricular organizations and activities;
- Creating a statewide crisis hotline for potential victims of human trafficking, coupled with an internet-based outreach and victim assistance system;
- Funding a comprehensive study of "cybertrafficking" in Hawaii, or sex trafficking that is facilitated by online technology and websites, like backpage.com.

All educational programs funded by this grant will target intermediate and high school students, grades 7-12. Outreach programming will target sex trafficking victims of any age, meeting victims "where they're at," without regard to personal characteristics. Educational programming will be centered in Honolulu, but will be exported statewide. Outreach programming will serve and be available to the entire sex trafficking victim population of Hawaii, regardless of location.

 interdisciplinary and adaptable to differentiated student populations, standardsbased, and aligned with best evaluative practices for standards-based learning,
 accompanied by a networked system of extracurricular organizations;
- Launch a statewide anti-sex-trafficking hotline for victims and at-risk persons;

- Launch an internet-based outreach program to reach trafficked persons unable to access traditional intervention services;
- Serve at least 500 victims and at-risk youth through drop-in center programming;
- Make trauma-informed intervention response and anti-trafficking training available to all 13,500 public school teachers;
- Complete a comprehensive assessment of cybertrafficking in the State of Hawaii, with a report available to state agencies, policymakers, and the general public.
- 2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;
 - June 30, 2016: Begin search for drop-in center facility location;
 - July 31, 2016: Complete facility search; finalize prevention program for SY2016-2017;
 - August 31, 2016: Acquire/lease facility; launch prevention program at 10 schools; inaugurate statewide sex trafficking hotline; begin cybertrafficking report research;
 - September 30, 2016: Prepare drop-in center and finalize subcontracts with therapeutic professionals; expand prevention program to 15 schools; launch internet-based outreach protocol, begin media campaign to raise hotline awareness;
 - October 31, 2016: Launch drop-in center with comprehensive services availability; expand prevention program to 20 schools; complete cybertrafficking report research;
 - November 30, 2016: Launch education and career/technical training at drop-in center; being cybertrafficking report compilation, expand prevention program to 25 schools;
 - December 31, 2016: Provide assistance to at least 100 victims and at-risk youth over final quarter of 2016; expand prevention program to 30 schools, complete cybertrafficking report draft; reach 500 victims through internet-based outreach protocol;
 - January 31, 2017: Expand therapeutic programming at drop-in center to include post-reintegration services; finalize partnerships with longterm residential treatment providers; finalize and publish cybertrafficking report, expand prevention program to 40 schools;
 - March 31, 2017: Provide assistance to at least 150 victims and at-risk youth over first quarter of 2017 (250 victims total since launch); expand prevention program to 50 schools; expand internet-based outreach to 1,000 victims;
 - June 30, 2017: Provide assistance to at least 250 victims and at-risk youth over second quarter of 2017 (500 total), expand prevention program to 75 schools; expand internet-based outreach program to 1,000+ victims.

- Provided safe housing and care to 65 victims of sex trafficking;
- Provided anti-trafficking prevention education to over 10,000 students, in both Hawaii State Department of Education and private school settings;
- Worked collaboratively as members of the Hawaii Coalition Against Human Trafficking to develop protocols for victim services, education and prevention programs, anti-trafficking policy, public awareness campaigns, and facilitate direct intervention outreach;
- Forged partnerships with state agencies and local businesses, including the Hawaii Tourism Authority, Department of Health, Department of Human Services, Department of Education, Hawaii State Teachers Association, Hawaiian Airlines, University of Hawaii, and Argosy University.

Unite Hawaii brings the prior experience and skills of its professionals together under one banner to advance prevention, rescue, and restoration.

B. Facilities

Grant funds will be used to rent/lease facilities for a drop-in center in the urban core. Outreach and Program Director: The outreach and program director shall have a background in victim services and prevention education provision, at least one year of experience working directly with victims in need of trauma care, program development experience, and specific knowledge of anti-sex-trafficking programming needs.

Educational Programming Specialist: The educational programming specialist shall have at least one year of experience working in curriculum design or a related field.

Unite Hawaii is a nonprofit organization overseen by a board of directors. 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
