
HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO PRESERVE
PUEO HABITAT AREAS ON THE EWA PLAINS AND CONDUCT AN
EXTENSIVE PUEO HABITAT INVENTORY.

1 WHEREAS, Honouliuli Ewa Plain Pueos, the Disappearing
2 Sacred Guardians of Native Lands on The Ewa Plain, are listed by
3 the State of Hawaii as an endangered species on the island of
4 Oahu; and

5
6 WHEREAS, pueo, the Hawaiian owl and "bird of wisdom", have
7 a special place in Hawaii's mythology, known for offering
8 guidance and protection, and have silently sailed over the
9 Hawaiian Islands for well over one thousand years; and

10
11 WHEREAS, pueo, scientific name *Asio flammeus sandwichensis*,
12 are an endemic species of owl, which evolved in the Hawaiian
13 Islands with no fossil record before the Polynesians arrived in
14 the islands; and

15
16 WHEREAS, there are Pueo Awards, Pueo Scholars, Pueo
17 Programs, Pueo Pride, the University of Hawaii-West Oahu pueo
18 mascot, and yet, the real pueo that once thrived in great
19 numbers has been forgotten; and

20
21 WHEREAS, throughout Hawaii, streets, areas, and valleys
22 bear the pueo's name, with many such places having an intriguing
23 legend attached to them, and yet, our society and culture today
24 might let this great, beautiful, endangered species, which is
25 greatly loved in the islands, die off; and

26
27 WHEREAS, the guardian pueo belongs to heaven and earth, and
28 it was believed that after the death of an ancestor, the spirit
29 could still protect and influence the remaining family acting
30 through the body of the pueo; and

1 WHEREAS, the pueo was revered by the ancient Hawaiians as
2 an aumakua, or ancestral guardian of many Hawaiian families and
3 was associated with skill in battle, and that an encounter with
4 the pueo is considered to be an omen; and

5
6 WHEREAS, pueo truly fly without as much as a whisper of
7 sound, the owl's lethal talons and beak are hidden in a cloak of
8 soft, attractive thick feathers, their eyes, big and round, seem
9 human but deeply penetrating; and

10
11 WHEREAS, the pueo, unlike most owls, is mostly active
12 during the day and loves to fly at high altitude above open,
13 grassy areas, and is often seen hunting at dawn and sunset,
14 hovering over their prey before diving down for the kill; and

15
16 WHEREAS, pueo nest right on the ground, in grassy areas,
17 laying three to six eggs over a few months with the eggs
18 hatching at different times, and the young may fledge from the
19 nest on foot before they are able to fly, depend on their
20 parents for approximately two months, and are vulnerable to
21 feral cats, dogs, rats, and mongoose; and

22
23 WHEREAS, the pueo once flew in great numbers in the late
24 1800s on Oahu, but is rarely seen any more on the Ewa Plain due
25 to its need for an established habitat protection plan
26 specifically for the pueo; and

27
28 WHEREAS, pueo can also benefit from State and privately-
29 supported management activities designed to conserve other
30 endangered birds, and can benefit from game bird management as
31 densities of pueo occur on lands where game birds also are
32 common; now, therefore,

34 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
35 Twenty-eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular
36 Session of 2016, the Senate concurring, that the Department of
37 Land and Natural Resources is urged to preserve pueo habitat
38 areas on the Ewa Plains and conduct an extensive pueo habitat
39 inventory; and


