
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATEWIDE TRAFFIC CODE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that secondhand smoke is
2 a dangerous class A carcinogen in the same class as asbestos and
3 benzene. Secondhand smoke typically contains at least seven
4 thousand identifiable chemicals, around seventy of which are
5 known or probable carcinogens. The fiftieth anniversary United
6 States Surgeon General Report, released on January 17, 2014,
7 states that any level of exposure to secondhand smoke is
8 dangerous and over two and a half million nonsmokers have died
9 from health problems caused by secondhand smoke since 1964.

10 The legislature further finds that in general, children
11 breathe in more air than adults because their lungs are still
12 developing. Children also have little or no control over their
13 environments and cannot leave if secondhand smoke bothers them.
14 As a result, children exposed to secondhand smoke run a greater
15 risk of suffering from the damaging health effects.

16 According to the Centers for Disease Control and
17 Prevention, secondhand smoke can cause heart disease, lung



1 cancer, and stroke. In children, secondhand smoke can also
2 cause ear infections; more frequent and severe asthma attacks;
3 respiratory symptoms such as coughing, sneezing, and shortness
4 of breath; respiratory infections such as bronchitis and
5 pneumonia; and a greater risk for sudden infant death syndrome.

6 Studies have found that secondhand smoke exposure in
7 vehicles is more concentrated than in bars and restaurants.
8 Secondhand smoke in a car causes the air to be many times more
9 toxic than what the Environmental Protection Agency considers
10 hazardous air quality, even when a window is down. Smoke-free
11 vehicle policies ensure that clear air is maintained within the
12 vehicle while a child is inside.

13 As of June 2015, over twenty jurisdictions within the
14 United States, including California, Oregon, and the county of
15 Hawaii, have enacted smoke-free vehicle laws to protect minors.

16 The purpose of this Act is to prohibit smoking in a motor
17 vehicle when a minor is present.

18 SECTION 2. Chapter 291C, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19 amended by adding a new section to part XII to be appropriately
20 designated and to read as follows:



1 "§291C- Smoking in a motor vehicle in which a minor is
2 present; prohibited. (a) No person shall smoke in a motor
3 vehicle in which a person under the age of eighteen is present.

4 (b) For the purposes of this section, "smoke" shall have
5 the same meaning as provided in section 328J-1.

6 (c) Any person who violates this section shall be fined
7 \$100."

8 SECTION 3. Section 291C-161, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

10 "(c) Every person convicted under or found in violation of
11 section 291C-12, 291C-12.5, 291C-12.6, 291C-13, 291C-14,
12 291C-15, 291C-16, 291C-72, 291C-73, 291C-95, 291C-102, 291C-103,
13 291C-104, [~~or~~] 291C-105, or 291C- shall be sentenced or fined
14 in accordance with those sections."

15 SECTION 4. The department of health shall submit a report
16 to the legislature regarding the enforceability by law
17 enforcement agencies of the prohibition of smoking in a motor
18 vehicle in which a minor is present as a secondary offense and
19 coordination of data collection efforts of the respective law
20 enforcement agencies, including any proposed legislation, no



1 later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular
2 session of 2017.

3 SECTION 5. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
4 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
5 begun before its effective date.

6 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

8 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on January 7, 2059.
